GAELIC NOTES SENIOR CLUBS
(By "TAORHLAINE")
ERIN'S OWN FANCIED FOR COUNTY HONOURS
SUNDAY'S SENIOR HURLING FINAL
CLONEA IN FINAL AFTER FORTY YEARS

Sweet Dungarvan town with Shandon Grounds scene of many a thrilling hurling encounter will be the scene of all eyes on Sunday next when Clonca reckoned the shock team of this year's championship through to a strong challenge to the champions, Erin's Own in the senior hurling county final. The game is creating county wide interest and at every corner and cross road of the historic Deolus Sunday's final is a chief topic.

Erin's Own on form are fancied to retain the title but I have a healthy respect for the Clonca men who more than one outing during the season impressed me by their earnestness and enthusiasm. It came as a surprise earlier in the year particularly for those who were enthusiasts to enter the senior hurling arena and few even the most ardent supporters of the wearers of green white visualised their favourites contesting the final. Their entry to the final is no flash in the pan and they proved in each outing a formidable combination with distinct possibilities. Clonca have a great hurling tradition behind them and often during the course of my travels old players recall to me past deeds of great men from famed in song and story Cluan Fild de B.

Away back in 1897 Ballytruckle won the first official Waterford Hurling Championship then came the Ballyduirn man in 1899 who took Co. Honours for the first time. Ballyduirn did not understand the difference between Clonca and the famed football locality of Rathgormack. In 1903 Clonca proper came into the limelight by winning the senior hurling championships again they were victorious in 1905 and they made it three in all in 1907. After a lapse of forty years Clonca are back again in search of further honours and it would be no surprise to see them take the Blue Riband on Sunday next.

In this year's championships Clonca accounted in mastery for the run of play in the first and second halves and on the whole they proved superior to the Western team. Next to fall by the wayside Bricky Rangers and then the fans sat up and began to take note of the new hitting team from Clonca who were intent on going places in the Western area final they met Dungarvan who were reckoned strong contenders for the title but Clonca in no uncertain terms trounced the Blues at the URS Intacta venue and their display on that day was easily their best and most impressive to date. From 1907 Clonca held the senior hurling title for 12 years until they were won by Dungarvan Meaghers Ferrybank which reminds me of Tom Heffernan Lisimore Young Irelanders and La Salle then came along at the time the youthful Erin's Own team who set up new records in county hurling competition by winning the senior hurling championships 1927 to 1932 in successive titles takes some beating and this record should stand for many a long day.

You have heard of Sean Oge's Rocks of Kilkenny's Tulla-roan Limerick's Young Irelanders and Waterford's Erin's Own. The last undoubtedly holds pride of place to all followers of Gaelic hurling and when they first won the title in 1927 Waterford hurling showed a marked improvement which in the years that followed bore fruit and today the Blues are equal to the best in the land. Few will disagree when I say Erin's Own put Waterford hurling on the map. I have often heard it said they picked up the best in town and country and it is quite in order to do the same.

Three years ago Erin's Own won their first title and the men who were the back-bone of the team in its infancy are today the leading lights. I mention Charlie Ware and Jim Ware Johnny Fanning, Nickey Fardy who are going as strong as ever. From 1935 to 42 Erin's Own had a lean period when they were awarded the championship over Lisimore on an objection and from 1942 to 1946 they were gradually introduced young blood who knitted well with the old stalwers when they again took the laurels in 1946.

In this year's competition they accounted for Butlerstown last year's junior champions and then came out best in the hurling game between themselves and Mount Sion their old rivals. The match played at Waterford was a real classic and after a thrilling near's hurling Erin's Own won their title by a small margin. The past and present record leaves them the form team but Clonca are to be accounted for and the challengers are not to be taken lightly.

In preparation for Sunday's clash Clonca have undergone a special course of training and from reports to hand they will line out on Sunday in very fine trim. The big task Dungarvan pitch will take some holding. Erin's Own are by no

Waterford Board of Public Assistance

Purchase of Residence For Clashmore Medical Officer

Working Hours of Nurses And Attendants

Mr T A Kyne Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Board of Public Assistance held in Dungarvan on Monday last.

Messrs J Butler P O Connor P Browne W Kennally Caulfield and M McGrath were present.

Messrs S J Moynihan Co Manager, D Sheedy, Co Surveyor and M Flynn Secretary were in attendance.

Residence for Clashmore M.O.
The Secretary stated that there was a report from the County Surveyor concerning the residence to be purchased for the medical officer to be appointed to Clashmore.

The Chairman stated that this matter had been before the Board at the monthly meeting and had been adjourned to have a report from the Co Manager to decide if the house to be purchased was the best possible one that could be got in the district.

Mr Butler said that the reason why it had been adjourned on the last occasion was that the matter had not appeared on the agenda at that time and the members resented the fact that the Secretary had produced a resolution from nowhere asking for money without any prior notice having been given or any report on the matter having been made by anyone.

Manager—I am sorry that the reports on the matter were not placed before you the last day. The policy of the Board has always been to provide residences for the doctors wherever possible. In Clashmore there is need for such a residence and we have been looking for one for years and then this place turned up and was passed as suitable on the favourable report of the Surveyor. There was another place offered in the village but on that was not favourable to me. I agree that the house was too small for the requirements.

There are about 11 acres of land adjoining the house and the price of £2,000 for the house is not unreasonable. It will need repairs but with the cost of these included the price will be reasonable compared with prices at the present time.

The Secretary read a report from Mr N Dunne B.E. Assistant Co Surveyor dated July 10th which stated that he inspected Glebe House Clashmore and that the house was planned and structurally sound with no sign of dampness. The roof was not very sound and would need attention and the floors would need re-shedding. He estimated the cost of repairs including complete painting and re-decoration at £1,500.

A report from the Co Surveyor stated that he also had inspected the premises and agreed with Mr Dunne's report. He considered the house good value at £2,000 and gave the value of £1,200 for the improvements. It was further stated that all repairs need not be carried out at once and the full cost of £3,500 was a reasonable figure for a doctor's residence.

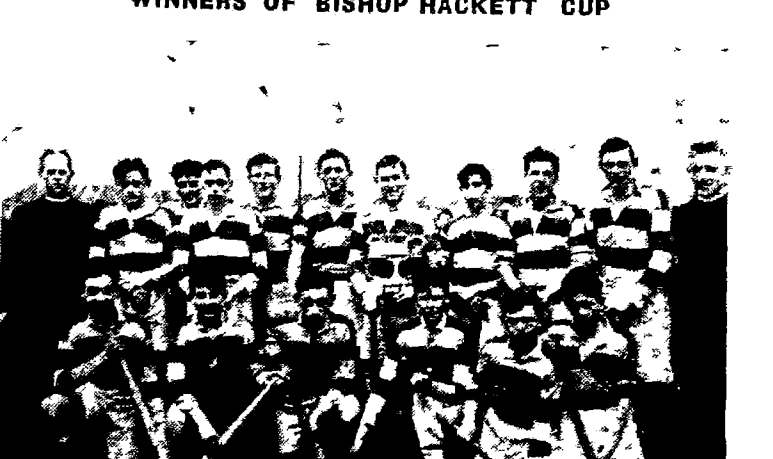
