Annual Corpus Christi Procession

CROWDS PAY HOMAGE TO EUCHARISTIC KING

The Annual Corpus Christi Procession was held through the streets of Dungarvan on Sunday last and over one thousand people participated. A morning of heavy and frequent showers did not augur well for the occasion but the evening became beautifully fine with sunshine and fresh breezes and God certainly blessed the occasion with ideal conditions.

At about 2.45 p.m. a large contingent from the Abbeyside accompanied by Rev. Fr. Roche, P.P. and Rev. Fr. M. Power, C.C. marched to join the main body of the procession drawn up along Mitchell Street outside the Parish Church. At about 3.30 p.m. they passed through the Holy Eucharist borne in a beautiful monstrance by Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., who was assisted by Rev. Fr. Deane, P.P., Brisbane and Rev. Fr. Mulvey, P.P., Dungarvan. The procession proceeded under the canopy left the Church and the procession commenced.

The processionists followed the usual route as in former years and they sang hymns accompanied by the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band and recited rosaries alternately along the entire route. The procession marched along Mitchell Street turning right down White Horse Road and along O'Connell Street to the Square where Benediction was given.

The huge crowd drawn up on the Square with hundreds lined the route. The host in silent adoration as the Sacred Host was raised in Benediction. A Guard of Honour of members of the Guild of St. Thomas under Supt. P. O'Mahony marched at each end of the canopy. At 4.15 p.m. the salute was sounded by the trumpeters of the Brass and Reed Band.

Having formed the procession and up Church Street and returned to the starting point where Benediction was imparted. After the Benediction the huge crowd joined in singing "Faith of Our Fathers".

Interesting Point Raised In Road Transport Case

Sentence In Larceny Case

Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr. Eamonn O'Riain, D.J. at the Court House Dungarvan on Tuesday last.

In the adjourned case in which James Whelan Carrigroe was charged by Superintendent P. O'Mahony with the larceny of a sum of money and a wallet from Francis Ahearne Knockmaun.

Mr. Morrissey, solicitor for defendant said that his client was still very ill and unable to pay back the £1 compensation still outstanding. He said that in the case was adjourned for one month more that it would be definitely settled for the next court and he fulfilled amount paid up.

Supt. O'Mahony said that his authorities were becoming impatient as the case was dragging on so long and he suggested that his Worship make an order that defendant pay up within 2 or 3 months.

His Worship then made an order sentencing defendant to one month's imprisonment with hard labour not to be enforced if he pays the full amount of compensation within the month.
