FARM LABOURER'S BURIAL

Inquest Proceedings

The death of Mr James (Jamie) Power 34, Windgiver Dungarvan, agricultural labourer, occurred at the residence of his employer on Thursday night March 18th and an inquest into the circumstances surrounding his death was held by Dr D McCarthy Coroner at a jury at the Courthouse Dungarvan on Friday evening of last week.

Dr Williams witness said that he often served as much drunk to deceased before and without any bad effect on him. Egan, Manager of Egan Hotel, said that he saw John O'Donnell and deceased go into the bar at about 12.15 p.m. He saw them again at about 1.15 p.m. and deceased was sitting on a stool and appeared sober. He had a glass of whiskey in front of him and wanted to take it neat but witness put water in it. After drinking it deceased got off the stool and it was then that it would be seen not to be drunk and decided to get him off the premises. From the way he walked to the door witness said that he decided that it would be safer not to let him walk home alone. With Mr Mackey he helped to take him up the yard to the lorry. Witness said he again saw deceased that evening when Mr O'Donnell was putting him into the van.

Dr Cusack stated that he examined deceased at about 10 a.m. on March 18th when he was in a deep coma, his breathing was slow and he had an irregular and feeble and he was fairly deeply cyanosed (blue). His pupils were moderately dilated and there were no eye reflexes. There was a good deal of mucus in his nostrils and his bladder was distended. Witness said that he found it difficult to arrive at any conclusion at that time as regards his condition.

A number of applications from Show Societies for subsidies were next dealt with. Mr Conroy stated that the total amount to be allocated was £230. In reply to Mr Walsh the Chairman stated that the full amount had been disbursed last year.

Mr O'Ryan said that the subsidies should be given only to shows at Waterford, Dungarvan and Lismore. Dr D. T. McCarthy Coroner held resumed inquest into the cause surrounding the death of Thomas White, Ballyhane Cappoquin who died at the District Hospital Dungarvan on January 1st last. Medical evidence was tendered at the original sitting on Jan 2nd.

The jury was Messrs Jas Donovan (foreman) C. Quigley N. Casey J. Ducey M. J. Keane D. Casey.

Supt J. Creane Lismore conducted the inquest and the only fresh evidence was tendered by Guard J. O'Leary Cappoquin who deposed that with Guard Molloy he had a wound at the back of his head from which he was bleeding. Deceased appeared to be conscious at the time when witness asked him what happened deceased was incoherent and said "get that man who hit me." Witness had deceased conveyed to Dr White for medical treatment.

Witness went on to say he saw that at Cappoquin District Court on January 22nd a man was charged with having assaulted Thomas White on December 24th and the charge was dismissed. The Coroner said that the jury have already heard the medical evidence should return their verdict on that evidence as other matters arising from the incident had already been dealt with in another court.
