**West Waterford Divisional Board G. A. A.**  
**Meeting Of Objections Committee**

Mr P Ryan Chairman presided at a meeting of the West Waterford Divisional Board G. A. A. Objections Committee at Egan's Hotel on Thursday night of last week. The other members of the Committee present were: McGrath, W. Cotter, M. Flives, J. O'Donnell and M. Curran. **Old Parish Object To Dungarvan**  
 Old Parish Club in a three-point objection objected to Dungarvan being awarded the junior football match played at Old Parish on June 15th. The objection was (1) That sixteen players played for Dungarvan for a period of the game until the referee stopped the game and ordered a player off (2) That a player played with Dungarvan and previously with Cahullians v Pearse at Loughdon (3) That a decision of the referee was wrong.  
 J. Hourigan for Old Parish said that during the course of the game a Dungarvan player was taken down injured and a substitute came on. While they were changing jerseys the ball came up and both men played the ball. Chairman—Was there any score recorded from this play?  
 J. Hourigan—There was no score then.  
 P. Butler (for Dungarvan)—Didn't the only score after that come from a free?  
 J. Hourigan—That's right.  
 The Chairman in reply to P. Butler said that there was no thing in the report of the referee about 16 men playing in the match.  
 The Chairman ruled out points 2 and 3 as no name or date was given and the decision of the referee referred to was not stated.  
 On point one the Committee by 5 votes decided not to uphold the objection and confirmed Dungarvan as winners of the match.  
**Finnisk Rovers Object To Kilgobnet**  
 Finnisk Rovers junior football club objected to Kilgobnet being awarded the junior football championship match which they won at Aglish on June 15th. The grounds of the objection were—(1) That William and Patrick Flynn of Kilgobnet were ordered off the field at Dungarvan on Dec 8th 1946, and were not reinstated (2) That Donal Mullane, who was playing with the Legion (Killarney) against Dingle in the Kerry Football Championships in 1946 and also with Lisivigeen football club Co. Kerry.  
 At the outset the Chairman said that no referee's report of the game had been received but the committee decided to hear the evidence.  
 P. Landers (Kilgobnet) objected to the hearing of the objection as no report of the match had been received. He also objected to J. McGrath sitting on the objection committee during the hearing of the case as he claimed that J. McGrath was a member of the Finnisk Rovers Club.  
 J. McGrath said that he was not a member of the Finnisk Rovers Club.  
 P. McCarthy for Finnisk Rovers said that point one of the objection spoke for itself and the records of the Board would show if the players concerned had been re-instated or not.  
 P. Landers objected to P. McCarthy representing the Finnisk Rovers Club and stated that McCarthy was not a member of that club.  
 P. McCarthy said that he was a member of the club and returned home from his work in West Cork and East Kerry each week.  
 The Chairman on looking up the minutes of the Board meetings stated that the re-instatement of W. Flynn had been recommended and that the re-instatement of P. Flynn S. Tobin (Kilgobnet) said that this player's re-instatement had been automatic and before they played in the County Finals the Divisional Secretary had told them that both players were all right.  
 P. McCarthy dealing with point 2 said that it also spoke for itself. D. Mullane who was a Kerry man and a student in Mount Melleray had played with Kilgobnet and they would produce evidence to prove that he played in the Kerry Co. Championships in 1946. He asked for permission to be allowed to call a witness.  
 The Chairman said that he did not think this could be allowed as no date or venue had been given in point 2 and the defending club got no chance of preparing a case.  
 P. McCarthy referred to the rule which stated that a man who plays in one county needed a transfer before he could play in another.  
 The Chairman said that as that was the rule under which the objection was brought he would allow the witness to be called.  
 P. McCarthy then called E. Walsh and the latter stated Mullane and he had both been students at Mount Melleray and he knew him well. Before coming to Mount Melleray Mullane had been at St. Brendan's, Killarney.  
 Walsh said that he saw Mullane playing with Kilgobnet at Aglish, on June 15th.  
 P. McCarthy then handed in a

**Officially headed East Kerry Board and signed "Seas O'Senghad" secretary which stated that D. Mullane now a student at Mount Melleray played with Lisivigeen in the Kerry Championships in 1946.**

P. Landers said there was no evidence as to where or when the player was supposed to have played.  
 S. Tobin handed in a letter from D. Mullane which stated that he had never played with Legion (Killarney) in championship matches or that he was an illegitimate member of the G. A. A. who had played with Kilgobnet.  
 The representatives of the interested clubs then withdrew and the Committee conferred on the points raised.  
 The Committee decided to allow J. McGrath to sit on the Committee while the matter was being decided.  
 On point number 1 the Committee decided to defer the matter until the attendance of the Secretary who was unavoidably absent.  
 On the second point it was decided that the question of playing with the Legion did not arise but the Committee decided as to Lisivigeen to accept the letter of the East Kerry Board Secretary, and therefore to uphold the objection. This decision was made by 5 votes to 1.

**Eire Oge Object To St Anne's**  
 A 5 point objection by Eire Oge (Dungarvan) to St Anne's (Killmacshomas) was adjourned as most of the points required reference to the referee's report and list of players which had gone to the Munster Council on an injury claim.

Before a large crowd at Lismore on Sunday last Kerry had a convincing victory over Tipperary in the junior football semi-final. In the last few minutes, Tipp made their final dash when Devereux had a point and Tobin scored a goal to leave the final scores as above.

**Views Of Our Readers**  
**ORGANISE—OR DIE**  
**(To The Editor)**

The following statements are taken from the leading article in one of our Dublin newspapers. Apparently it was found more profitable to export the harvest of the sea to Britain during the war than to market it at home.  
 From a monetary standpoint it is found less profitable. Why was it done? Why was it permitted?  
 The Emergency Powers Order of the 9th 12 44, fixed the price of herrings and mackerels at 56/- a cwt for the wholesaler in 1945. 22,228 cwt of herring and 47,747 cwt of mackerel were exported to Britain valued at 23.9 and 35.9 cwt respectively. The average price of herring averaged 17/9 a cwt and 12/6 a cwt respectively. It was therefore much more profitable to sell herring and mackerel at home than to export them. Why were Irish fishermen's prices so low?  
 Irish retailers denied the sale of 20% of the total herring catch (exported) and 50% of the total mackerel catch (exported) to the detriment of the Irish consumer.  
 "The decline in Irish fish exports is not due altogether to an increased home demand, it is largely caused by the increased output of the British fishing industry and it is a welcome change." Is it a change? Is it welcome?  
 In 1937 Eire imported 136,978 cwt of British fish valued at £216,810. In 1938 133,458 cwt valued at £225,838.  
 What are our imports from the starving (?) British valued at today? According to Press reports of the 31/7/47 all herring landed off our south and east coasts are to be canned at satisfactory (?) prices for the fishermen, and Department officials have given the canning industry the benefit of the doubt. The price of these cans have been fixed in advance by the Emergency Powers Order of the 13/7/47 at 1/8 each for 14 oz of herring. The price of 14 oz of herring for fishermen? Why? They will be fortunate if they get 1d a lb. Pre-war they got 3d a lb. Bureaucracy's wholesale price for herring is 1/8 a lb. Why? Why judge by reports which are masterpieces of deception? The Department of Agriculture is prepared to pay bonuses of £5 to owners (at the time of inspection for licence) of non-pedigree Shorthorn bulls calving within the period 1st July, 1946 to 31st December, 1946, provided that such bulls are found on inspection to be suitable for licensing purposes and are the progeny of:

(a) Registered Non-Pedigree Dairy Shorthorn cows having a certified milk yield of not less than 7500 lb and butter-fat yield of not less than 260 lb. and

(b) Registered Dairy Shorthorn bulls (pedigree or non-pedigree) whose descendants have a certified milk and butter-fat yield of 7500 lb and 260 lb respectively

The object of the Scheme is to encourage the retention for breeding purposes of licensed bulls of good milking strain
