## Rate Increase of 2/4 in £

£9,972 DEMAND ON DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL

### LOCAL AND NATIONAL TAXATION TOO HIGH

At last Monday's Estimates Meeting of the Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan at which Mr. D. Heskim, Chairman, presided, a rate of 20/11d in the £ was determined. This shows an increase of 2/4d over last year's figure. The demand on the Dungarvan Urban District Council under the general rate is £8,970 and for roads £1,002 being a total of £9,972

#### Road Works Scheme

Dealing with the Provisional Road Works Scheme the County Surveyor (Mr. D. Sheedy) said that the one item outstanding not already dealt with by the Council was the demand on the Urban District Council of Dungarvan. The total of this demand under five heads he gave as £3,500. Senator J. Butler said that this was an extraordinary demand and in his opinion was excessive and was one which he believed could not be paid as it would mean an increase on the Urban rates of 6/4 over last year's figure which was 26/- in the £. He pointed out that by this demand the Urban Council must strike a rate for their own services which would more than likely show an increase also. He asked the County Council to agree with him that some of the things which the County Surveyor said should be done should not be done. He said that the demand for Urban roads was not increased. In saying this Senator Butler stated that he believed that he was voicing the opinions of the people in Dungarvan that they did not want an increase in demand of 6/4 in the £ from the County Council. Chairman I suggest to the County Surveyor that he extend £1,000 on Dungarvan. Manager (Mr. S. Moynihan) £1,000 is very small. The County Surveyor said that the cost of maintaining and repairing roads would be needed to meet unemployment grants. Chairman Would you agree to £1,200? Mr. Butler That would mean 4d in £ increase in the Urban rate. Finally it was agreed that the demand be £1,200 but this was later reduced to £1,002 when it was stated that there was a credit balance of £198 in favour of the County Council. Giving the Road Works Scheme final consideration the Chairman said that if the estimates for roads excluding Councilors proposals were passed the rate would be 20/11d in the £. Senator Butler—Is the Whitechurch road included? Chairman—Could it be included by cutting down on other things? Manager—I don't think so. Chairman—Could a good repair be done on it? County Surveyor It doesn't lend itself to repair. It would need to be resurfaced. Senator Butler—I suggest we do a mile of it, what would that cost? County Surveyor—That could be done for £1,300. Chairman—The rate as it is is 20/11d. Mr. Norris—Could we do any other bit of the road? It is still high at that. We are living beyond our means altogether as local and national taxation is too high.

#### Abuses in Assistance Schemes

Dealing with the estimates from the Board of Assistance the Chairman said that he understood from certain members of the Council that Assistance Officers had been taking their books to be inspected by local Councilors despite an order from the Manager to this effect some time ago. He said that these books should be presented for inspection on request. Several members said that this was necessary as there was a feeling that people not entitled were getting home assistance. Mr. Quirk said that an extra allowance of 2/6 in the old age pension was also being abused in the same way. Mr. Power said that there should be a check on the system as under that people getting home assistance were drawing two quotas of bread. Mr. Roche stated that there could be also a big saving effected in the Footwear Scheme as some people were getting tread boots who were earning £6 a week. The Manager said that he would welcome any investigation into the Public Assistance Schemes by the local Councilors.

Mr. Quirk—I understand that Tramway will be urbanised and will have to pay public assistance there. Manager—Yes it will be a County Health charge. Chairman—It was decided to put the matter on the agenda for the next meeting. Chairman—We have gone away from the point under discussion. Senator Butler—We were on the Whitechurch road. Mr. McGrath—What was the rate last year? Chairman—18/6. Mr. Quirk—I think what's wrong is that there are too many deputations coming in here altogether. We were complaining that the Managerial Act took away our powers but I think that it's the deputations who are running the County now. We had six here the last day and every one of them wanted to raise the rates. They should be cut out altogether and let the matter to the Councilors and their business would be done. Mr. O'Ryan—The estimates have gone up in most counties and I suppose it's we must do the dirty work. Mr. Morrissey The feeling is that if the rates go beyond 22/- there will be an uproar but at 20/11d I think we are safe enough. Mr. Norris—It's like a cheap sale now with the 11d I think the whole thing is a racket and we should cut that 11d out altogether. Chairman—By providing money for the roads we are keeping men off the dock which is a most demoralising system. Mr. O'Ryan—The rates everywhere have gone up and an increase of 2/4 here is not too bad and if anyone else came here they couldn't do anything else but swallow it. Mr. Mansfield—We can strike a rate here but another thing is to collect it and I think we should make a headline by cutting out the Councilors' proposals which will make a reduction of 7/6. Mr. Quirk said that the Mocollop road should be done at any cost. Mr. Butler—What about the Whitechurch road? County Surveyor—We can't do much with it beyond the ordinary maintenance. Chairman—Including the discussion on the roads estimate. General Rate of 20/11d Determined. Presenting the estimates the County Manager stated—Mr. Chairman and members of Waterford Co. Council. I beg to submit the Estimates for 1948-49 for Waterford County Council the details of which have been circulated already. Since the preparation of the Estimates a circular has been received from the Department of Health clarifying the position as regards grants from the Consolidated Health Services and this would mean that in preparing the Estimates a sum of £6,083 by way of grant was over-estimated. The Secretary and the Accountant and myself have gone very carefully through the Estimates and have made certain adjustments to ensure that the rate for the year 1948/49 will not exceed the figure already circulated viz. 20/11 27/6d in the £. The General Rate is as stated—20/11 27/6d in the £—and this represents an increase of 2/4 5d over 1947/48 made up as follows—

In addition a credit of £4,000 was taken last year out of the Council's estimated credit which will not be available in the coming year and of course the Estimate includes the increased remuneration of the Staff. Within the past twelve months or so the County Council has authorised the purchase of machinery lorries, etc as required	

#### considerable amount has already

been purchased and paid for out of Revenue as and when supplies could be obtained. It will be necessary now in order to put the Council's finances in order in this regard to obtain a five year loan from the Council's Treasurers to cover the cost of these purchases and future commitments. Due notice will of course be submitted to the County Council regarding this matter. Since the Estimates were prepared a notification has been received from the Department of Local Government by telephone to the effect that the Seeds and Fertilizers Scheme will be authorised for the coming year. I recommend that this Scheme be embodied in the Estimates and a sum of £1,500 be included in the expenditure with a corresponding sum of £1,500 on the Receipts side thus involving no charge on the Rates. The Council has adjourned until this Meeting the amount to be provided by Dungarvan District Council for Urban Roads and in view of the very considerable inevitable increases under other heads in the demand from the County Council the latter body should now carefully consider what amount should be charged the Urban Council for the maintenance of the Urban Roads.

#### With regard to the letter from

the Department of Local Government re Separate Charges I am to state that if these were all made Health District Charges it would involve an increase in the general rate of 9/6d in the £ against that however the increased Agricultural Grant Abatement would amount to a reduction of 2/6d in the £ but the reduction would not of course apply to farm buildings, houses, etc. so that the minimum net increase would be 7d in £ on the General Rate. I wish to pay a tribute to the Secretary and Accountant for their painstaking efforts in presenting the details of the County Council's Estimates to the members of the County Council for the year 1948/49 and I assure the County Council that every effort has been made to keep the Estimate as low as possible commensurate with efficient service and I recommend it to the Council for adoption. Senator Butler—Is the turf account included in the estimate?
