WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Consideration of Roads Scheme Estimate Adjourned

Probable Increase of 4/10 In £

Many Deputations Before Meeting

A special meeting of the Waterford Co. Council called primarily to consider the estimate of the County Surveyor for road works during the coming year was held at Dungarvan on Monday last.

Mr D Heskin Chairman presided at the early session and later Senator Butler Vice-Chairman. There was a large attendance of members.

Officials present included—Messrs S J Moynihan Co Manager D Sheehy Co Surveyor and Mr J G Dowling Secretary.

Deputations Stradbally Water and Sewerage Schemes

Mr Draper CC acting as a spokesman of a deputation representing the community of Stradbally said that they had no water or sewerage and that they were making representations for any community. He said the schemes were brought up about 10 years ago and £4,000 was set aside for them but they were postponed and nothing was done about them since then. They were now tired of being promised these schemes and hoped they would be started without delay.

Mr Caslin who also spoke said that the water which was passing through the village was contaminated. There was plenty of water available only to have it tapped.

Senator Butler said that every member admitted the necessity for the scheme and when the matter had been raised before the answer they got was that the scheme was high up in the priority list for the county.

Mr O'Ryan has already approved this scheme and the matter is in the hands of Prof Walsh the Consulting Engineer who has not yet reported on it. When he does the scheme can be put in hand.

The County Surveyor said that this report may be expected within the next month or so.

It was agreed that Professor Walsh be asked to expedite the preparation of his report.

Road At Inchindrisla

A delegation stated that this road was in a deplorable state and needed repairs badly.

Senator Butler Mr O'Ryan and Mr Kelly stated that they went over the road recently and it was the worst they ever saw.

It was stated that the road was not a County Council road and until it was taken over nothing could be done about it.

It was suggested that the Board of Works be asked to give a grant for the repairs and the County Council could then take it over and maintain it.

Mr Harty handed in notice of motion to this effect for the next meeting.

Ballinameela Water Supply

Rev F Murphy CC stated that water was badly needed at Ballinameela where seventeen families have at present to draw water a long distance in buckets.

The County Manager said there was a proposal to erect a pump there and he would look into the matter.

Road At Ballyduff

Acting for a large deputation from the area Father Murphy said that the road from Dower's Cross to Knocknaskaheha was in an awful condition. Nothing had been done to it for almost 40 years and the road was worn out. It was widely used by farmers and people going over to Mass on Sundays were splashed with mud which was not fair to them.

It was pointed out that the road was included in this year's scheme and estimated to cost £6,000.

The matter was adjourned for the general consideration of the estimate.

Dangerous Turn At Currabaha

Mr John Bove spokesman of a deputation asked the Council to remove the dangerous turn at Currabaha due to which they were presently deprived of the services of a creamery lorry.

The County Surveyor said that this job would be easy and would cost from £400 to £500.

Finally it was agreed that the turn be widened on the inside at a cost of £100.

Road At Kilgobnet

Mr O'Ryan the Assistant Co Surveyor told Senator Butler that patch work was done on this road recently and its condition was now fairly good.

Road Fund Grants

The Secretary stated that the Council had not yet been officially advised as to the amount of grants available for this year's scheme.

Mr O'Ryan said that it was an extraordinary thing that the Department were so slow in advising the Local Authorities of such grants.

The Manager said the Council could act on the assumption that the grants would be the same as last year.

DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

SHORT PROCEEDINGS

Mr Eamonn O'Riain DJ held the fortnightly Dungarvan District Court on Tuesday last and the proceedings were concluded within half an hour of the commencement of the court.

School Attendance Act
 Nicholas Power Wolfe Tone Road Dungarvan was fined 2/6 on each of two summonses brought under the above Act in respect of two children. Guardian Farrell who was complainant said that the cases had been adjourned for three months to see if the attendances would improve in the meantime. In the 46 days intervening one child was absent 33 days and the other 30.

Youghal Bridge

Senator Butler reported on the outcome of a discussion which a deputation of which he was a member had with the Minister in Dublin on January 6th on the Youghal Bridge question and said that the Minister was prepared to do what he could to content themselves with the assurance that the Minister would consult the deputation again before doing anything.

In reply to a question the Co Surveyor said that the condition of the bridge had not deteriorated materially since the last report.

A letter from CIE stated that there was no justification for the erection of shelters on the bridge for bus passengers.

Ararlin Bridge

The County Surveyor reported that this bridge had been constructed in 1894 and that extensive repairs had been carried out in 1931. Two years ago the central pier was undermined and collapsed and could only be used now by light traffic.

Repairs to put the bridge in order would cost £1,000 but he advised that a new single span bridge be erected.

Mr Quirk said the people in the locality were in a desperate way out there over the bridge and something should be done at once to get the matter under way. He asked how long would it take.

Chairman (Mr Butler)—About 5 or 6 years (laughter).

Mr Quirk—That's no joke as I believe it will take that time. Chairman—Oh I'm not joking. Manager—I don't think it will take that time.

Mr O'Ryan—What would be the cost of a new bridge.

Co Surveyor—About £3,000.

Finally the County Surveyor's report was adopted.

Ardkean House

Concerning the purchase and reconstruction of Ardkean House as a County TB Hospital the Department in reply to a letter from the Manager stated that they were not prepared to give a grant to exceed 75 per cent of the total cost.

All the members expressed their gratification at the very fine grant secured by the Manager but Mr Harty while congratulating the Manager said he was disappointed that the grant was not 90 per cent as had been given to other counties for similar schemes.

The Manager said he would inquire into the point raised by Mr Harty.

IRISH COURSING CLUB'S STATEMENT

The Greyhound Breeding Industry is one of National Importance It directly concerns the breeders of greyhounds who are mainly farmers and workers It indirectly benefits all the people by bringing in over one million per annum for exports, with no outlay on the purchase of foreign raw materials machinery etc as in practically all other industries Exports are of vital importance to the nation and the people The adverse balance of trade in the first nine months of 1947 was £64 593 210 No country could remain solvent for long under such an excessive burden

The Minister for Industry and Commerce has stated that the position is very grave and notwithstanding the fact that the export industry is threatened with extinction Examine the official trade returns from 1st January to 30th September 1947

Net amount of exports £1 958 828 Greyhounds exported 849 394 The figure for greyhounds does not include greyhounds accompanied by the owner or purchasers (our most valuable stock) or greyhounds brought over the Border to race or for sale so that the official figure does not represent our actual export trade One million pounds is considered as a conservative figure for Eire alone and if the North were included the export trade figures would be considerably more

Greyhound Racing in Great Britain has very adversely affected the value of our stock would be much higher It can be fairly assumed that if the horses of all other breeds exported were separated from bloodstock the actual revenue from thoroughbreds would not be much more than greyhounds That being so may not those concerned with the industry and the sport with good reason ask for fair consideration and a square deal for the people they represent

The Irish Coursing Club has established a great national opinion and religion within national reputation Its members are of all shades of political opinion and religion within the four seas of Ireland It has never asked for subsidies or grants It has not cost one penny to the ratepayers or taxpayers of Ireland It is an example of what self help and combined effort and enterprise can accomplish That it makes bureaucratic boards or government controls appear failures by comparison is its sole offence

On several occasions during the past fifteen years deputations appointed by the Irish Coursing Club have interviewed Ministers of the Government and requested their co-operation in the following matters— The Preservation of Hares Similar facilities for the protection of hares to those given to the preservation of Feathered Game That the Protection of Hares Order (Game Preservation Act 1930) be put into operation in the vicinity of Coursing Clubs Preserves Reasonably Safe Transport Facilities for greyhounds and facilities to owners travelling with greyhounds Government requests were refused although members of the Government and supporters of the Government and supporters of the Party were members of the Standing Committee and on several deputations

Several appeals were made to remove the Entertainment Tax and grant a licence for the Totalisator on similar lines to horse racing (which does not debar Bookmakers from betting), so that the profits arising would be available for the sole benefit of owners and the greyhound breeding industry The answer to the more recent appeal was to increase the Entertainment Tax 100 per cent in 1947 and to the last and final appeal to make a further increase in 1948 making the Tax so extortionate as to practically make it impossible for the sport to be carried on
