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## WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

### Proposed New Youghal Bridge

### "No Progress Being Made Against T.B."

Mr D Heskin T.D. Chairman presided at the adjourned quarterly meeting of the Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs M O Ryan T A Kyne W Norris P Butler M Hartly M F Walsh M McGrath T Morrissey F Roche J Mansfield T Power R Barron J Meade and W Dower were present.

Messrs S J Moylhan County Manager Dr M O Farrell County M.O.H. Dr Dennehy County T.B. Officer Mr D Sheehy County Surveyor Mr B Boyle County Accountant Messrs D Doyle and J Ormond Assistant County Surveyors and Mr J G Dowling Secretary were in attendance.

Mr M Walsh introduced a deputation which came before the meeting in connection with repairs to the Lyre Bridge which was almost washed away during the flood period.

When the members of the deputation had spoken on the necessity for the repairing of the Bridge the County Surveyor stated that a new bridge was needed there, but that he would attend to the matter.

Well At Monarud Mr Hartly introduced a deputation (Mr Walsh spokesman) from Monarud who came before the Council in connection with a well there on which forty people were depending the water from which cannot be used.

Mr Walsh said that there was not a pint of water there as the supply drain was blocked.

It was agreed that the well be repaired.

Mr O Ryan referred to the well at Four Mile Water and Mr Doyle said that this was not a well at all but a pool on the bank of the Nire and when the river is in flood the water rises to five feet and to protect the pool from contamination it was necessary to build a shaft of five feet.

If this were done he said that the people of the place would have difficulty in getting the water.

Mr O Ryan—Could you put a pump there?

Mr Doyle—Yes that could be done but there is a spring up near the road and it would be better to use that.

It was agreed that Mr Doyle prepare an estimate for sinking a well on the road.

should produce as much as possible and that when the turf is half or three-quarter saved it could be sold at a comparative price to the people and let them dry themselves.

The Chairman said that according to Fuel Importers Regulation no private producer could bring turf into Dungarvan.

Mr Hartly—If such regulations exist they should be cast aside as food and fuel for the people come first.

A resolution to this effect was passed by the Council.

Mr O Ryan—Turf should only be sold when it is dry.

Mr Kyne stated that there was discrimination against Dungarvan workers for employment by the Council on their bog and he thought the reason was that they looked for their rights and threatened to strike before he said that there were hundreds of unemployed in the town who could be put to work.

The Co Surveyor said that every bog in their control was being worked to full capacity.

Mr O Ryan said there was a big amount of turf in Kibrim bog which was not being worked and Mr Ormond said that to get into the bog proper the road there should be extended for another mile.

Manager—The late Co Surveyor said that the place there was inaccessible.

Mr O Ryan proposed a resolution asking for a grant towards the extension of the road.

A further resolution proposed by Mr O Ryan that private turf producers get an allocation of bread from the Department was also passed.

Mr Mansfield said that there was 75% water in the turf being sold at present and proposed that the moisture content of turf offered for sale should be reduced.

This was passed unanimously.

Proposed New Youghal Bridge The Secretary read out the suggested application for a Bridge Order for a bridge over the Youghal river on the joint committee of Waterford and Cork Co Councils (already published in a previous issue).

dealing with these matters. Mr Kyne—This is only a hair-brain scheme now to send some fellows off to the Continent.

Dr Dennehy—The suggestion in the circular is a good one but maybe it is premature.

Chairman—It is futile to make recommendations when the Department refused to cooperate with us and I suggest we let this thing over until the Department decide on what we suggested to them two years ago.

Mr Hartly—Is TB on the increase? Chairman—It is bound to be on the increase. Every county in the country is wrestling with it. There are 20 people waiting for treatment here and they are bound to affect others.

The whole thing is a sham. The Secretary was directed to convey the feelings of the meeting to the Department of Health with a resolution proposed by Mr Kyne that they sanction the proposal to set up a TB unit at the County Home.

Letting of Labourer's Cottages A deputation concerning the letting of a Labourer's Cottage was not heard when the County Manager said that cottages lettings were an executive function and should be left in the hands of the Manager.

Mr O Ryan said that there was no use discussing the matter further as it was a matter for the Manager.

The Manager said that he would be glad to receive recommendations from the Councillors on the matter.

In reply to Mr Kyne the Manager said that the M.O.s recommendation was the principal factor in deciding lettings.

Miscellaneous Correspondence Letters from Lismore Town Commissioners (erection of clock on Courthouse) Grand Town Commissioners C.I.E. and Tralee UDC were dealt with.

## Waterford Board Of Public Assistance

### Further Tributes To Late Mr. Michael Morrissey, T.D.

### Sympathy Voted To County Manager.

The monthly meeting of the Waterford B.O.A. which was held on Monday last in Dungarvan was adjourned as a mark of sympathy to the memory of the late Mr Michael Morrissey T.D. who was Chairman of the Board since the death of Mr Paul Caulfield some months ago.

Proposing the adjournment Mr Kennedy said that since their last meeting they had lost their Chairman and by his death the Board had lost its second Chairman within twelve months.

Everyone knew Deputy Morrissey was a man who was willing to do a turn for anyone who asked him and I wish to second the resolution of sympathy.

Mr McGrath associated himself with the expression of sympathy.

Mr Kyne—I wish to be associated with the vote of sympathy in a special way. Deputy Morrissey and I were colleagues on a number of Boards and though we differed in politics we always got on well together and I found him a very fair and honest man.

The people of Dungarvan have lost a good representative by his death.

Mr P Butler—We all had our little differences in politics but we all agreed as best we could and while Mr Morrissey was Chairman here he always gave a fair crack of the whip to everyone.

Mr S J Moylhan, Co Manager, on behalf of the staff and officials associated himself with the resolution and said that it was only right to express the great sorrow which everyone felt at the late Chairman's passing.

Mr P Caulfield (Chairman) found Deputy Morrissey a most able Chairman and a good friend of the poor whom we look after on this Board. He was a great Deputy and though we had different politics I must say that among people of my politics he was a great favourite. It is a sad occasion for us here that a young man who did so much for his country has passed away at such an early age.

The resolution was then passed in silence all members standing.

## Sympathy With Co Manager

Mr Kennedy proposed a vote of sympathy to Mr Moylhan on the death of his mother and Mr McGrath seconded.

The Chairman said that this was the second sad event which the Board were dealing with. He said that since the Co Manager has come here he had become a great friend of all and now everyone was sorry at his sad bereavement.

Mr M Flynn Secretary associated himself with the resolution on behalf of the officials and staff.

Mr Moylhan thanked the Board for their kind resolution. The meeting then adjourned.

## West Waterford Divisional Board G. A. A.

Mr J.M. McGrath, Vice-Chairman presided at a meeting of the Western Board G.A.A. held at the Swan Hotel, St. Davids, last Thursday night. Clubs represented were Dungarvan Modeligo Ballycoe, Lismore Finisk Rovers, Tourin Brickey Rangers Kilgobnet Sarsfield's School and the Dungarvan club. The meeting was held at 8.15 p.m. and lasted until 11.15 p.m.

Referees' Reports A number of referees reports covering recent championship matches were adopted.

Club name changed An application from the Bride Rovers Club to change the name of the club to Tallow Club by which it was formerly known was passed. It was stated that the reason for the change of name was to avoid any misunderstandings which might otherwise arise.

Transfers Challenged When the Secretary stated that the Board had received applications from clubs for transfers he said that before they were dealt with the Board should first decide whether they were in order or not. He said that according to the County Board Bye-Laws published in 1934 (and not seen since) transfers could only be considered for two months from the fixtures meeting.

Mr T Lannen (Dungarvan) pointed out that notice had been issued to clubs by the Board that all transfers should be in by April 2nd. In his opinion there should have been sufficient for all clubs.

The Secretary said that April 10th was the last day for transfers according to the Bye-Law but he pointed out that a number of these Bye-Laws had already been over-ruled by the County Board.

### New Whole-Time Irish Teacher Appointed

### Request For Compulsory Vocational Education In Dungarvan

Mr O'Keefe, Department Inspector Mr J Langan CEO and Mr R Johnson Clerk at tended.

Increased Salaries A circular from the Department of Education forwarding particulars for the payment of consolidated remuneration to (1) officers and servants in receipt of basic salaries plus bonus (2) those on inclusive salaries (3) temporary whole-time officers (4) allowance for additional qualifications or head-masters (5) new entrants (6) part-time teachers (7) special grants to Committees was considered by the Committee.

The particulars above referred to were not made available to the members of the Committee and it is not known what the increases are.

Mr Kyne referring to the particulars which were circulated to the members said that it appeared that the men with the lowest salaries were to get the largest increases.

An Fear Mor said that the man with the big salary has to spend more and his expenses are higher than those on a lower scale.

Mr Kyne—The grading of the percentages shows a peculiar mentality which I have not up to this time understood. The lowest paid people are being ignored and the only way to bring the thing to a head is to refuse to pass any of the increases. The County caretaker at Cappoquin School only works 40 hours a week and she is being ignored.

Mr Kyne—Well then in fairness to her the CEO should allow a certain number of hours to her.

Chairman—There are two of them looking after the school in Cappoquin and surely what she has to do does not take more than 3 hours each day.

Mr Walsh—There are 40 students and she has to do all the cleaning.

Chairman—There are not 40 students there or nothing like it. Tell me Mr Langan how many students are there.

CEO—There are 40. Chairman—But I want persons not names how many of the stamps are duplicated or triplicated.

Mr McGrath—How many hours per day is this woman supposed to work?

with Compulsory Vocational Training be applied in Dungarvan.

He said that 20 boys and from 15 to 20 girls would be available in the first year and that number could be managed in the school and by the present staff.

Mr O'Keefe said that the Department were pushing this matter so far he said that Part V of the Act had only been applied in the Urban Area of Dungarvan and suggested that it be pointed out to them that no new building and no extra staff would be required.
