### Father And Daughter Convicted In Trespass Cases

The Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr. Eamonn O'Riain D.J. at the Courthouse on Tuesday last.

**Occasional License**  
On the application of Mr. Williams, an occasional license was granted for a dance at the town hall on April 17th.

Mr. Williams, on behalf of Mrs. Mary Egan O'Connell, applied for a special exemption on the night of the 23rd inst. from 10.30 to 3 a.m. on the occasion of a social by the Blazers Hunt Club.

The application was granted.

**Motoring Offences**  
Guard McGowan v. John Mitchell Ballyduff fined 2/6 for having no road tax displayed. Fine 2/6.

Guard Burke v. Richard Power Thurns Terrace Dungarvan no drivers license. P.O.A.

Guard Dineen v. E. Spritt, 9 O'Connell St. for having no drivers license.

Mr. Morrissey, solicitor for defendant, said that it was due to an oversight that the summons had arisen and that it was the first one in a period of 29 years driving.

The Justice applied the P.O.A. Guard Malley summoned Charles Sullivan Waterford a driver of an L & N Tea Co van for having no insurance.

Mr. Morrissey, solicitor for defendant, and the P.O.A. was applied.

Guard Dineen summoned Bartholomew Keane Mary St. Dungarvan for driving without an insurance.

Mr. Morrissey, solicitor for defendant, said that Mr. Keane thought that the lorry he had was insured. He had purchased a new lorry and had the insurance of the old lorry transferred and understood from the Insurance Company Inspector that the transference was effective immediately.

This information was later proved incorrect when the certificate arrived the next day.

The Justice imposed a nominal fine of 10/-.

The same defendant was summoned by Supt. P. Mahony under the Road Transport Act for carrying goods for reward without having a merchandise license on Jan 24th and Jan 30th.

Mr. Morrissey, solicitor for defendant, pleaded guilty and explained that his client was pressed by a man named Doherty who had the contract for removals from the Light-house. Doherty and Keane had been co-employees of the same firm for 15 years and when Doherty was placed in the predicament of being unable to get a lorry to remove the furniture of the new man he went in desperation to Mr. Keane who obliged him. Keane would not

have done the job for anyone else and had only accepted £2 for all the work which was only a nominal charge.

Superintendent O Mahony said that the story as told by Keane to the Guards was substantially correct.

The Justice said that there were two offences committed and this being so he would have to impose the minimum fine of £5 in the second case.

He imposed a fine of 10/- in the first summons and informed Mr. Morrissey that if his client signed a petition which was forwarded to the Department he would write and recommend that the fine in the second case be reduced to £1.

Mr. Morrissey said that he would have this done.

**Obstruction**  
James Whelan Mapstown was summoned for causing an obstruction in a public street by leaving his donkey and cart tied to a pole.

Serjt Teahan was the complainant and defendant was fined 2/6.

**Incidents At Towler's Glen**  
Sheila Towler Gorteen summoned Thomas Curran Ballyharran for malicious injury to a fence on November 24th 1946 and 26th last to the extent of 10/-.

Defendant's daughter Hannah Curran was also summoned for stealing timber from plaintiff to the value of 5/-.

Mr. Kenny, solicitor for plaintiff and Mr. P. J. Morrissey, solicitor for the Currans, declared McGrath in evidence and said that he was agent and caretaker for the plaintiff who owns with other hands a glen named Towler's Glen. He knew the defendant Thomas Curran and on November 24th 25th and 26th he saw him breaking the wire fence bounding the Glen and leaving his goats into the place. The damage was repaired by Miss Towler's man. It was not very much but it was a danger to the cattle in the glen would break out. The fences had been broken since last November but he was not sure who had been responsible for that.

Mr. Kenny stated that he knew Hannah Curran and on November 29th last he saw her taking firing timber which he had cut for his own use in the Glen and that she had cautioned her about it. She said nothing but went away when she had a bar of turf.

To Mr. Morrissey witness said he wore he saw Thomas Curran breaking the fence and that he was within 15 or 20 yards of him at the time. The wire strands were twisted together and Curran opened it up and put the goats in. He said that he told Curran to take the goats away and defendant said that they would go home when it was time for them. He admitted that he reported to the Guards that wire strands had been taken but did not give a decided answer when Mr. Morrissey put it to him that Guard Broderick had proved that the wire was not in fact broken.

Continuing witness said that Hannah Curran took hazel and sally wood out of the Glen and not burnt turf. He denied that the Glen was a commonage act as was shown out between the roads of that he was spiteful towards the Currans because they had the cutting of Mrs. Cullinan's lands all around his house. He said that he was not always causing trouble to the defendants or that he ever saw poor people picking sticks in the Glen.

To the Justice witness said that Curran did not cut the wire fence but opened it up by breaking the two wires which were twisted together.

To Mr. Kenny witness agreed that stakes had become loose in the fence when the tension went off the wires.

Thomas Curran in reply to Mr. Morrissey stated in evidence that he had heard what McGrath had stated but denied that he had done anything of the sort. The goats go into the glen themselves and he said and everything that McGrath had stated in evidence was all said in spite of the fact that he had an acre of his own for the goats but that they often stray up the Glen for grazing. He up the Glen for grazing. He often saw McGrath around the place and he agreed to seeing

him on one occasion at the place the goats got in about 15 or 20 yards away. He said he could not remember the particular days in respect of the summons.

Mr. Kenny—How do you know where the goats got in?  
Witness—They get in all along the place.

You know it because this is the place you let them in yourself?

I do not I never had anything to do with the fences there.

Continuing witness said he often took burnt turf out of the Glen and that plaintiff and himself had always been good neighbours.

Hannah Curran in evidence said that on November 29th last she was in Towler's Glen which had only had rough land in it and took some burnt turf. She did not take any hazel or sally timber but only a light 'bart' of turf.

To Mr. Kenny witness said the place was only a commonage. She did not see McGrath on November 29th nor did she have any conversation with him. She said that this was the only occasion on which she was ever in the glen.

Addressing the Justice Mr. Kenny said that the summons were only issued as a last resort. The glen had been raided and the fences broken down and in self-defence they had to take the summons for cases they could prove.

The Justice said that in the case of the father he would have to convict but would reduce the value of the damage to 1/-, he would also have to convict the daughter of stealing timber and reduce its value to 5/-.

He said that if Mr. Morrissey was prepared to give an undertaking on behalf of his clients that they would not go near the glen again and pay £2 2s 0d costs he would apply the P.O.A. Mr. Morrissey said that the people were desperately poor and as far as he knew they would be unable to pay.

When Curran was asked he told the Justice that he could never pay 2 guineas as his only income was 7/6 from Insurance and 11/- from Mr. Dee. He said that he or his daughter would never go near the place again.

Mr. Kenny said it was hard and unfair to his client, having succeeded in the case she should pay her own costs but in the circumstances he was willing to reduce the amount of the costs to 1 guinea.

The Justice then reduced the amount of the costs to 1 guinea and gave defendant 3 months to pay and he said that if this were done he would apply the P.O.A. No order as to compensation was made.

## CEÁRODÁS ΔΑΕΛΑĆ IRISH CRAFTSMANSHIP

**MIOTALAIREACC METALWORK**

The examples of metalwork that have survived destruction combine a complete mastery of technique with an extraordinary skill in design. With the introduction of Christianity the art of the metalworker, like that of the scribe, was almost wholly devoted to the service of the Church, save for ornamental pins and brooches. Of these the best known is the Tara Brooch, a work of the early 9th century, and one of the two finest examples of Irish craftsmanship in metal. The other is the Ardagh Chalice, a work which combines classic beauty with examples of almost every variety of Celtic ornamentation. Other outstanding relics of Irish workmanship are the Cumdach or Shrine of St. Molaise's Gospels made about A.D. 1001, the Shrine of St. Mogue, considered one of the most remarkable of Irish reliquaries, and the Shrine of St. Patrick's Bell, circa A.D. 1091, made to enclose the bell used by the Saint in the 5th century. The Clonmacnoise Crozier is one of three or four complete croziers that have survived. It belongs to the 12th century.

The processional cross, the Cross of Cong, was made about A.D. 1123 to enshrine a fragment of the true cross, by order of King Turlough O'Connor. All these and many other relics of early Irish culture are in the Treasure Room of the National Museum, Dublin.
