Waterford Board Of Public Assistance

Members' Queries Answered

Senator John Butler in the absence of the Chairman presided at the meeting of the Waterford Board of Public Assistance held in Dungarvan on Monday last.

Messrs Wm Kennelly and Ml McGrath were also present.

Mr M Flynn Secretary attended.

Matron's Report Accepted.
The Secretary read a report from the Matron of the County Hospital Waterford answering a point raised at the last meeting by Mr O Connor.

The report stated that in the case of Anastasia Doyle Butlerstown who was a patient discharged on July 29th the Medical Officer discharged her as fit on that date. She had been up for three or four days before her discharge and usually when patients are fit they or their relations look after them. There was no request made for the ambulance and this is made available at all reasonable requests. In the case of city patients discharged an attendant is placed at their disposal while walking home.

The report was accepted as satisfactory.

Assistance Officer Visits Labour Exchange.
To a point raised at the last meeting by Mr Ryan the Secretary said that in the case of persons who report at the Unemployment Exchange and get no money the usual procedure is that the Assistance Officer visits the Exchange on Thursday of each week and finds out what applicants for Unemployment Relief will get none. Certificates in these cases are very rarely given to applicants.

To a question by the Chairman the Secretary said that when applicants receive no unemployment benefit they will get Home Assistance.

Other Items.
Mr M Phelan Superintendent Assistance Officer, reported that in the case of a woman from Knocknomanaghan the woman was in regular employment and was advised to apply for a widows pension but did not do so. A recent application by her for assistance was again refused.

In the case of Mrs O'Donnell New Street Lismore Mr Phelan reported that she would be granted the free milk as from November 1st. Her husband was cut off as that certain recipients had to be cut off in the summer to keep the scheme within the grant.

Eye Specialist Should Attend at Dungarvan.
The Chairman said that he understood that all cases from all rural areas who must attend the specialist must go to Waterford.

The Secretary said that such was the position.

Chairman—That's a great distance and some of the people are almost 90 miles from the city. A day should be arranged when the eye specialist could attend at a centre in Dungarvan.

Secretary—That might be arranged when a permanent man is appointed.

Chairman—The dentist attends here and at Lismore—how often?

Secretary—Once a week.

Chairman—Who is he?

Secretary—Mr Frisby.

The Chairman said that he knew of one instance he was at the District Hospital and saw a lot of people there. He thought they were waiting for a funeral but when he inquired he was told that it was for the dentist they were waiting. It was 2.30 at the time and they had been there since 12 o'clock and it was wet day. He said that he was told afterwards that the dentist did not in fact turn up at all that day. It was unfair to these unfortunate people to be put to the hardship of waiting so long for nothing especially as some of them had come to the centre by bus at their own expense.

The Secretary said that there was a question of a scarcity of petrol on the occasion but he said that he would see that it did not happen again.

No Equipment For Operations.
Mr Keneally said that the eye specialist had no equipment for carrying out operations at the County Hospital.

Secretary—He was asked to state his requirements and has not done so.

Chairman—It's extraordinary that the Board and the Manager are anxious to provide the necessary equipment and the man won't tell us what he requires.

An Fear Mor presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Vocational Education Committee held at Dungarvan on Monday evening last. Messrs M O'Hara, J. McGrath, J. Butler, M. McGrath and Rev. Fr. Curtis O.S.A. were present.

Mr James Langan CEO attended.

Caretaker's Wages.
A letter from the Department stated that the Minister was not prepared to sanction any increase in the allocation governing the wages of the caretaker at Dungarvan other than the Emergency Bonus increase authorised on January 17th last.

Garden Too Small For Whole Time Gardener.
The Department intimated in a letter that the Committee's proposal to employ a whole-time gardener at Dungarvan school would not be sanctioned.

Mr O'Hara said that the rural science teacher—Mr. Maher was not being properly treated by not having a gardener. He said it was unfair to the teacher to report on whose work would be based on the condition of the garden.

Mr McGrath—We might be able to employ a man in a temporary capacity.

Fr. Curtis—You could employ a man from day to day to do the work as required.

Mr Butler—I'm not surprised at the Department's decision at the garden is too small to employ the services of a whole-time gardener.

Fr. Curtis—Who has the power to employ a temporary man?

Mr Butler—If you put in an advertisement you'd get a thousand replies but the trouble is none of them would be qualified.

Mr O'Hara—If the garden is not kept in proper order Mr. Maher will be attacked by the Department and now they turn down this appointment.

Fr. Curtis—What is the area of the plot?

Mr McGrath—About 1 1/2 acres.

Mr J. McGrath—If we give a gardener £3 a week to look after 1 1/2 acres it would be a cost of £600 for an acre.

Fr. Curtis—How many are in the class?

Mr McGrath—About 12.

Fr. Curtis—You decided to employ a man as required?

Mr McGrath—The Department wrote approving of the Committee's proposal to award a second year scholarship in Domestic Science value £60 each and tuition fees to Margaret Butler and Peggy McGrath.

A report from the teacher in charge of Cahill Brugha Street School on Peggy McGrath stated that she was a most capable student who had made great progress.

Organising Feisanna.
In reply to Mr M McGrath the CEO stated that there was a scheme whereby part-time teachers under the Committee would be paid for certain number of hours for organising feisanna provided they gave due notice of the function.

New Regulations A Bar.
A letter from the Department stated that they regretted that the proposal to promote Miss G Patterson to temporary whole-time teacher of Commercial Subjects cannot be approved as she does not qualify under the revised version of Memo V7 (regulations governing appointments).

Mr O'Hara the CEO said that Miss Patterson was qualified under the old version but this was revised in 1939.

Mr O'Hara—It's rather hard on her as she has been teaching here since, but does not qualify now.

CEO—She is qualified for temporary work.

Mr O'Hara—It is only all red tape and I think they should ask when they want their decision.

Mr M McGrath—Yes we should. It's really a question of teaching ability and if she is able to teach part-time she should be able to teach full-time.

Finally on the proposal of Mr O'Hara a resolution was passed requesting the Department to reconsider their decision.

Irish Teacher.
Mr M O'Cuilleadh Irish teacher wrote requesting the Committee to arrange his re-appointment for the coming year.

A letter from the Department stated that Mr Cullen did not qualify for the award of Teastas Timitheir Gaelige held after a recent course.

After discussion on the matter a resolution was passed proposing that the School House be arranged by Mr O'Hara appointing Mr Cullen as temporary whole-time teacher of Irish for the coming year.

Woodwork Instructor.
The CEO Waterford City wrote stating that his Committee had appointed a Woodwork Instructor but as his services would not be required full-time until January 1st he asked that the local Committee use his services in a part-time capacity. It was decided to avail of the


