## Waterford Co. Board G. A. A.

### Chairman Deplores Disreputable Scenes At Lismore Match

### Objection and Counter- Objection Withdrawn

Mr M V O'Donoghue chairman presided at a special meeting of the Waterford County Board, G. A. A. held at the Christian Brothers' School, Dungarvan on last Monday night. Messrs D O'Sullivan, J Green, M O'Connor, P Browne, P Fanning, Rev Bro Murray, T Cashin (proxy F Butler) and delegates from Dungarvan St Patrick's Avonmore and Brickley Rangers were present. Mr D Good Secretary was in attendance.

### An Impertinent Request

The Chairman said that the meeting was called to deal with the objection to Avonmore by Dungarvan and a counter-objection.

At the outset T Lannen objected to Avonmore having a representative on the Board as they were not entitled to it.

Chairman—Objection noted. Mr F O'Donnell (Avonmore) Was there ever an objection like this before?

Chairman—Not while I am presiding here.

The chairman then asked who was representing Dungarvan and Messrs Lannen and O'Dea replied and for Avonmore Messrs J Byrne and T Fives.

The Chairman then read the objection by the Dungarvan club to Avonmore being awarded the championship match played at Lismore on Sunday Nov 14th on the following grounds:

(1) That the Avonmore team was not a divisional team being drawn from only four clubs and that it was illegal as it was not under the jurisdiction of the Western Board.

(2) That J Kellyher who played with Avonmore was illegal having automatically suspended himself on Oct 31st when he played with Avonmore against Dungarvan as his transfer from Galway had not been sanctioned by the Central Council until Nov 6th.

An endorsement on the objection by the Secretary read: Received 140 pm 21.11.48.

At this stage T Cashin (Dungarvan) said that as the Chairman was interested in the Avonmore club he should vacate the chair while the objection was being heard.

Chairman—That is an impertinent request.

Mr Cashin—I was elected at the last Convention as chairman of the Co Board and I will continue to reside at all functions of the Board until there is a change.

Mr O'Dea referred to a case at the Munster Council during an appeal in which the chairman of that body was interested and he vacated the chair while the case was being heard.

The Chairman said that he did not care to follow the example of the Chairman of the Munster Council. He explained that it was the honorary chairman of the Avonmore club and was instrumental in calling a meeting to reorganise the club early this year and he felt very proud that he did so and that this was done with such success. He said that it was only with reluctance that he presided at that meeting and the interest he had in the Avonmore club was only a fatherly one.

### Objection Ruled Out

Mr Byrne on a point of order said that the objection was only handed in at 140 pm on Nov 21st and that it was not handed in on November 14th. He held that the objection was out of order as it should have been handed in within seven days of the match.

Mr O'Dea explained that the basis that every day has 24 hours they were in order.

Chairman—Will you produce a rule or bye-law which meets with your interpretation?

Mr O'Dea—The rule says that 7 days and we say the objection was lodged within that period. It is 7 days from the hour at which the match started.

Mr Byrne said that his colleague knew that in law a summons must be served within 7 days and the old saying was that Monday to Monday was 8 days.

Chairman—That is the first time I can remember that such a point was made to me. I believe the point of order is correct as the 8th day could not be within 7 days. Sunday is the 8th day from the match as the day ends at midnight and the 7th day from Sunday ends at midnight on Saturday and that is my interpretation and I uphold the point of order and rule out the objection.

Bro Murray—So that the Co Board was illegal for playing him.

Chairman—It means that we would have lost the match if we were objected to.

Mr Fives—We can not go beyond that to prove the point.

Mr O'Dea still held that there was no proof given.

Mr O'Dea—Yes.

Chairman—And did you hear the reference in it to M Moloney?

Mr J Byrne—Yes it says he did not play there but the inference is that he was in London.

Mr Lannen—Is that letter on Irish watermarked paper?

Chairman—I am accepting it as evidence.

Mr Murray—Can it be accepted when it's not watermarked?

Mr Fanning—It is not an official letter addressed to the Chairman or Secretary.

Chairman—That letter or the one from the London Co Board is not on Irish watermarked paper.

Mr Murray—And the rule says that such correspondence must be ruled out.

Chairman—Well I am certainly not going to rule out any official correspondence from the London County Board.

Mr Murray—A rule is a rule. Chairman—The letter seems to

be very strong corroborative evidence and establishes the fact that Moloney was in England.

Mr O'Dea—What Moloney was doing is not my business. I am one of the men who shook hands with him and said good-bye to him.

Mr Cashin—That is no evidence from the evidence submitted on point two that Kiely played in London and rule it as proved. O'Dea—Point number 1, I'm in a difficulty there. It is admitted that Moloney played with Dungarvan in two matches and it has not been denied that he was resident in England.

## WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

### Youghal Bridge Discussed

### Dungarvan Meat Shambles

Mr D Heskin chairman presided at a special meeting of the Waterford Co Council, held in Dungarvan on Saturday last.

The purpose of the meeting was to consider, and if thought fit to approve the terms of a resolution adopted by the Youghal Bridge Joint Committee as adopted by Cork County Council.

After a short discussion on the proposition of Mr O'Ryan seconded by Mr Walsh, the resolution as follows was adopted unanimously:

(a) That the bridge across the Blackwater at Youghal be constructed, due regard to be had to the preliminary report provided for by Section 46 of the Local Government Act 1946 if and when obtained and that for that purpose application accordingly be made under Section 44 of the said Act for a bridge order.

(b) That the Committee recommend to the Cork County Council that the Cork County Council apply to the Minister for Local Government for such Bridge Order.

(c) That the following proposals be made for the expenses of the work involved:

(1) The entire of the local contribution to the cost of the work shall not exceed twenty-five per cent of the total cost.

(2) The proportion of the County Borough of Cork and the County Borough of Waterford, and the Councils of the Counties of Cork and Waterford should contribute to the cost of the said local contribution required from the Corporations of Cork and Waterford and the Councils of the Counties of Cork and Waterford should contribute to the cost of the said local contribution required from the Corporations of Cork and Waterford and the Councils of the Counties of Cork and Waterford.

(3) That the proportion of the said local contribution required from the Corporations of Cork and Waterford and the Councils of the Counties of Cork and Waterford be chargeable on a valuation basis over the Counties of Cork and Waterford and that the Cork County Council with the consent of the Waterford County Council withdraw all former applications for a bridge order for a new bridge at Youghal made by them to the Minister for Local Government.

He said that the site had been a very useful one to the Urban Council as a store for which it was presently being used and as they would now be deprived of that he thought that an alternative accommodation should be provided for them.

The Chairman said that the Co Council would be satisfied if and when the site was acquired to provide alternative accommodation for the Urban Council.

Mr Leary said that he did not see why the Co Council should be obliged to make such provision and Senator Butler said that the Urban Council were facilitating the Co Council in the matter and should be met.

Mr Hartly said that the Co Council were expected to pay the costs of acquiring and at the same time provide alternative accommodation free.

Mr O'Ryan said that the Council should not bind themselves to anything at this stage.

At this juncture several members were having discussions amongst themselves and Mr O'Ryan called on the Chairman to enforce standing orders.

He said that there were two or three meetings going on at the same time instead of one member speaking at the time.

After further discussion the recommendation of the Manager to acquire the site was approved and an undertaking given that alternative accommodation be provided for the Urban Council.

The County Surveyor reported and suggested that the Department of Local Government be

asked not to insert the condition in the Road Maintenance Grants for the coming year that the amount of money spent on main roads be commensurate with that spent on County roads as far as County Waterford was concerned as it would operate unfairly here where the main roads were always kept in good condition. The insertion of such a condition would mean a restriction in the amount which could be spent on county roads.

A resolution in accordance with this suggestion was unanimously approved.

Report of Deputation Deferred. The report of the deputation which met the Minister for Local Government concerning increased grants for water and sewerage schemes in the county was deferred to the next meeting.

It was decided to adopt this course as the Department had not written concerning their decision of the points raised by the members of the deputation.

Notes of sympathy were passed with Mr. and Mrs. E. Spratt, Dungarvan, on the death of their daughter, and with the relatives of the late Mr. Thomas Ryan and Mr. James Thomas Co Council road overseers.

Waterford Co Council. G. A. A.—Cappoquin Have Runaway Victory In Junior Hurling Final. Cornerstone Leads Too Good For Mount Sion.

Cappoquin 7-6, Mount Sion 1-1. At the Gaelic Field Dungarvan on Sunday evening last Cappoquin junior hurlers crowned their unbeaten efforts during the season when they annexed county honours in the junior hurling final, defeating Mount Sion by a big score.

There were some good exchanges during the match but it was evident from very early on that Cappoquin were all set for victory and their superior weight and first time pulling tactics gave them a decided advantage over a lighter city fifteen on a very heavy slippery sod.

Cappoquin lead by nine points at the interval and in the second half were never seriously challenged.

There is no doubt but the Cornerstone team were well trained. In a strong backline Kelliher Lacy and McGrath were outstanding while O'Connor Browne and Curran proved sharpshooters which the Mount Sion defence could not cope with. The veteran Paddy English had a great game for the winners and scored two great goals.

The attendance at the game was on the small side for a County Final due possibly to the League game at Cork and to the unpromising weather conditions.

Waterford Lose At Cork In National Hurling League Game. Cork, 1-11, Waterford 0-7. At Cork Athletic Grounds on Sunday last Waterford were defeated by Cork in their National Hurling League tie after a fast and exciting game which contained plenty of thrills for three quarters of an hour. It was only in the concluding stages that Cork's superiority became evident and also the fact that their strenuous campaign of the past six months has made the Waterford team stale.

At times the Waterford fifteen showed the form and style that brought them the premier title this year but they lacked that determination and enthusiasm which brought them supreme in their championship engagements. It was only in the closing stages in fact only a few seconds before the final whistle that Cork got the only major score of the game to put them 7 points in front.

Goode was the man of the match on the Waterford side while Ring showed all the artistry and wizardry which has marked him as the best forward playing the game today and his points at vital stages of the game helped Cork to ultimate success.

From the point of view of the 10,500 spectators who attended the game it was a highly satisfactory match and the standard set was extraordinarily high for an end of the season game.

The fact that Waterford had not the same incentive in winning the game naturally took from the fire and dash which typified so many of their vital encounters in the championship series but nevertheless the greatest credit is due them for their

fine display. They contested every passage of the game and were well worth the great ovation they received when they took the field before the game started.

First Blood to Waterford. The game started with a Waterford rush and J Allen sent over a fast point. A moment afterwards W J Daly equalised for Cork but Keane hit a free over the bar to put Waterford ahead. The game continued at a very fast pace and point followed point at frequent intervals. Keane pointed from another free but Jack Lynch doubled a fast pass from Fohly for a lovely Cork point.

From a long distance out Ring equalised and then followed a period in which Cork unmistakably asserted their superiority. A point by Lynch put Cork ahead and after that despite many brilliant clearances by Baston Cusack and Ware Cork added points per Ring G Riddan (2) and P Barry to leave them five points in the lead at this interval.

On resuming Ware brought off a grand save from Ring and the Waterford middle man E Carew scored a clever point from 40 yards out. Waterford kept up a fast pace and free taken by John Keane sailed over the bar to reduce Cork's lead to three points. Waterford strove hard for the equalising goal, and twice Con Murphy and Tom Mulcahy effected great clearances by critical stages. Ring however relieved matters by stretching Cork's lead with a point, and the same player added a similar score. Keane pointed for Waterford but Ring interposed and the game was to all intents and purposes over although Baston added another Waterford minor. The light was falling at this stage but Cork went all out to finish a fine performance by breaching the Waterford net and almost on the last stroke of the game O'Neill sent a fast shot out of Ware's reach.

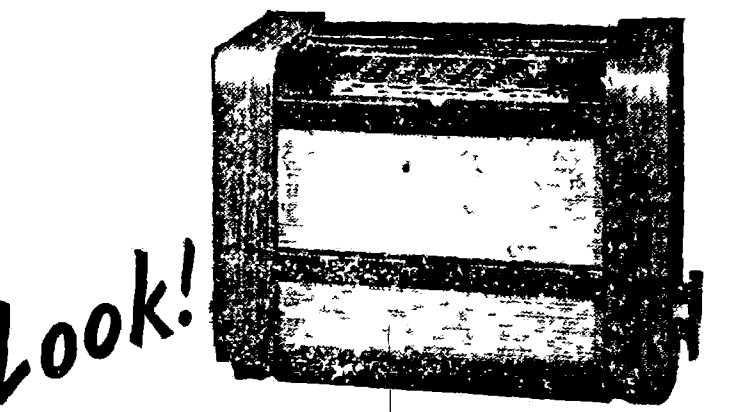
