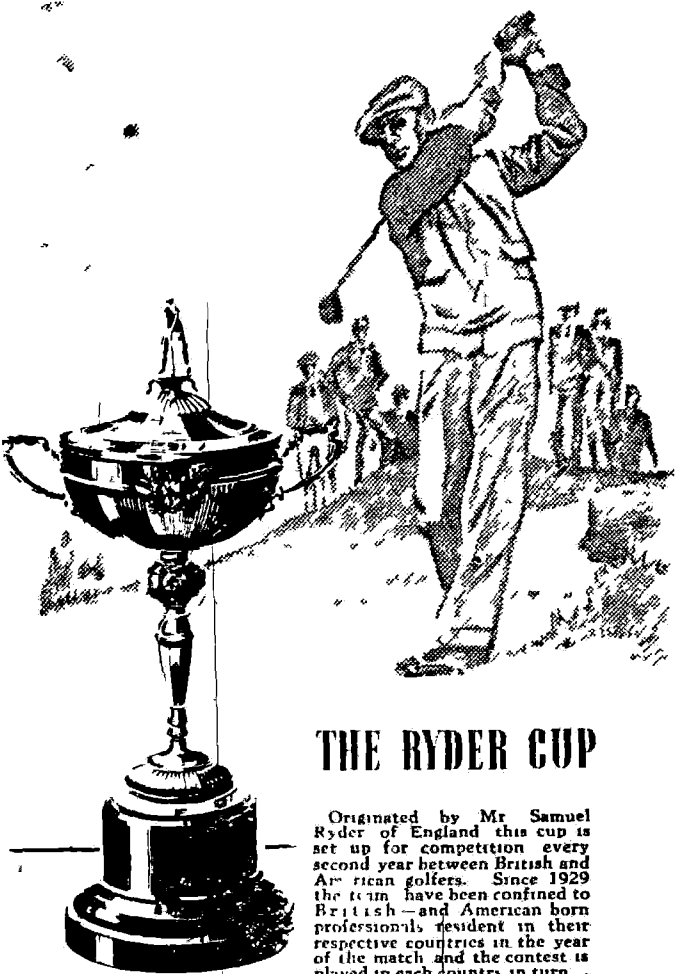

OUR WATERFORD LETTER

Death Of Mr. Patrick Mulcahy, Old IRA Man—I regret to chronicle the death of Mr. Patrick Mulcahy which occurred after a brief illness at his residence Ard Na Griene on the 30th Ult. The deceased who was aged 46 years was a native of Fenor where his late father and mother were engaged as National Teachers for many years and where his sister Miss Alice Mulcahy is at present in charge of the Girls N.S. The late Mr. Patrick Mulcahy joined the IRA while a lad in his teens and subsequently took a prominent part in the fight for Irish Freedom. During the war against the Black and Tans, he was attached to Coy. 5th Batt. Waterford Brigade and Southern Division being taken part in many engagements he was captured by British Forces in May 1921 and was sentenced by a British Court-martial to 2 years imprisonment. Mr. Mulcahy was a recipient of a 'Cogadh Na Saoiríe' Service Medal for activities in the Anglo-Irish War. He served for a period of 25 years in the National Army and retired recently owing to ill health with the rank of Coy. Quarter-Master Sergeant. A large concourse of sympathisers attended the funeral obsequies at Fenor on Sunday last, the deceased being laid to rest in the district and several of his old comrades in arms.

News From Sliabh gCua

Harvest Yields—At Sliabh gCua and surrounding districts threshing operations are now being completed. Reports of the different yields of wheat and oats have been found to be satisfactory. In some instances farmers had only half the yield this year in comparison with that of last year. The production of the same acreage but there are exceptionally good yields with other farmers in the district. One small farmer in Touraneena produced 16 bags of oats per acre. Potatoes which are generally a good crop in the district are dry and splendid for table use but the crop is considered to be not as productive as last year.

Labour Meeting

In view of the many conflicting and intricate reports circulating throughout Dungarvan and many parts of West Waterford regarding Mr. T. A. 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Making The Revival Of The Language A Joyous Thing

Portlargo's Lead To Ireland (By "TOMAS") "If we can make the revival of the language a joyous thing it will succeed." —Irish Press 30.6/47 The above concluding sentence in a leading article entitled "Good Work" (regarding some Gaelic League branches in Dublin holding open-air summer entertainments) is the truest one that was ever penned about the revival of the Irish language. It represents the conviction of the writer after forty years work as a practical enthusiast. Waterford has given a lead to Ireland in popularising community singing of Irish songs and making the study of the language "a joyous thing". Five years ago a Claisceadail Group was inaugurated in the city. The activities of Claisceadail Portlargo have been maintained with regularity. Rehearsals have been held weekly attended by one hundred or so young people during the Sessions from September to June. The Claisceadail Group of Portlargo have been given and congratulatory letters with requests for the music and words of songs have been received from many parts of the country and G.A. Clubs will be held at Exiled Gaels in London Liverpool and Glasgow also sent their words of praise. There were numerous requests from Donegal to Cork and from Galway to Dublin for Amhrann Clann na hEireann that splendid rallying song of the Gael written by "An Craobhinne Aolbhin" and wedded to a Marino Dances air break rehearsal on March 11th 1947. It was followed (if Portlargo's example is followed) when the community singing of our Claisceadail Group will be amplified and the community song chorus of 1947 will be swelled into thousands of voices in an all-Ireland effort (in Croke Park) to thrill the Gaels at home and abroad with "An Ghaidhlinn Ar Agaidh". The Irish language has a vigorous life and that the slogan "Gaedhilge marbh Eire Balbh" has no meaning. I gave the music of the following song which was broadcast by Amhrann Clann na hEireann. Treasra na dTomta "Preab san Oil Cill Cail" and "Maidrin Ruac" Amhran a Dochas to Mr. M. P. Flannery of R.M.S.M. (Conductor of the Barrack Street Brass and Reed Band) who arranged them for his band. Played for the first time in the People's Park at a Band Recital in July 1947. The selection of Irish airs was enthusiastically applauded by a large gathering of citizens. In a programme of 15 items it was the most successful and popular. To familiarise our people with native melodies getting them to hit the catchy tunes, disposes them to look favourably on the Irish Revival as a joyous thing and not a morose and their moral and material support. Flannery (who is a very talented musician) told me that the Irish airs make the finest marching music in the world. It was proposed to hold a big open-air Gaelic Festival in Waterford City in July 1947 (on the same lines as the Dublin Festival) with pageantry and massed singing and dancing to the music of the Claisceadail Group. Owing to the sudden illness of our organiser the function had to be postponed. On Easter Sunday night 1947 a Claisceadail group in the Claisceadail Group in the Central Technical Institute (and attended by hundreds of leading citizens) was the finest demonstration of community singing of Irish melodies in the city since the never-to-be-forgotten Oireachtas Week in August 1917 when that supremely great artist An Rathaig Seamus O'Flaherty (Cork) led the "Sluagh-Amhrannuacht" nightly in the Theatre Royal.
