"FRIGHTENING DEMAND ON PEOPLE"

HOLD UP IN ABBEYSIDE HOUSING SCHEME

WITH the hands of the clock moving towards midnight the members of the Dungarvan Urban District Council sat about the table in the Council Chamber in the Town Hall, on Friday night last, in an undecided manner, faced with an estimate of 26/4d in £. The estimate had been described by one member as a frightening demand on the people, and the proposal of its adoption in full measure did not appear to be one to find favour.

At one time it looked as if a seconded for the proposal could not be got, even though Councillors had gone over the amounts in a vain effort to effect a reduction.

Finally, it was agreed to reduce the estimate by the odd 4d, although the Manager stated that it would be difficult to carry on even with this small reduction.

Presenting Estimates

Presenting the estimate to the Council the Manager stated:

"Mr Chairman and members of the Urban District Council—I beg to submit the estimate of expenses of the Dungarvan Urban District Council for the year ended 31st March 1948. This proposes a rate of 26/4d in the £ on the current rate. The Council has for some years passed out the Estimates each year but the necessary rapidly increasing expenditure of the past few years has brought us to the position that this coming year we must face the facts squarely.

Increased wages and salaries, social services, housing and other schemes demand fully the increased rate now being proposed and I have carefully gone through the figures with the Town Clerk and Borough Surveyor to secure any possible reductions. The increased wages amount to 11/- per week for workers viz—5/- per week paid for most of last year and 6/- per week from 1st Jan 1947 (latter not yet sanctioned) so that two years are being dealt with in whole or part in the Estimates.

The main increase are however due to the increased demand of the County Council—£1,593 which includes £306 not provided in last year's Estimates but which I am satisfied is due to them. The other increases are:—

Wages—£880
Salaries and Clerical Assistants—£675
Increased Poundsage on Rates—£106 on Rents £123
Town Planning—£100
Relief Scheme—£110
Miscellaneous—£150
Totaling—£3,613. This increase would represent an increase of 7/6 in the £ but credits have been taken for nearly £1,000 which enabled me to bring the increase down to the figures presented.

Full provision has been made in the Estimate for the Free Meals Scheme.

I would point out that the increased demand by the County Council together with the Rate Collectors' poundsage on same is equivalent to a rate of 3/4d in the £ so that the other increased services, wages, salaries, poundsage, loan charges and increased expenditure under all heads accounts for 2/- of the increase.

The Dungarvan Urban Rate in 1939-40 was 19/- and the increase proposed in this Estimate represents an increase of 37% on that figure which seems very reasonable when compared with the County Rate which increased from 15/- in 1939-40 to 21/8 in 1947-48. This of course was largely due to the increase in the cost of the Board of Assistance—and of course Dungarvan Urban bears its fair proportion of the cost of Assistance.

The Estimates have been circulated and I recommend them to you for adoption in full.

The total estimate of 26/4d was made up as follows:—Urban Roads 15/7d Public Health 5/7d Housing 2/7d Main Roads 28/9d Public Assistance 8/9d Mental Hospital 3/6d Public Health County 10/3d General Purposes (County) 2/6d Separate Charges 5/0d Other Urban Purposes 4/3d.

Mr Butler said that the increase was very big and that the estimate just presented was the biggest ever before the Council.

He stated that it was higher than Dublin where the rate was 25/9. Referring to the comparison made by the Manager between the Urban and County Rates he said that the increase in the county rate was relieved by the rebates under the agricultural grants but there was no such relief in the Urban Area.

Manager—You must pay for the increased services.

Dealing with the various items of expenditure as detailed the Manager told Mr Butler that the amount set aside under the Town and Regional Planning

Act which Act had been adopted by the Council was only a token amount so as to have a plan prepared if the Council wished to do so. He thought that it would be best advice to have a deal of time in my office while the plans were being prepared and I understood from him then that the plans as submitted would be sanctioned.

Mr Butler—These months ago we were led to believe that the houses would be under way now but it appears that there will be no progress even by the summer. It will take another six months before the altered plans are sanctioned.

Manager—I think that the best thing is for Mr Ormond to go to Dublin and see Mr Scott so as to expedite the matter as it was his own impression that the plans as sent up would be alright.

Chairman—There are a lot of people waiting for houses and we thought they would be under way by now.

Mr Butler—It is not our fault that they have been held up nor is it the Managers or the Borough Surveyor's fault. It is the gentlemen in Dublin who make fine speeches and send out circulars and it is as well that the people should know that.

Mr Butler—I agree with Mr Veale in that.

Mr Veale—What are the alterations suggested?

The Clerk then read out the alterations which dealt with the various drawings submitted. They were mainly too much living room space at the expense of bedroom space, stair defects, storage etc.

Mr Butler—I would conclude from that that the type of house submitted must be scrapped altogether and new plans prepared.

Mr Ormond—Only five will have to be scrapped, but there are twenty-four drawings altogether.

Mr Butler—It is very necessary according to that letter for Mr Ormond to go to Dublin.

Mr Veale—As far as I can see it is only that someone in Dublin wants to show how smart he is.

Mr Veale—The object seems to be to put the scheme off until we are near an election again.

Finally it was agreed that Mr Ormond should go to Dublin to see Mr Scott about the plans.

Manager's Orders
The following were among a big number of orders made by the Manager recently:

Co Council Contribution For Scavenging—Co Surveyor wrote stating that the Manager had proposed to pay a contribution of £200 per annum towards the scavenging of main roads in the Urban Area.

Order—Refer to Solicitor to draw up agreement to be retrospective for two years.

Clerical Assistance—Town Clerk reported that in view of increased work additional clerical assistance was needed.

Order—That Local Government Department be asked to sanction appointment of Clerk typist by open competitive examination at usual remuneration.

Annual Lettings—That grazing of Williams Marsh be let to Mr Thos Ryan, Ashfield, Fermoy for £20.

Order—That the plot at Williams Marsh be let to Mr Thos Power at 10/-.

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about 30/- a week. Manager—£4,000 for the whole repairs would mean an additional sum of £560 on your annual charges.

Mr Kyne—I have in mind only a good roof and then only other minor repairs. I think that there should be a boarded floor downstairs also as at present you would freeze to death there.

Mr Kelly—I agree with Mr Kyne.

It was decided that a case for the piano should also be made.

Mr Kyne—I see that in Youghal they provide £80 for band promenades but we do nothing like that here.

Chairman—Soon it will be like a ghost town if we don't do something to entice more dramatic and variety companies here.

Finally the Borough Surveyor was directed to prepare an estimate for the minor repairs needed in the hall.

Small Dwellings Acquisition Act Adopted
On the proposal of Mr Kyne who stated that there were many people who would be in the avail of it the above Act for the benefit of those anxious to build or buy houses for themselves was adopted.

Mr Veale seconded the proposal of Mr Kyne and that it would be good for those who want to avail of it.

Manager—It is a good act to put into operation.

[We understand that according to the terms of the Act the Local Authority can advance loans to borrowers at the rate of 3% interest. The limit of the value is £1,000 and the maximum allowance to be made is 75%.]

Income Tax Resolution
Mr Veale proposed the following resolution.

That we urge the Government to increase the personal allowance for Income Tax purposes so as to exempt from payment of tax persons with incomes up to £5 per week. It being now generally admitted that the main roads in the urban area here would be worth £11 so that a £5 weekly income at present is the equivalent of £215s 0d in 1939 on which no tax was payable.

Mr Veale seconded and it was passed with the following amendments.

Salary Increases
An order awarding salary increases of from 20% to 50%, to Council officials was approved and the help was expressed that they would be sanctioned.

Excess Expenditure
A resolution was passed approving of the excess expenditure of £1,100 under various heads over the estimate.

Subsidy On Turf
Mr Veale proposed and Mr Kyne seconded the following resolution.

That we call on the Government to increase the subsidy to 10p per ton to the merchants in Dungarvan who owing to the failure of Fuel Importers Ltd to meet their requirements were compelled to purchase turf direct from suppliers in Kerry in order to supply their registered customers in the Dungarvan non turf area and that in future merchants be allowed the subsidy on all turf supplied to registered customers irrespective of where purchased.

The resolution was passed unanimously.

HARBOUR BOARD MEETING
At a meeting of the Harbour Board held subsequently Mr Curran reported a number of arrivals and departures. He stated that repairs were needed at the Quay and in reply to Mr Kyne, the repairs were also carried out at the wall outside Mr Tierney's house at Abbeyside.

The Borough Surveyor said he would attend to these matters when the weather became suitable.

ILLUMINATION & WRITING

The spread of Christianity throughout Ireland gave birth to numerous monastic institutions.

The need for a supply of books and the occupation of the scribe therefore, became essential in all religious communities. In the "Annals of the Four Masters" are given the names of sixty-one scribes who won fame in Ireland before the tenth century. Surviving examples of their skill are remarkable for the fineness and variety of their designs and the richness and glow of their colouring. Their art represents a climax never since reached, and unparalleled up to that time. It is the more remarkable in that it suddenly appears before us, fully developed, without preliminary stages and without sources to which it can be traced.

The refusal of the Irish scribes to attempt naturalistic representation in order to make as free play as possible with the figures of a picture as if they were calligraphic designs, stands in sharp contrast to the whole range of classical antique art in all its derivations. The three chief Irish works in the art of illumination are "The Book of Durrow" (circa 700), "The Book of Kells" (circa 650-690) both in Trinity College, Dublin, and "The Lindisfarne Gospels" (circa 700) in the British Museum.

ECHOES FROM YOUGHAL Tillage - The tillage position in the Youghal area is now becoming really serious and unless there is a period of very fine weather immediately the position in the country will become indeed a dire one. It is understood that immediately fine weather comes along everything is in readiness to give the farmers all the help possible and in this regard tractors and ploughs have been earmarked for work in different parts of the area.

Water Main - The work of connecting up the 8-inch water main on the Rintrew road which was disconnected as a result of the recent landslide will be completed this week. This will end water rationing in Youghal and so far as the water supply is concerned normal supplies will be restored. The connecting up of the 6 inch main was completed a few days after the landslide so that the people were inconvenienced as little as possible.

Free Milk Scheme - For the first time since the National Free Milk Scheme was initiated the Youghal UDC have been unable to get a farmer or milk vendor to quote for a milk supply for year ending 31st March 1948. This seems a pity as the scheme was doing an abundance of good and was very much appreciated by all those who qualified to receive this milk. Unfortunately the greatest sufferers will be the children as the loss will be all the more emphasized as they have been in the habit of getting the milk and the stopping of the supply suddenly is bound to have repercussions.

New Fire Engine - Youghal is to have a new and much larger fire engine and a lot of new equipment. The fire engine manufactured by one of the very best known makers is expected to arrive in the next few days. In addition it will be accompanied by much new equipment. The lawns were laid out by Messrs McLysaghts complete with flowering shrubs and borders and cupresses hedge were planted on the East side.

Water Supply—In co-operation with the local M.O.H. a survey of the water supply in the district was made and recommendations were forwarded to the County Manager. E.S.B.—Following correspondence with the E.S.B. authorities a proposed Rural Area was decided on. Circulars were sent to every householder in this area and the Parish Council organised 6 meetings in the district in which the water supply was discussed. As a result an Official canvass of the area is now being made. We are hopeful that Ballyduff and the surrounding districts will be the beneficiaries of Rural Electrification next winter.

Harvest Bureau—During the harvest crisis last autumn the Parish Council automatically assumed the duties of a Harvest Bureau and on night by the allocation of voluntary labour and other matters. Twenty-three Council workers and thirty-four members of the Construction Corps were allocated to the various farms where they were most required. The local Branch of the Irish Red Cross assisted in distributing rations of tea and sugar to the various farms where they were most required. We wish to acknowledge the help given by the acting Secretary of the Committee of Agriculture the Military Authorities in Fermoy and the local County Council.

Bus Service—The Parish Council are at present in communication with C.I.E. in order to secure a bus service for the Area. Bus Lessons—Arrangements have been made with Miss E Whelan L.R.C.M. to give private lessons in the Hall twice weekly and a large number of children are attending these classes. Irish Story Dancing—These classes have temporarily ceased but will be resumed after Easter with a first-class instructor. Choral and Dramatic Society—By arrangement with the Vocational Education Committee a lecture was given by a member of the Royal Dublin Society. A course of lectures in Agriculture by the Instructor Mr Burke was commenced but fell through owing to insufficient numbers attending.

It is regrettable to have to record that the attendance at all lectures was very poor, but it should be stressed that the non-success of these efforts was in no way the fault of the Parish Council. Band—An effort to revive the Parish Band has not succeeded. Recreation—When not otherwise engaged the Hall is available nightly for cards draughts etc. Ceilidhe—The Hall is reserved every Wednesday night for Irish classes and Ceilidhe dancing. The attendance is only fair and many from whom support should be forthcoming are conspicuous by their absence. It was our privilege to be able to give all the facilities of the Hall on five occasions for functions in aid of charitable objects.

Drawing of Prizes—Two very successful Drawings of Prizes were organised and substantial sums raised. Future Plans—Preliminary steps have been taken in connection with an Agricultural and Horticultural Show next September. Excavation for the extension of the Hall is nearly complete and we may claim that the Parish Council has performed useful work since the last Annual General Meeting. There is however a tendency to leave the bulk of the work to a few willing members and this was particularly noticeable in connection with the work of the Harvest Bureau and the E.S.B. Canvass.
