In boiling heat a record crowd for an All-Ireland semi-final saw Cavan beat Roscommon by 2-4 to 0-6 in the Senior Football Championship at Croke Park on Sunday. Cavan thus qualify for the trip to New York where they will play the winners of Kerry (holders) v Meath who contest the second semi-final at Croke Park next Sunday.

**BALLYDUFF NEWS**—Weather—During the night of 1st and 2nd August a very violent thunderstorm broke over this district accompanied by torrential rain. The evening was a mumble of distant thunder could be heard and about 11 p.m. the storm arrived in real earnest and the flashes of lightning and crash of thunder was terrifying. The more terrifying still was the sheet of rain which seemed to threaten to wash away the earth. The mountain streams came down in spate the amount of which has not been known before. Rivers were swept before the torrent and for the usually pretty stream which flows through Ballyduff village some of them over one ton weight were shifted and hundreds of tons of stones and gravel carried down to the river. Blackwater taking in their onward rush a concrete footbridge near the mouth of the Glen. The Araglan river also burst over its banks and did considerable damage to the Fermoyle-Ballyduff main road for some hours. Fortunately the heavy rain was only over a comparatively small area and the Blackwater did not come over its banks. However, like a river of mud for two days due to the amount of earth washed into it.

The damage done to roads leading from the mountains was very great and County Council employees were busily engaged on Saturday morning clearing stones, gravel and earth washed down the main road. Water traps in the village were unable to hold the volume of water and residents in the lower portion were up all night trying to keep the floods from their houses. These water traps have frequently been broken and something should be done to improve them. The sewerage outlet to the river does not appear to be as satisfactory as expected. Considering the size of the sewerage and drainage system here are comparatively new this should not be so.

It seems that our Summer has gone on a holiday and if it does not return soon the prospects for the harvest will be very poor. Believe it or Not—Although the map shows several Ballyduffs in County Waterford this is the one and only Ballyduff in the County. The parish extends into Counties Cork and Tipperary—the Dispensary District includes parts of the parishes of Fermoyle, Kilworth, Lismore and Tallow. The Garda Station and Tallow only 1 mile away is in the parish of Tallow. Our Railway Station is partly in County Cork and the majority of the children attending one of the parish schools, Ballyduff, comes from County Tipperary.

The postal address of the Ballyduffs include the name of some nearby town or village, such as Ballyduff-Kilmeadow, Ballyduff-Dungarvan, etc. but don't forget when writing here that the full address is Ballyduff County Waterford. It has been known to be delivered here without delay, containing the simple address, Ballyduff Ireland but of course the Postal authorities would not be pleased to have this latter practice encouraged.

**Brickey Rangers** 3-4, Newtown 1-10.

With a six-points lead at half-time Brickey Rangers looked all set to record a victory over Newtown in their senior football championship tie at the Gaelic field Dungarvan on Sunday last but a great second half rally by the Eastern men during which they scored a goal and 6 points to which the home team could only reply with 3 points, left the issue to be decided on another day.

The game was played under ideal conditions and attracted a good crowd despite many counter-attractions. Soon after Sergeant V. Aston (referee) had thrown in the ball the Brickeys went into the attack and had registered 2 goals before the Newtown men had time to settle down. These early scores which would have demoralised another team, only put the Newtown men on their mettle.
