NOTICE TO HOUSEHOLDERS

(1) In order to facilitate the work of saving the grain harvest the Minister for Industry and Commerce has decided to increase the basic domestic ration of bread flour and wheatmeal for the four weeks commencing on Saturday, 28th August and ending on Friday, 24th September. The maximum ration for that period will be 8 lbs of bread or 6 lbs. of flour or 7 lbs of wheatmeal a week per person.

(2) The increased ration will not be granted to consumers resident in the County Borough of Dublin the Borough of Dun Laoghaire or the County Boroughs of Cork Limerick and Waterford. The Minister requests consumers not to ask for the increased ration unless they are actively engaged in connection with harvest operations and are in urgent personal need of extra bread or flour.

RE RECENT DROWNING ACCIDENT AT TRAMORE County Manager's Office Dungarvan Co Waterford 18th August 1948 A Chara-My attention has been drawn to the recent reports of the evidence given at the inquest held at Tramore following the death by drowning of a young man Mr Patrick Cooke and the observations of the Coroner as reported regarding the Life-Saving Equipment provided at Tramore by the Waterford County Council.

Alleged Unsuitability of Boat This boat is of a type locally known as a prong and from its construction is considered by those competent to judge to be the most suitable for rough surf such as sometimes obtains in Tramore. I have seen it on different occasions launched from the Strand taken out to the bay and beached by one man.

Waterford County Council has been submitted by the County Medical Officer and the County Engineer in the organisation of the Life-Saving arrangements at Tramore. With reference to the recent drowning accident at Tramore I beg to report as follows:—

Monday Aug 9-We were up at 7.30 a.m. and had breakfast and packed our gear. We loaded the lorry for dispatch to the Station and the K.E.'s went with us. Then we were ready for the bus to arrive. There seemed to have been a hitch about the time and we were still on the camp site at 4 p.m. beginning to feel hungry when the bus arrived. We sang our Goodbye song to Rathdrum and made a halt at Ennisclorthy for grub. The out-ney from that to Waterford was quiet enough. We left the bus at the Burgery to march into the village and we found the most of the villagers had come out to greet us.
