Dungarvan U.D.C.
Meeting Adjourns At Midnight
Rate Not Yet Adopted
Further Effort To Reduce Rate To Be Made

Mr T. McCarthy, Chairman, presided at the 10th anniversary meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council held on last Thursday night. Messrs M. Clancy, J. McGrath, J. Veale, T. Kyne, T. D., and Senator J. Butler were present.

Manager's Orders
Among the Manager's Orders made since the last meeting were (1) that the accounts with a circular from the Department of Local Government preference be given to ex-army men in the case of local appointments (2) that tender of O'Connell Clashmore at 50 for harvesting the plots fields at Abbeyside be accepted (3) that Mr J. Young Kilkenny be appointed to stocktake at the Council's yard (4) that the wages of workmen be increased by 10 weekly from Dec 1st 1948 and that they get two weeks annual holidays (5) that in the absence of the Manager on sick leave that Mr J. G. Dowling act as Deputy Manager (6) that rent arrears of £7 be written off in respect of the tenancy of 11 Loughmore and that no further rent be accepted from the present subscriber.

Mr Butler asked the reason for bringing a Kilkenny man to stock take in Dungarvan when plenty local men could do it. Clerk—It must be done by an outsider and it is more or less a specialised job.

Deputy Manager—Mr Young has been appointed to stock take here for the County Council too. Mr Butler—Who does it in Kilkenny? Deputy Manager—A Dungarvan man. Mr Kyne—What would he have to do—count shovels is it? that's not very specialised. Deputy Manager—The point is to have it done efficiently and quickly.

Mr Kyne—We resent an outsider coming in to do this job and protest against it as a local man could be got to do it as efficiently. Mr Clancy—I agree with that. It costs more to bring a man here from Kilkenny and it has to be met from the rates. It is spending money foolishly.

Mr Kyne—All we can do is to protest it is a Managerial function. The Clerk was directed to convey the Council's protest to the Manager. In reply to Mr Kyne who raised the matter of the writing off of the rent arrears in respect of 11 Loughmore the Clerk stated that it was occupied by a sub-tenant and under the Housing Regulations and in order to qualify for the subsidy a house must be relet under those regulations.

Mr Kyne said that if certain assurances were given 12 months ago the whole thing could be settled in accordance with the regulations and dealing with letting of houses he said that a precedent had already been created under which this case could be dealt.

Chairman—No one up there would want any one else to get that house. Mr Clancy—Things could have been made easy in this case and all the arrears paid off but they were not accepted.

Mr Clancy—I wonder does the Manager know the facts of this case? Chairman—He does. Mr Clancy—Then if these people are put out it is inhuman. Mr Kyne—Outside of that which is bad enough there will be a loss of revenue to the Council.

Clerk—When a house becomes vacant it must be advertised and on the recommendation of the Council the matter of letting is made by the Manager. Mr Clancy—But he can choose from the first three. Mr Veale—This is an exceptional case. Mr Clancy—While it is a thing that should not be allowed to recur I think there are special circumstances in this case. Finally the Clerk was instructed to recommend to the Manager the reconsideration of this matter.

paid on Council houses too it means you must actually get more than £41. Clerk—The valuation of the Council's houses is £1,188 and it realises in theory £4,195.0d. Mr McGrath—If on the effective rate brings in £41 and on houses £4,195.0d the total must be £45,195.0d.

The Clerk said that rent collectors' poundage and other items must be accounted for but with all he agreed that a 1d would realise about £44. Rate Estimates Again. Opening the discussion on the rates estimate for 1948/49 the total of which as given in our last issue was 33/- in £ Mr J. G. Dowling Deputy Manager said that the Co. Manager was ill and had asked him to deputise. He said that the Council could adjourn the matter if they thought the Co. Manager's presence was necessary, but he pointed out that the members already had the Manager's statement and that they could discuss the matter and he would try to elucidate any points made and the Council could then adjourn.

Mr Kyne—I think we should go ahead as far as we can. The other members agreed with this. Mr Kyne said that he had noticed in the Press that a copy of the Manager's statement had been refused to the Press by the Clerk. He asked for the reason for so doing.

The Clerk said that a representative of the LEADER applied for a copy of the statement but was refused to give it as it was not given last year. He said that as the statement had not been discussed it would have been discussed on his part to the members to release it until after the meeting.

Mr Clancy said that if a new roof was put on it would be alright. It was decided to reduce the loan charge on this item to £100 and do the best possible job with the amount it would realise. The loan charge on Housing was £1,478 for Abbeyside scheme and £50 for Gallowhill.

After discussion it was decided to reduce the charge for Abbeyside to £1,000 as it was stated that it could not reach full dimensions in the coming financial year. Dealing with administration costs Mr Kyne said that if the figures were put in it would be most revealing as to the cost to run the five workmen of the Council. He said that there were far too many officials altogether and no remarks were made in the statement about the figures. Now some alterations have been made in the estimate and I think we should adjourn now to give the Clerk time to adjust the figures and we can meet again and consider the new figures. The amended estimate should be next 30/- and we may be able to make further reductions.

The members agreed to adjourn the meeting as suggested and although the clock in the room showed the time to be 9.45 p.m. it was in fact ten minutes to midnight as the clock had stopped.

Easter Commemoration Services, 1948
GLOWING TRIBUTES PAID TO IRISH PATRIOTS AT ARDMORE

At St Augustine's Church, Dungarvan on Easter Sunday, Solemn Mass was offered for the repose of the souls of all deceased members of the I.R.A. West Waterford Brigade and was largely attended by old comrades.

In the afternoon a large number of Dungarvan Old Comrades travelled to Ardmore by car for the Commemoration Services and were met there by other parties representing the West Waterford Brigade.

At 3 p.m. under the command of Mr Pax O'Faolain Brigade O/C the Brigade moved off and paraded to St Declan's cemetery. There alongside the old tower lies the grave of an Irish Patriot—Declan Hurton on which wreaths were placed on behalf of the relatives and the West Waterford Brigade.

Mr Pax O'Faolain addressed the large audience and said that they were there to pay tribute to the memory of an old comrade who gave his life for freedom and to the many other brave Irishmen who died for the same cause all over Ireland.

Mr Patrick Ormonde recited a decade of the Rosary in Irish. This was followed by the reading of the 1916 Proclamation and the playing of the Irish national hymn. Mr Paddy Lynch, Dungarvan in the course of an oration said that all over the Irish nation on Easter Sunday tribute was being paid to the memories of the brave Irishmen who rest in the hillsides in the glens, in the villages towns and cities.

He said that this day was to many a reminder of a great loss sustained but he added at the same time they all feel happy and proud at the thought that their loved ones gave their lives for a glorious cause—the freedom of Ireland.

Mr Lynch said that in paying tribute to these patriots all should bear in mind that the task is not yet fully completed. It is our duty he said to fight for the completion of this very important Irish mission who rest in the hillsides in the glens, in the villages towns and cities.

That he said a fight which is going on all over Ireland as the Irishmen who rest in the hillsides in the glens, in the villages towns and cities. means he added are today far different but the object in view is still the very same. Something for which Pearse, Tone, Kelly, Keating and Hurton and all the other brave Irishmen shed their life blood.

Mr Lynch continued and said —Let us all here today renew and re-affirm our determination to bring about the fulfilment of this Irish mission. Let us do it here today in the shadow of Ardmore's old and famous tower—this tower which has stood here for centuries which saw the flight of the geese which saw the men of 88 forward to fight for freedom which saw the coffin ships sail from all parts of our shores which saw Mitchell sail away in chains and which witnessed the dawning of the final Rising of Easter Week 1916. He appealed to all to do everything in their power to complete the task which will bring about a United Nation Once Again.

Concluding Mr Lynch said that some Easter Sunday in the very near future they would have a great honour of coming to Ardmore to see the old tower and all the other Irish patriots that the task is complete—the fight is won and Ireland is united then he said they saw the future more rest in peace in the land they fought and died for.

The first centenary year of the 1848 rising was impressively commemorated in Waterford on Sunday when in the presence of a very large gathering a memorial scroll to Thomas Francis Meagher was unveiled by Miss Rosamund Jacob Dublin at the Granville Hotel Quay the birth-place of the distinguished Young Ireland leader.

The ceremony which was held under the auspices of the Waterford National Graves Association and at which the Mayor (Mr J. F. Glosier) presided was preceded by a public procession from the Mall in which the Mayor members of the Corporation (in state) representatives of several other public bodies prominent figures in the national life of Waterford City and County and adjoining counties and members of religious communities pupils of Mount Sion Christian Brothers Schools six city bands and a large body of the general public took part.

At the funeral which was held on the Quay from Barronstrand Street the leading Thomas Francis Meagher Brass and Reed Band played the Dead March in Saul and after Miss Jacob removed the flowers and colour which draped the scroll a coro of buglers from the same band sounded the General Salute to the accompaniment of a roll of drums. The ceremony was carried out under the patronage of the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore Most Rev. Dr. Cavanah chairman of the organising committee of which Messrs Nicholas Whittle Tramore and Nellie Dunmore East were hon secretaries and Mr Joseph Tobin, hon treasurer.

The scroll stated to be the first public memorial to Meagher in Ireland had been erected in the wall panel at the left entrance to the Granville Hotel. Designed by Mr Frank Heynin NT Manor Street Waterford and executed by Mr Wm Meagher the Waterford sculptor it is done in limestone and bears in gold lettering the inscription: "Thomas Francis Meagher the illustrious '48 patriot was born in this house on third August 1823. With my country I leave my memory

"Erected by the National Graves Association 1948"

Recalling that Thomas Francis Meagher was arrested in Waterford and that the people of Waterford rose up and would have rescued him from the soldiers but he would not allow them. Miss Jacob said this was a spontaneous action almost unparalleled in the history of political arrests in Ireland.

The speaker dealt with the career of Meagher after escaping to America his return to Ireland to join the Young Ireland movement and his famous "Sword" speech in defence of armed rebellion.

After the revolution in France in 1848 said Miss Jacob Meagher accompanied by Smith O'Brien headed a deputation from the Irish Confederation to congratulate the French people on setting up a republic on democratic lines.

CENTENARY OF 1848 RISING
Waterford Tribute To Thos F Meagher
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Proposed Erection Of Memorial At Reilig An tSleibhe, Dungarvan
At the Social and Reunion held after the Easter Commemoration Services at Ardmore on Easter Sunday Mr Patrick Ormonde addressed the large attendance and said that as they were gathered together to pay tribute to all the Irishmen who died for the cause of Irish freedom he would like to bring to the attention of every true Irishman the erection of a fitting monument at Reilig An tSleibhe situated on the mountainside about 3 miles outside Dungarvan off the Cork road in this sacred spot said Mr Ormonde thousands of Ireland's sons and daughters lie buried—victims of the famine which robbed Ireland of her precious life-blood. Today he said they lie there forgotten with nothing to show that it is a last resting place. The cross which once stood there is thrown on the ground neglected and ignored. There was however, he added a time when Reilig An tSleibhe was well in the minds of our people. At that time an annual procession was held there and Masses celebrated for the souls of the large numbers resting there. These practices he said should not have been allowed to die out because nearly every Dungarvan man and woman has some distant relative resting there and they should pay Reilig An tSleibhe the respect due to it by erecting a fitting monument at Reilig An tSleibhe and hold Masses there as they did in years gone by. He also said that a memorial stone should be erected there and adjacent to it a cross that might be dedicated to the memory of Dungarvan's residents who gladly help towards the project. Mr Sheehan said Dr Casey had always helped Dungarvan to progress and of every town in Ireland had men of his kind. He added Ireland would be a powerful and prosperous nation. Concluding the Lord Mayor said that he felt sure that Dr Casey would give every possible help towards the object in view.

Dr Casey then addressed the gathering and said that he most certainly would do all in his power to bring about the realisation of the project as stated by Mr Ormonde and he promised his full support in the matter. As regards his work for Dungarvan he said that it was only the duty of every man to help his own home town to progress and he said that he would always be very happy to help in any way for the further progress of the Old Boro.

Other speakers in support of Mr Ormonde's suggestions were Mr M. Mansfield, Dungarvan and Mr J. Mansfield, Ardmore

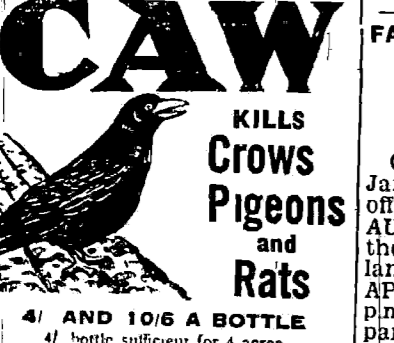

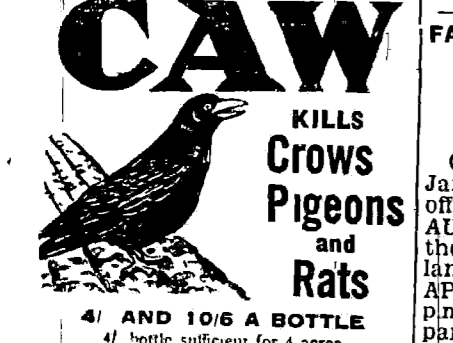
