CHAMPIONS TRIED AND TRUE
PITCH INVADDED AT WATERFORD
Waterford, 2-6; Kilkenny, 0-9.

At the Sportsfield, Watford, on Sunday last the Waterford Senior Hurling team gave as brilliant an exhibition of hurling as was ever seen on any pitch when the defeated a hard-hitting Kilkenny side by a goal in the Oireachtas Cup Semi-Final.

By then display the team has shown itself worthy to hold the title of All-Ireland Champions which they gained at Croke Park on Sept 5th, and then victory augurs well for future National League games.

The scenes outside the pitch before the game commenced were reminiscent of Thuries at the greatest Munster Finals. Although there were at least half a dozen turn stiles available there were 2 or 3 which were not operating and the remainder were not able to cope with the record crowd that attended.

At the time for the match approached hundreds of spectators outside the gates thinking that they would not gain admission scaled the high walls surrounding the field and a great many were broken down and thousands rushed through.

The Guards did all they could to regulate the dense mass of people who were milling about from one gate to another and women and children had a very rough time of it. The arrangements and stewarding at the gate entrances completely fell down and the people were just left to their own devices.

At 2.45 p.m. there were several numbers of the Waterford team including Vin Baston, Jim Ware and Kevin O'Connor outside the gate and the latter was eventually they managed to get in.

At about 3.30 p.m. the time announced for the match to start there was no sign of the Waterford team although the Kilkenny men were on the field. Then came an announcement over the loud speakers that the Clonca players had failed to get to the pitch and later that the car conveying them to the match had broken down.

Eventually when the team came out we found that they were short of players and the key players like Grace and Walsh were missing. The substitutes were J. Killy (Dungarvan), J. Allen (Dunhill), L. Fanning (Erins Own), Stephen Curran (Key Rangers) and J. Murphy (Erins Own). Fanning and Murphy as the game progressed proved worthy substitutes. Allen, especially covered himself with glory and his red head was always seen bobbing and weaving around the Kilkenny defence which he completely ran off their feet.

Johnny O'Connor was unfortunate to sustain a severe facial injury which did not however prevent him from resuming and Carey mixed it well with Dowling and Kennedy at centre field.

Keane again proved the engineering genius in the pivot attack position and O'Connor was always in the right spot while forward always scheming to draw the defence and let his wings slip through.

Just as the final whistle was about to be sounded by referee Dr. J. Stuart a rather ugly incident occurred and the pitch was invaded by side-line spectators and scenes of disorder and unpleasantness were witnessed. This brought an unhappy ending to an otherwise marvellous game and marred the occasion. For thousands, the memories of Waterford on October 3rd will be the risks sustained in trying to get into the field a good game and a bad ending and the lesson to be learned from these is a venue with proper accommodation for big matches and no side-line, and Guards and Officials to regulate the crowds in a

At Ocean View Hotel Clonca, on last Sunday night a large number of Gaels of the County were the guests of Mrs. M. Monahan on the occasion of the handing over by the donors of a magnificent silver trophy which will be competed for by the rural National Schools.

The donors present at the function included Dr. M. A. Casey, Dungarvan, Dr. D. T. McCarthy, do, and An Fear Mor An Rinn. The other two donors were Mr. Jack Phelan, New York, and Mr. Padraig Fleming, Boston, who were unable to be present as they had returned to the USA during the previous week.

The menu at the dinner represented members of the senior and minor hurling champions and the repeat was a credit to the popular hostess. The layout of the banquet room was grand, the table covered with blue and white colours of the Waterford teams.

At the conclusion of the dinner Dr. Casey said that his first duty was to thank Mrs. Monahan for her great hospitality and said that the party was one of pleasure and happiness as Waterford had that day defeated Kilkenny a thing that many people did not think possible.

Dr. McCarthy said that every one had the feeling that when the All-Ireland was over that a feeling of frivolity would set in and this being so that the team would be glad to be in Kilkenny especially as the latter were imbued with the one motive of defeating Waterford and he said that he knew that they wanted more to beat Waterford than to be great hospitalities.

He pointed out that Waterford was the only Munster County to win an All-Ireland final and in fact two finals this year. He said that the County probably had a better team in 1938 but the measure of any team's greatness was its success.

Referring to Mrs. Monahan, he said that she was a princess of hosts. Dr. O'Callaghan also said and he said that it was a very fitting end to a hectic period that it be spent in Clonca.

He welcomed Jim Ware and his Waterford friends who were present at the function and said that nobody had done more for Waterford hurling than the Ware brothers.

Dr. McCarthy said that in the Cup they were presenting for the Junior competition and said that it would give the incentive to the youths of rural areas to do their bit and he thanked Dr. Casey and the others for all they had done for the County.

Mr. D. Good Secretary County Board G.A.A. who accepted the Cup on behalf of the Board said that it was a great source of pleasure for him to be present at the function and to accept the magnificent trophy which the donors had presented and said that it was a grand gesture on the part of the five men responsible for it.

An Fear Mor in a brief address said that a feature of the game at Waterford struck him was the fact that the subs who came on were as good as the old lads. He said that this was a good sign of the times and Waterford had won over Kilkenny had put the seal on the quality of the hurling in the county.

Mr. Jim Ware thanked Mrs. Monahan and the donors of the cup. He said that it was a grand thing for the young fellows to have such a grand trophy to compete for as there was nothing like it in his day.

Mr. M. Foley, N.T. Abbeyside, said he also wished to thank Mrs. Monahan and the donors of the cup and said that he had no hesitation in saying that he hoped that his school would be the first to win it.

Mr. P. A. Casey said that he had been in Kilkenny on the previous and had heard that they had prepared for the game as they never did before and had come down "to beat the lard out of Waterford" and after the game they were wiser and he said there was no doubt about Waterford's worth now.

Mr. Sean Monahan returned thanks to the speakers for the fine compliments paid to his wife and said that the donors of the cup were offering a splendid inspiration to those who will follow in the footsteps of the present great teams. He said that his admiration for Waterford did not end with the victories which had been won, but in their gallant defeats and in the clean way that they always played the game and he said that if the youths achieve the same excellent sportsmanship they can be as proud as those of the teams which had won.

At the official handing over of the trophy Dr. McCarthy read the following letter to my friends in Dungarvan and Gaels of Waterford I wish to thank my friends in Dungarvan and the Gaels of Waterford who made my visit such a pleasant one and of which I will have very happy memories for the rest of my life. I will never forget that great victory in Croke Park by the gallant Waterford team which was such a treat on my arrival in Ireland after an absence of 46 years.
