## DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

Defendant Bound To Peace For Using Abusive Language  
 Sequel To Strike By Carters

The Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr. Eamonn O'Riain on Tuesday last. On the application of Mr. Williams sole occasional licenses were granted for the Glee and Gelatine Staff Dance and for the Coursing Meeting at Clonon.

A similar license was granted for the Dungarvan Swimming Club for a dance on St. Stephen's Night on the application of Mr. Morrissey sole.

**Case Withdrawn**  
 In the adjourned case in which Mrs. Hannah Cooney Gratlan Square was charged with a breach of the licensing laws Superintendent O'Mahony stated that no complaints had been received since the case was heard 3 months ago and he requested that the charge be withdrawn.

The Justice allowed the case to be withdrawn.

**Adjourned**  
 On the application of Mr. Hally sole the case against Nicholas Beresford and Thomas and James Beresford for alleged malicious injury was adjourned to the first court in January.

**Bound To Peace**  
 Mr. P. Morrissey sole on behalf of Mrs. Bridget Young 7 Thomas Terrace Dungarvan made an application to have Michael Healy 10 Thomas Terrace Dungarvan bound to the peace.

Plaintiff in evidence said that on the evening of November 18th the defendant who lives near her came out on the road and abused her with dirty filthy language of a very vile nature. A local clergyman who was going on a sack call came along and told Healy to go away but he used terrible language to the priest and wanted to take off his coat to fight him.

Continuing witness said—When the priest was returning Healy was still on the road using language and the priest went to the end of the road to go for Sergeant Liddane. Mr. Healy said "The Guards did not want to go away but this is the second time he has attacked me and I have given him no provocation."

When defendant's name was called he did not answer. The Justice then made an order that defendant enter into recognisances in two sureties himself for £5 and one surety for £5 to keep the peace for 12 months.

As defendant was not present he was given 7 days to enter the recognisances or in default he would serve 1 month in prison.

**Lease Surrendered**  
 Mr. Williams sole on behalf of Mr. James Hayes Main St. Dungarvan applied for an adjourned transfer of the licence lately held by Mr. James Lynch.

Mr. Williams said that Mr. Hayes was the owner of the licensed premises and made a lease for 10 years with Mr. Lynch a few years ago but this lease has been surrendered back to Mr. Hayes.

**Sequel To Carters' Strike—Claim Against Co-Op Fails**  
 Patrick Whelan and Augustine Leahy Abbeyside Michael Moylan and Christopher Moylan Dungarvan all carters had a claim for £1 1s 3d each against the Dungarvan Co-Op Creamery.

Mr. Kenny sole was for plaintiffs and Messrs Farrell & Morrissey sole were for the defendant company.

The claim was made in respect of a day and a quarter's work in unloading a boat on October 7th and 8th last during which the four defendants ceased work when a request for an increased rate was refused.

Mr. Kenny stated that Whelan was not in Court and Christopher Moylan had gone to England but the facts were similar in all the cases and in deciding one all would be decided. He said that there was a dispute between these regular carters and the Co-Op who were a very big concern and who imported coal direct from the other side by boat to the quay. Generally these boats are unloaded at a berth about 200 yards from the main gate of the Co-Op. When a boat is due a list of names of the men to be employed unloading is published and they may or may not turn up for work.

The previous boat which had been unloaded had two men in the hold and the coal was taken away as it came up and the

custom is that the carters have to keep time with the output of the unloaders. On the last occasion the boat did not berth at the usual place but about four or five hundred yards further down the quay and the coal had to be brought to the back premises of the defendant's yard. There were five men in the hold this time and the coal was being unloaded rapidly. When the work had been going on for a few hours the plaintiff came to the conclusion that it would not pay them to work at the usual rate of 16/- a day and they went in a deputation to Mr. Conway the assistant Manager and pointed out the situation to him and asked for £1 a day Mr. Conway told them that he would have to see the boss and told them to carry on in the meantime. The men went back to work and on the following day after doing about 3 hours work they again went to see what was the result and Mr. Conway told them he was sorry that no increase could be given. The men said they could not work for the 16/- and knocked off. When the boat was unloaded the men went to collect for their day and a quarter's work but they were told that there was nothing for them and they sued for that amount at the rate of 16/- a day. Michael Moylan in evidence said that he was one of the plaintiffs and was engaged in unloading the boat on Oct 7th and 8th. He started work at 8 o'clock on the morning of the 7th and worked all day and also from 8 to 11 on the 8th. At 10 o'clock on the 1st day he, with the other three carters went to

who acted as spokesman asked for a pound a day and said they got it before Mr. Conway said he would have to see the boss but said he thought it would be alright and to work away. On the next day at 11 they went to see what happened and Mr. Conway said that the Manager would not give £1 a day so they said they would not work unless they got it and Mr. Conway said that they would put lories on the job. The usual rate was 16/- a day and the reason they asked for an increase was that the boat was berthed down near Moloney's which was a big distance from the Co-Op yard and they had to keep the horses trotting up and down to keep up with the output of the men in the hold who were getting the coal out as fast as they could as they were being paid by the ton. Witness said that working from that point was harder on the horses than from the nearer slip as there was much more wear and tear as they could not work for their day and a quarter's work they were not paid and were told

to go to hell. Mr. Farrell—you drew two stone of oats value 6/- against the first day?—Yes. In reply to further questions by Mr. Farrell witness said that he was a carter for 40 years and had worked for the Co-Op before. There were two berths on the Quay one on the top and the other a few hundred yards further down. He knew that once the name of a carter was put on the list he was expected to unload as a carter until the boat was finished. Up to 6 or 7 years ago, carters were paid by the ton but the change to 16/- a day was made as the former rates were unfair. On the first day they were not satisfied with the rate and went to see Mr. Conway then. When they were refused the £1 a day they knocked off.

Mr. Farrell—When you stopped you stayed on the quay and tried to get the other men to go on strike?—

Witness—No the other men are in the Union and we have nothing to do with them. Were not all the lories engaged in drawing corn and you

did this as you thought the Creamery were in a fix?—We were not knocked off 20 minutes when the lories were on the job. If you did not want to drive the horses faster wouldn't the job take longer?—We had to keep the boat going.

In reply to Mr. Kenny witness said that there were five men in the hold of the boat and the carters had to keep up with the output. When they met Mr. Maher he told them that they would put lories on the job and to go home. Augustine Leahy gave corroborative evidence and said the reason they asked for the increase was that the draw from the boat was longer and it was harder on the horses. They went to see Mr. Conway on the first day and also on the second day when their request was refused. When the boat was finally unloaded they went up to be paid and Mr. Conway told them that he had no money for the first day and also on the second day when their request was refused. Mr. Farrell—Did you work from this berth before?—Once before from a slag boat, but

WILD BIRDS (COUNTY WATERFORD) ORDER, 1942
WHEREAS it is enacted by sub-section (1) of Section 7 of the Wild Birds Protection Act 1930 (No 16 of 1930) that the Minister for Justice may by order made on the advice of the Council of the County or a county borough prohibit for reasons stated in such application the taking or despoiling either generally or in any particular years or in any particular parts or part thereof of the eggs of any wild bird or any particular kinds or kinds of wild birds

NOW I Gerald Boland Minister for Justice in exercise of the powers conferred on me by sub-section (1) of Section 7 of the Wild Birds Protection Act 1930 (No 16 of 1930) and of every other power me in this behalf enabling for the reason that the great increase in the number of egg collectors subject to great persecution do hereby order as follows:
1 This order may be cited as the Wild Birds (County Waterford) Order 1942
2 The interpretation Act 1937 (No 38 of 1937) applies to the interpretation of this Order in like manner as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of the Oireachtas
3 No person shall in any part of the County of Waterford take or destroy in any of the years 1943 1944 1945 1946 and 1947 the eggs of any of the following wild birds that is to say—chough, partridge, falcon owl (all kinds) goldfinch siskin crossbill raven kingfisher nightjar and turtle-dove for the reason that the great increase in the number of egg collectors subject to great persecution do hereby order as follows:
