Taylor Hill, Dungarvan, City and Mrs. Waldron, Professor Waldron of University College, Galway is a particular friend of Mr. T. D. Connolly, Vice-President of the Waterford City B.C.H. Gaelic League with whom he spent the week-end at 21 William Street. He was inquiring for a number of his old friends and acquaintances who he got to know during his period of internment in Waterford City in the summer of 1917.

Professor Waldron is a cultured Gaelic fluent Irish speaker and a very capable member of the Irish language. It is 31 years since his last visit.

Interned in Waterford 1917 - Early in the summer of 1917 Eamonn Waldron was ordered by the British General Bryan Mahon (Commander-in-Chief of the British Army in Ireland) to leave Ireland as an alternative to being interned in the Curragh. Professor Waldron chose the latter alternative hence his coming to Portlaoise residing soon under police and military surveillance for some time. While here Professor Waldron was ordered to report his movements etc. He was regarded by the British Authorities as a highly dangerous man because of his anti-republican activities.

While here he paid a courtesy call to his old friend An Doctair De Faolte 21 Broad Street, from whom he received a cordial welcome.

Tragic Accident - Young Girl Killed - One of the worst and most tragic accidents in the history of Mid Waterford occurred at the home of Mr and Mrs J. Loneragan (Knockeylan, Kilsrossary) on Friday evening, August 13th, when their only daughter, Mary Loneragan aged 21 years, was killed after being knocked and rolled over by a horse drawn cart. The accident occurred while the child - a good humoured and very friendly child - was standing watching her father, Mr John Loneragan, unloading hay from a cart. When the horse backed the cart and struck by the cart and knocked beneath the wheel which rolled over her head. Shortly after her father picked her up she died. The cause of the accident, the mother of the child was absent in Dungarvan when the accident occurred. When news of the tragedy became known throughout the district and surrounding areas, the people of Kilmacthomas and district expressed their sympathy with the family who are very well known. The findings of the inquest held on Saturday morning, that death which was instantaneous was due to misadventure. 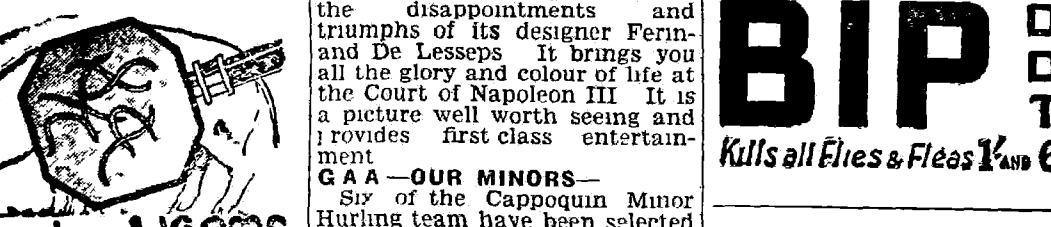
