**Manager's Orders**

The following were among a number of orders made since the last meeting—

**Quantity Surveyor For Abbeyside Housing Scheme**

That in accordance with the recommendations of the Acting Borough Surveyor Messrs O'Connell and Harley 50 South Mall Cork be appointed and that they be notified that work is to be put in hand as soon as possible.

**Appointment of Temporary Clerk**

That Miss Eileen Hayes Garrynager be appointed temporary clerk typist in the Town Clerk's Office at £2 10s per week.

**Ferry Boat**

The Harbour Master reported that three ferriesboats were engaged to the Cunliffe and that the boats were safe only in favourable weather and provided that they carried only a reasonable number of passengers. He recommended that the Council provide a ferry boat capable of carrying forty passengers that a suitable landing place be provided at the Cunliffe and a shelter erected there.

The Order made was that the Harbour Master be directed to give the necessary supervision to the operation of the existing ferry boats with a view to ensuring that boats are not overcrowded and that the Town Clerk ascertain if Harbour Authority has jurisdiction over landing places at Cunliffe.

**Should Not Be Evicted**

Arising out of the minutes a discussion regarding Mr Begley's house in O'Connell Street which the owner wants to take over for his own use. The owner had been asked by the Council to have certain repairs carried out to this house but she replied stating that she proposed using the house in connection with her own business.

The Chairman said if the house was to be taken over by a business man it should be got for him by the owner before he is ordered to leave.

At this point the Clerk said that the letters received by the Council could not be carried out to the house until Mr Begley was out of it.

The Chairman said there was no chance of a house being taken over by a business man. He said that the present house occupied by Mr Begley was a good business centre and just suitable for his business.

Mr Kelly expressed the same views and stated that this was just an excuse to get Mr Begley out of the house. If repairs were to be carried out by Mr Begley could shift from one part of the house to another until the job was finished. He said he always thought a householder could not be evicted while the rent was being paid.

The Chairman said there would be no objection if a house suitable to Mr Begley's business was secured for him but if not then it should be arranged to have the repairs carried out without having him to leave the house.

**Public Lavatories**

A letter from the County Manager informed the Council that a report would be got from the Acting Borough Surveyor re the building of public lavatories in a suitable centre in the town.

It was pointed out that a lavatory would be needed for both sexes and the Council requested that their views be conveyed to the Manager.

**Bye Laws Governing Sale of Meat**

Mr Veale asked if there was any further developments in connection with the bye-laws governing the sale of meat, and was informed that nothing had been received from those concerned.

The Clerk said that the bye-laws would probably not be passed as the new Public Health Bill covered the sale of meat.

**Athy Resolution Adopted**

A resolution from the Athy Council asked for an increase in the Old Age and Widows' and Orphans' Pensions as Ministers and all others had received an increase in salaries which was not altogether a necessity.

Mr Veale said the increases should be reversed as those who did not need it got a large increase while those in desperate need of it got almost nothing. He proposed the adoption of the resolution.

The Chairman in seconding Mr Veale's motion said that the big salaries men more and those in need of it little or none.

The ancient Irish were well acquainted with the use of oak bark for converting hides into leather and its artistic ornamentation was considered a relatively important craft in early Christian and mediaeval periods. Owing to its perishable nature few examples have survived. Numerous articles were made, bottles for holding liquids, bags, wallets, corselets for soldiers in battle, shields and shoes.

Ornamental specimens of the latter are to be seen in the National Museum. The finest examples of artistic leatherwork are the "Polaris," or book satchels, in which the precious books were carried, or were hung upon the walls of the monastery "libraries." Many references to them appear in our ancient writings indicating that they were in general use and formerly numerous, although only three specimens are now in existence. The satchel of the "Breac Moedoig" in the National Museum, Dublin, the satchel of an Irish missal at Corpus Christi College, Oxford, and the very beautiful satchel of the "Book of Armagh" in Trinity College Dublin.

Ornamental leather book-covers, as distinct from the cumdachs or book-shrines in metal, were also made. Good examples of such bindings are the "Life of St. Columba" in the Franciscan Library, Dublin, and a copy of the "Gospel of St. John" in Stonyhurst College, Lancashire. During the period 1613 to 1800, book-binding in Ireland reached the highest peak of artistic perfection.


Canon O'Brien agreed with Dr Casey's remarks and promised the committee every help he could give.
