SISTER M. GERTRUDE**

Sister Mary Gertrude Walsh whose death occurred on Friday last Oct 11th at the Convent of Mercy Cappoquin was a native of Ardmore. The late Sister Gertrude had reached the fine old age of 83 years and was in the 54th year of her religious life. She was sister of the late Very Rev. Nicholas Canon Walsh P.P. Tramore the late Rev. Patrick Walsh P.P. Ardmore the late Sister Josephine Mercy Convent Dungarvan Mr. Declan Walsh Ardmore and Mrs. O'Riordan Dungarvan. She was aunt of Rev. M. Walshes Los Angeles and Dr. J. Morrissey Waterford and grand aunt of Rev. J. Lavin C.C. St. Mary's Clonmel Rev. Charles Lavin Diocesan Inspector and Rev. Nicholas Lavin England.

During the early years of her religious life Sister Gertrude taught at the Convent School with marked success. Later she was appointed Local Superior at the Stella Maris Convent Ardmore and after spending several years there she returned to Cappoquin and was in charge of St. Michael's Orphanage where she did everything possible for the welfare of the orphans.

Some years ago she returned to the Convent and again held a responsible position there. Last year her health began to fail and she bore patiently the sufferings which the Almighty sent her with perfect resignation until the end came peacefully on Friday last. She will be sadly missed by the Sisters of the local community who were all so devoted to her.

To her relatives and to the Rev. Mother and other nuns of the Mercy Community in Cappoquin we extend our sincere sympathy.

On Sunday evening at 3 p.m. the mortal remains of Sister Gertrude were solemnly interred in the Convent Chapel to the cemetery. Rev. J. O'Connor P.P.
