Aided by a strong breeze there was plenty of play in the first half, but when the second half started the Dublin players showed their class by holding off the early attacks and bid their time until the second half.

Waterford's interval had was not encouraging and those lost chances were told against their morale. Once Dublin opened up in the second half the game was only for the taking. With a keen sense of positional play and an accurate coupled with clever passing, movements it took Dublin only a quarter of an hour to score a first and set the pace from the start. Waterford tried to hold them back by using their second half burst but their effort failed and Dublin were on top all things being equal.

"Tommy" Scurry Full Forward, Graedueu Hurling Team... accidentally met last week in Broad Street Tommy Scurry (now 76 years) who played full forward for Graedueu Hurling team when they won the County Waterford Hurling Championship in 1904 in the third game at Lismore.

Watch The Fellow With The Speckled Cap—Tommy Scurry was decidedly accurate in the forward position and whenever he received the ball there was generally a score resulted. His style was more rugged than polished in the three games against Clonca, it was his ability as a forward that supported Clonca on the side line shouting.

The Caps Were Sold By Mr. Matt Dooney, Draper... collected those grazed-up caps which were sold by the Matt Dooney Draper who had a small display house at Broad Street near Dr. White's Medical Hall and had one assistant the late Davy Power member of the Graedueu Hurling team.

One Of The First G.A.A. Tournaments... was one of the first G.A.A. Tournaments organised by the G.A.A. in the city. It was in the field the property of Mr. James Madden who had a house on the site of the present farm at Graedueu who (utilised) in every way and made no charge for using his grounds.

The Graedueu Club Were Most Enthusiastic... I should state that we had the use of the tournament held for the week before the match so as to prepare the playing pitch. The boys worked like mad men under the captivacy of Tom Flynn eldest son of the late James Flynn Farmer Knocknagappagh Graedueu who afterwards gave us the use of a field for a regular weekly football game.

Mr. James Flynn, P.L.C.—Mr. James Flynn and members of his family were amongst the most consistent supporters of the Graedueu Club. They never left us down. James who was a particular friend of the late Mr. William Kearney Graedueu (father of the National) and Mr. William Kearney was a prominent representative and member of the old Waterford Board of Guardians up to 1920. I spent many nights in his house and long singing Irish and Anglo Irish songs forty years ago. His eldest daughter Miss Bridget Flynn the late Mrs. E. Maher used play the piano accompaniment.

A Prominent Sinn Feiner Who Had Great Moral Courage—Mr. James Flynn P.L.C. is worthy of more than one paragraph when the National crisis came in 1920 he stood as a candidate in the Sinn Fein interest for the Waterford Board of Guardians and headed the poll with a big majority. He had good moral courage to fill the Bearna Baoghail at that time as many neighbouring farmers refused to throw in their lot with the National Movement.

The Men Who Made G.A.A. History In The Deise—The greatest most prolonged and most successful fight (lasting two years) in G.A.A. History was fought in the Deise on the principle of Gaelic fields for Gaelic Players. The central figures were the late Mr. Dan Fraher Dungarvan Mr. D. Walsh (Referer) Mr. T. D. Connolly President Graedueu Hurling Club (1920) and the late Mr. Richard O'Neill (Financial Adviser to the General Manager G.I.E. at the time of his death) President John Mitchell H.C. Mr. J. W. Upton, Mr. Richard Dawson.

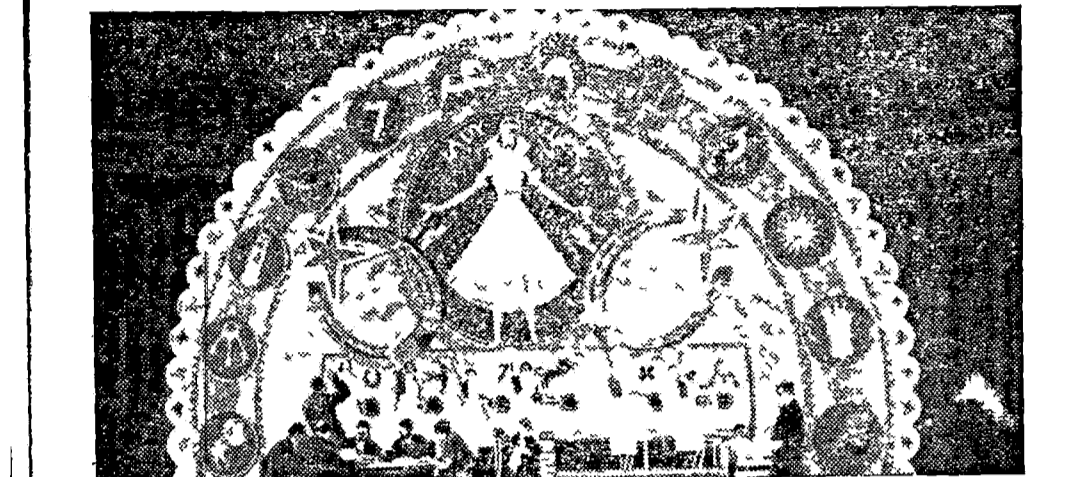

Ah well! concluding my friend's visit no use advising the young folks the wanderlust is in their blood they must travel and learn in the bitter school of experience but here is my last word there is no land today like the Green Isle of Erin.
