Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee

No Increase in Rate Demand

Salary Of New C.E.O. Fixed

Domestic Economy Classes At Tallow

An Fear Mor Vice-Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the County Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan on Monday evening last. Messrs M H O'Hara, J Mansfield, M F Walsh, M Hartly, M McGrath, D Coghlan and Mr J Lanigan, Acting C.E.O. attended.

Arising out of a circular from the Department a resolution was passed granting an increase of 5% to Messrs P Lynch and Mrs M Langan. Dungarvan Technical School and to Mr T Fives Cappoulin School in accordance with the terms of the agreement. Concerning the scholarship in Hotel Cookery a letter from the Minister stated that he regretted that the extra payment proposed might not exceed £10. This reason for not increasing the amount to Dublin during the course.

The letter was noted. A letter from the Department sanctioned payment to members of a sum of one shilling per mile for every mile travelled to and from meetings of the Committee. The letter stated that this applied to members who reside at least five miles from the place of meeting.

A short discussion followed during which Mr Mansfield stated that he thought five miles too high a limit for members living four miles away were kept equally long from their ordinary occupation. Finally it was unanimously decided that the amount should be reduced to three miles. Approval was received for the provision of ten vice for metal-work classes at Cappoulin School. A certificate was forwarded authorising the demand for the annual local contribution from the rates.

Mr Lanigan said that the demand of £4,320 was the same as previous years. Mr Hartly said that Mr Lanigan and the Staff should be congratulated on keeping within the estimate especially as the cost of everything required for the running of the schools had increased. Mr Walsh associated himself with the remarks of Mr Hartly. Mr Lanigan stated that he would like to see the staff as they had performed no miracles as they had to eat into the capital account which would be reduced as a result from £1,500 to about £2,000. Mr Lanigan said that they all knew that they could not have a more efficient staff than Mr Lanigan. There had never been a question he said of even a staff during all the years he had been associated with the Committee.
