Willie Hosey has now reached the ripe old age of 108 but this did not stop him from entering the tournament.

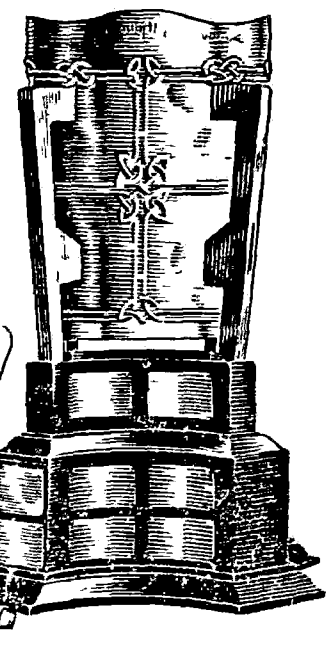
Pa meet Tomas in the tournament but it seems he will not get the chance as Tomas has not entered.

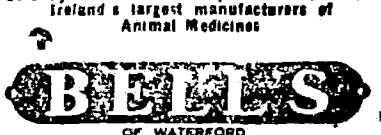
