Dungarvan Objection To Brickey Rangers Defeated

A meeting of the Waterford Co. Board G.A.A. was held in the C.Y.M.S. Hall, Mary Street, Dungarvan on Tuesday night last Oct 8th. Mr M V O'Donoghue B.E. Chairman presided. Also present were: Mr C. O'Connell, Mr T. O'Connell, Mr P. Fanning, Mr McCarthy, Mr J. Fives, Mr Larkin (Co. Board members), Sean Greene (Cappoquin), S. Curran and J. Griffin (Brickey Rangers), J. O'Dea and P. Lannen (Dungarvan), M. Fives (Ballycoe), P. Hurley (Stradbally), W. Power (Kilrossanty), F. Poche (Irish Tanners), M. Cullen (Erin's Own).

It was proposed and seconded that the minutes be taken as read and they were signed by the Chairman.

Dungarvan Objection To Brickey Rangers

The following letter was read from the Secretary, Dungarvan Hurling and Football Club:—
A Chara—I have been instructed by the Committee of the above Club to object to the Brickey Rangers Hurling Club being awarded the Senior Hurling Championship match played against Dungarvan at Lismore on 29th September 1945 on the following grounds:—
(1)—That Bernard Moloney who took part in the game as a member of the Brickey Rangers hurling team was illegal not being a registered member of that Club contrary to Rule 14, Page 47 O.G. 1945 and Bye-Law No 23 of the Waterford Co. Board Bye-Laws 1943.

(2)—That Bernard Moloney who took part in the game as a member of the Brickey Rangers hurling team was illegal contrary to Rules 17 and 18, Page 49 O.G. 1943.

(3)—That Bernard Moloney who took part in the game as a member of the Brickey Rangers hurling team was illegal contrary to Rule 20, Page 51 O.G. 1943.

Mr G. said his club had not received a copy of the objection and wanted to know the reason why.

The Secretary explained to the meeting that some members of the Brickey Rangers Club came to his house and he offered them a copy of the objection but for some reason or another they refused to accept it.

Dealing with point No 1, Mr O'Dea for the Dungarvan Club said that Mr P. Lannen called on the Secretary on the 21st September to see if Bernard Moloney was officially registered and according to the register the player in question was not registered.

The Secretary said that Mr Griffin of the Brickey Rangers Club called to his house and took away the register and when he got it back on Sunday morning Bernard Moloney's name was on it.

In reply to the Chairman the Secretary stated that Bernard Moloney's name was not on the register on Saturday 21st Sept. when the register was handed back to him on Sunday morning Mr Moloney's name was on it.

Chairman—The player was registered 8 days before the match and as that was in accordance with general rules he would accept it.

Point No 2 was next taken and Mr O'Dea said that Bernard Moloney was transferred from Waterford to Wicklow and that he was not transferred back to Waterford and contrary to Rule 18 he could not take part in any championship games in this County.

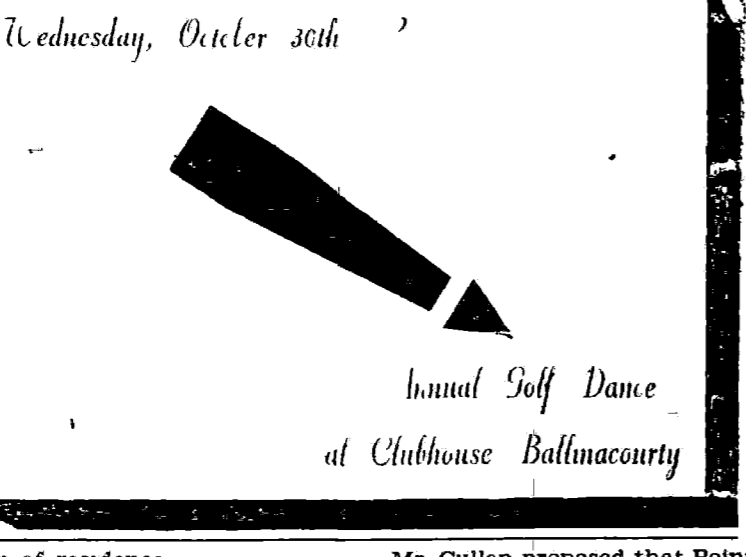
In this stage Mr Cullen (Erin's Own) appealed to the Dungarvan delegates to withdraw the objection. The Brickey Rangers were the best team in the West and had beaten Dungarvan twice already and it was the best team Erin's Own wanted to meet.

Mr O'Dea said his instructions were to go on with the objection. The Secretary then read correspondence which stated that Bernard Moloney was transferred by the Waterford Co. Board and Central Council.

Mr O'Dea—That proves that he was transferred to Wicklow but that he has not been transferred back to Waterford.

Chairman—The transfer does not take place until the player takes part in some game in the County to which he was transferred and we have no evidence before us that the player took part in any such games in Co. Wicklow.

Point No 3 was then discussed and Mr O'Dea said the player would have to make a declaration of residence.



Mr Griffin said that Bernard Moloney was not actually employed as he was only in a Training College in Avondale.

Chairman—It is only on the submission of evidence to this Board that the decision on the objection will be given and theonus is on the Dungarvan Club to prove the points submitted. There is no proof that the player in question took part in any matches in Co. Wicklow.

Mr O'Dea—He was transferred out of this County and was not transferred back to Waterford 8 days before the match.

Mr P. Fanning—The man could not be classified as non-registered as he was registered 8 days before the match and there is no time specified in general rules covering this matter.

Mr O'Dea then produced the Bye-Laws of the Co. Waterford in which it was stated that all players should be registered 12 days before the date of the match.

Mr O'Connor—While I am satisfied that the man is registered, I hate to see so much dishonesty at this Board by some members who took an entirely different view of a previous case in which a player was objected to for not being registered in connection with the Brickey Rangers and Newtown junior football championship match. He was severely criticised for his action at that time but now he can see that some members can easily change their minds when it suits them.

Mr Ware—I think the clubs concerned should leave the meeting while the Board decide on the objection.

The Dungarvan and Brickey Rangers delegates then left the meeting.

The Chairman then asked the members of the Board for their views on the case.

Mr Kyne said that while he did his best to prevent this objection being heard he felt he should be honest enough to say that a bye-law was broken by the player not being registered 12 days before the match.

Chairman—The player is registered in accordance with general rules and there is no penalty attached in the bye-laws of the Waterford Co. Board for not being registered 12 days before a match.

Mr Cullen then proposed that no penalty be imposed on Point No 1 and that the player was registered according to general rules but not in accordance with bye-laws and this was seconded.

Mr Kyne at this point strongly protested to the acceptance of such a proposal as it was contrary to rules and in all the circumstances which were well-known to some of the members of the Board it would be a travesty of justice if the resolution was accepted and he would not be a party to it. He dissented from the proposition being accepted.

Mr O'Connor supported Mr Kyne's view on this.

The Chairman said he was accepting the proposition.

On a vote being taken the proposition was carried by 11 votes to 4.

Point No 2 Mr Kyne held that the player in question was transferred to another County and as he was not transferred back to Waterford he could not take part in County games in Waterford.

The Chairman said that if he was asked his opinion on point No 2 he would suggest that it should be ruled out as no evidence was stated but as he was not asked for his opinion earlier in the matter he was not going to rule on it but would leave it to the Board to decide.

Mr Kyne stated that the Dungarvan delegates had proved Point No 2 and he proposed that Point No 2 be upheld.

Mr O'Connor seconded Mr Kyne's proposition.

LISMORE ITEMS

Junior Hurling Semi-Final— Ballyduff defeat St Augustine's

Under fairly good weather conditions and before a large attendance Ballyduff defeated St Augustine's (Abbeyside) at the Gaelic Field on last Sunday in the Western Divisional Final and have now qualified to meet the winners of the St Mollerans Butlersdown (Eastern finalists) in the Junior hurling County final on October 27th at Dungarvan.

In the early stages the game was a tame affair close marking on both sides being against any spectacular hurling. Later however things brightened up and with the scores fairly close all through spectators were kept on their toes until the final whistle.

Ballyduff owe their victory to the backs of the team and the efforts of the St Augustine's forwards in the third quarter of the game. In this moiety the Abbeyside lads had much the better of the play but they met a rock-like defence in the St Augustine's backs.

The delegates then came back to the meeting and the Chairman gave them the decision of the Board on the points submitted and said that the Board ruled out all three points and therefore the objection could not be upheld.

Best for the losers were Waters the O'Connors Bros. McGrath and Ryan.

St Augustine's had the first over of the game but from the puck-out P. Ahearne secured and held on to his forwards but O'Connor was in position to clear to the side-line. The ensuing cut-in went to Beecher and a combined effort by the same player McCarthy and Mulcahy had the ball in the net.

St Augustine's were soon attacking again but faulty finishing lost what looked like a certain score. A free to Ballyduff was well placed by Daly and a Ballyduff advantage was lost through a foul by one of their forwards.

After ten minutes play the village lads had another minor (McCarthy) before their forwards missed a great chance for a well-taken 70 by Beecher.

A spate of good hard play followed before McGovern on the left corner had a nice point for St Augustine's. This was negated however when Farrell getting possession about forty yards out slipped through the defence and tapped the ball over the bar with his hand. St Augustine's retaliated with a point from M. Connor but goal to the Reds (Casey) further stretched their lead. Before half time Murphy raised another white flag for Abbeyside to port the score—

St Augustine's 0-3

On resuming both sides showed positional changes and they seemed to have effected a great improvement in the St Augustine's team as from the throw in they went all out for the goal which would put them on an even footing but the Ballyduff defence stood up well in breaking up these attacks. A great effort by Whelan, Jones and McGrath found M. Connor getting possession about 40 yards out and sending over a grand point. Farrell was well in with a good shot before P. Ahearne sent over the bar for Ballyduff from a good distance out. A weak puck-out was trapped by Beecher who sent to Mulcahy this player sent into the square where M. Beecher (full-forward) sent over the bar. The Abbeyside net-minder was seen to advantage before McCarthy sent over the bar from a 21 yard free and before full-time the same player raised another white flag in reply to a similar score for St Augustine's.
