A deputation of three farmers from the locality were introduced by Mr J Butler who stated that the men wanted the road at Currahaha which was in a terrible state of repair.

Legal Opinion On Liability To Repair Broken Gullet

Mr M F Walsh introduced Mr O'Donnell Lyre East Melleary Cappoquin and said that the man came before the Council in connection with a gullet which had been broken at the entrance of his boreen by a County Council engine and had not since been repaired.

He said that the gullet was there for convenience for those going down the boreen but it should have been constructed in such a way as not to be affected by traffic.

Mr Kyne—The position is that the County Surveyor has already given his opinion that the Council are not liable for the repair of the gullet and he cannot go back on that. I think the best thing is to refer the matter to our legal adviser.

DAEAREACT PAINTING
The great pictorial art of the early Christian period, the illuminated Manuscripts, may perhaps have been a reflection of mural paintings now vanished. The portraits of the Evangelists and the scale of the crucifixions of Duivillium and Iniskea, show that Irish artists were accustomed to life-size compositions drawn on a flat surface. The medieval wall paintings at Abbey Knockmoy, Holy Cross, and Clare Island show that by the 14th century, Irish painting had evolved from stylised book illumination to naturalism. The subsequent years of turmoil and misery effectively prevented further development.

Centuries later when Irish artists began to paint again, they looked to Italy, France and chiefly England to learn anew an art that had developed whilst they were occupied with the struggle for existence. Towards the end of the 18th century a period of social and economic liberty produced a brief spell of artistic endeavour. At the outset of the 19th century many Irish painters were driven abroad to seek reward and reputation. One of the founders of the Royal Academy was George Barret, R.A. Another member was Nathaniel Hone, R.A. James Barry was its first Professor of Painting, and Sir Martin Archer Shee was a President. Mulready, Maclise and others were thus lost to the country. Other brilliant Irish painters were O'Connor, the second Nathaniel Hone, Osborne, Lavery, Orpen and O'Brien.

(Continued from Page One) who asked that an increase be granted to two holders of Agricultural Scholarships at U.D.C. Ml Collier and James Allen both of Cappoquin, it was decided to increase the bonus of the scholarships from £30 to £40 making a total for each of £100.

Mr Kyne supporting Mr O'Ryan said that these scholarships should be sufficient to meet the all-in costs as otherwise the labourer's son could not compete with the children of those with an income. He said that the aim should be to educate the best brains at the Council's expense.

Mr O'Ryan agreed that the amount of the scholarship should be sufficient to meeting the entire cost even if it meant reducing the present number of scholarships.

Mr J Butler - I would not agree with reducing the number as you must give a fair crack of the whip to everybody and there is the means test to regulate the allowances.

Mr Hartly suggested that the decision of the County Manager to impose a penalty of £5 on each of three candidates who did not pass their examination with honours this year be reduced to £1.
