Cork Fieldcraft Foils Great Waterford Bid.

THRILLING GAME WITNESSED BY 17,000 SPECTATORS

WATERFORD MINORS AVEGE SENIORS DEFEAT

S H.—Cork, 3—10, Waterford, 1—5

THE turning point of last Sunday's Munster Senior Hurling Semi-Final at Clonmel came as the second minute's overtime was being played, when Joe Kelly, Cork's flying forward, who had been well and closely marked all through the game by the Abbesside youth, Johnny O'Connor managed to elude his "shadow" to race through the Waterford defence in a spectacular 50 yards sprint with the sliotar on his hurley to finish a brilliant move with a magnificent goal which gave Jim Ware absolutely no chance between the sticks. Up to this Waterford, though they never managed to get in front of the champions, were placed in a good position to bring off a surprise victory.

The day was ideal for the games and a crowd of 17,000 swelled the Clonmel pitch to capacity and just before the minor game was due to start the sideline had to be closed. The Waterford minors certainly gave a convincing display in disposing of the fancied Cork side and Flannely, Fives, Grimes, Hugh and O'Connor were outstanding. The senior game opened rather slowly and it appeared as if Cork were set for an easy victory but an early switch in the Waterford defence brought fresh life to the Deise men who from then on to within a few minutes of the end hurled with a rare abandon. Capt. Vin Baston (Remount) at centre-field did more than one man's share to clinch the issue in favour of Waterford and had the forwards been able to turn his services to better account the result would have ended on a different note but Donovan Lott and Young proved an almost impregnable half-line of defence for Cork and neither Hoban, Feeney or Riordan had the trust or craft to pass such wily and experienced backs.

The Waterford defence was equally good and Keane Johnny O'Connor and Mick Hayes gave an excellent account of themselves and managed to subdue the Riordan brothers and Joe Kelly. Mick Hayes also had a good game and his brilliant clearances eased many dangerous situations. As of the Waterford's main weakness was in attack but it would have indeed taken great forwards to beat the solid defence of the Corkmen. The game was much better and the long-team plugging score for Joe Kelly towards the end and Cork had a succession of brilliant hurling marked several stages of the game which was a typical Munster championship tie and although Waterford have gone under once again they did so in gallant fashion. The home supporters were compensated by a very convincing win by the minors and these victories give us hope for future championships as from the minor series we have hope for a team of champions in the years to come.

The Game
Cork pressed from the throw-in but Riordan sent wide and a further Cork attack was relieved by a free to Waterford which Keane sent well down the field. The ball was returned and Christy Ring beat Andy Fleming but Jim Ware brought off a brilliant save and cleared well. Another Cork attack was initiated by Jack Lynch but Johnny O'Connor was sound in the Waterford defence. A Waterford attack started by Baston was broken up by Paddy Donovan and after seven minutes play Cork had their first point when from a free Willie Murphy sent to Christy Ring and the marksman sent the ball sailing between the uprights in masterly fashion. Cork had another win and Jack Lynch was injured but resumed before Cork had their second point per Joe Kelly in the 11th minute.

At this stage the Waterford selectors saw that a switch was needed in defence and Carrow (centre-field) changed with Kevin O'Connor (right half-back). A few minutes later another Waterford positional change was made when Hayes came out to the wing. Ring and Fleming went to the wing. After 17 minutes Cork had their third point from a free by Ring. Despite vigorous onslaughts by the Waterford forwards the Cork defence held solid and no score could be registered. Jim Ware brought off another typical save when Derry Riordan tried to rush the ball to the net. A short time later Baston was just wide with a nice

shot from a free and in the 24th minute Condon sent to Ring who had Cork's 4th point. A minute later Waterford supporters were cheering to the echo as Baston opened the scoresheet with a grand point and two minutes later Baston again pointed from a pass by O'Connor. In the 28th minute Ring had the champions fifth point but the Waterford defence were not to be denied and Baston had the home side's 3rd minor. At this stage of the game Waterford were on the upgrade and were hurling the Corkmen all over the field but the solid wall put up by the Cork defenders could not be breached and the half-time score saw Cork 12 points up with

On resuming Waterford broke away but Feeney sent wide and the return of play saw Ring pointed the free. A minute later Baston negated with a point from a twenty-five yards free. Another Cork raid in which Healy was prominent was cleared by the Waterford defence. Jackie Good and Baston had hard luck with a grand shot from centre-field. Shortly afterwards Good was called on again to defend and he cleared the ball well out the field. A free to Cork taken by Young was cleared by Hayes but the ball was returned and Jim Ware was again sound and the ball cleared into the centre-field. A free to Waterford on the 40 yards was sent wide by Baston. In the ninth minute of the second half the golden opportunity Ring broke clean through the Waterford defence and receiving one of Murphy's long-puck-outs and Cork defenders cheered and clapped as the green flag went up. Within a minute O'Connor was on the other foot as the Waterford men went on the move from Jim Ware's equally long delivery and Ned Daly finished the move by slamming to the net to beat the Cork defence.

After 14 minutes a close in free to Waterford saw Baston try for a goal but the Cork defence once again proved too hard a nut to crack and the ball was cleared. Four minutes later Cork had another point per Derry Riordan and within two minutes Baston sent a cut-in to Mickey Feeney who sent over the bar to close the margin to 2 points once again. At this stage Carew went off and Stephen Curran came on and Cork had a replacement five minutes later when Healy went off and O'Connor came on. One of the smartest moves of the match came towards the end when a free to Cork was taken by Ring. Instead of hitting the ball goalwards Ring passed across the field to Jack Lynch who was unmarked and Lynch had no difficulty in driving over the bar. A minute later Ring had a further point from another free but four minutes after Joe Kelly put in the spectacular run which ended in a goal and definitely dashed the hopes of a Waterford victory. This score was followed by another Cork goal from Ring's stick and the same player scored a further point before the long whistle to leave the final scores as state.

At the annual meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Saturday last Mr P. R. Power outgoing chairman was unanimously re-elected for the coming year. Mr Michael O'Ryan Vice-Chairman was also unanimously re-elected. There were four scholarships awarded to boys and two to girls according to a letter from the Department as follows: Mr James J. O'Shea Waterford were appointed to adjudicate in the scheme of prizes for cottages and small farms. Bread Rations For Farm Workers

In reply to the Committee's resolution regarding increased bread rations for farmers and farm labourers the Department of Industry and Commerce wrote that the rations were now available for those who reside 2 miles from their place of work and who receive no meals from their employers. Mr Heskin said that there should be increased allocations of bread and tea made available to farmers during the harvest period, otherwise the men would leave at 6 p.m. and could not be able to save the harvest.
