EXHORTATION
The father the mother and the children make up that divine and sacred institution of God which is called the Catholic family. In the face of God the young man and the young woman join their hands before the altar of God promising each other faith and trust. They henceforth belong to one another and to God. They have their home apart a door to shut out the world and a fireside to call their own. The father shares his earnings with his wife and children. The mother labours and thinks for all the children look to the hand of the father and mother for all their wants and all their enjoyments. If prosperity befalls them they will rejoice alike and equally partake of it. If bad times come and adversity visits the home they meet it together and bear one another's burdens. As the years go by they do their best to keep together, facing the world in unity and affection knowing and trusting and standing each by the other. The husband and wife are to be the head of his wife and children at home that makes him brave and patient and it is his best reward to be welcomed home in the evening by those to whom he is more than all the world outside.

The mother with all her troubles never forgets the man to whom she gave her heart and she is ready to give him and to believe in him to the last. Together the parents watch their children grow in body and develop in mind while they thank the good winners of the life and intelligence. Thus the Catholic family lives through a generation till the children whom God gave them are fathers and mothers themselves with a root of their own. God's designs to carry out in their turn as their fathers before them.

I salute you dear Catholic parents of the Diocese as the successors of those fathers and mothers who in dark and gloomy days suffered persecution for the Faith and at the cost of whose sacrifices the Catholic religion was handed down to us. Oh that we of these Irish fathers and valiant mothers! When the voice of the priest was silenced the altars levelled and the schools closed then it was that the inner Church home became the Faith was kept alive in the hearts of the children and transmitted to future generations.

But if young people walk in wicked ways if their lot is in the drunkard the disorderly and the lawless if they get a reputation for being idle and dishonest, then they bring shame and dishonour on their homes and grief and disappointment to their parents.

A visitor to Ireland wrote recently: "To go no further than Catholic Ireland which most strikes the intelligent observer is the atmosphere of reverence that is so noble and so noble. It illumines the brow and the barefooted boy on the mountainside and adds new glory to the grey hairs of venerable men and women. Mere tourists are wont to put down this national trait to national humiliation and subjection but the student traces it to the fireside of even the humblest home where holiness of life learning, unblemished character and high standards to be reached. Herein lies the secret, reverence is the product of the home and what is learnt at home is seldom forgotten."

RESPECT FOR NATIONAL ANTHEM

Mr Joe O'Mahony 33 Loughmore Dungarvan in a letter refers to the great lack of respect for our National Anthem displayed by the people of the district especially in places of amusement. He points out that it is rather disgusting to hear three or four times of the Anthem played off in jazz style to the people walk away and states that these are matters which should be rectified.

COMMENT

We agree with the points raised in Mr O'Mahony's letter and know from experience that what he states is only too true.

The National Anthem and the National Flag are the emblems of our Nationhood and the people only stopped for a moment and realised their real significance we would have none of this disrespect as is shown at present.

Anyone who has travelled abroad cannot but agree that the people of other countries pay the due respect to their Anthem and Flag—and it is a pity to understand why the people of Ireland as a whole fail in this respect. It is a sad commentary on our National outlook.

Granted that this disrespect is unintended on the part of those who do not stop to realise what their actions imply still this is no alibi. We might spend a couple of hours enjoying ourselves at an amusement and surely it is not too much to expect that of that time we should stand for a few minutes in respectful silence to honour our National Anthem and our National Flag.

If a little time were given at the close of each day in the classrooms of our schools to the singing of the National Anthem in a proper way we think that the habit of respect would grow up bearing in mind the significance of what their action implied and it would remain with them throughout their lives.

In any other country if somebody moved away while the National Anthem was being played he would do so at his own risk but in this country they just do it and nobody seems to bother—the next time that you hear the Irish National Anthem being played—and this remark is directed especially to our young men and women—try and think of it as it means and show it the respect it should command.—[EDITOR]

Dunmore East Man's Bravery Recognised

Comhairle 'Na Mire Galle announces—District Justice Francis J. McCabe presented at Tramore District Court on Tuesday 8th of March the Certificate awarded to John East, Cornallymore Dunmore East Co. Waterford in recognition of his bravery in saving the life of a boy who was with him in the fishing boat, sank in deep water near Barmacaw Cove on the 6th October 1948.

Details of the rescue are as follows—In the evening of the 5th October 1948 Mr Flynn and a 14-year-old boy left Dunmore East in a small motor fishing boat to travel to Saleen 4 miles along the coast. After about an hour the boat sprung a leak, and the engine failed. While the boy baled out continuously Mr Flynn dropped anchor and lit some old clothes soaked in paraffin in an unsuccessful attempt to attract attention. The motor was then cut out and an attempt made to reach Ballymacaw Cove with the aid of a foresail. Despite the efforts at bailing however the water in the boat continued to rise. Near the Cove the boat struck a rock and sank quickly in deep water about 80 yards off the cliffs. Mr Flynn who was swept overboard (a not-uncommon occurrence) on the opposite side to the boy's assistance and brought him to a rock at the foot of the cliff. The boy was washed off the cliff by a wave but was pulled up by Mr Flynn. After a few minutes the boy and Mr Flynn climbed the cliffs and reached a farmhouse at 2 a.m. the following morning. Mr Flynn was in contact with the rock and was confined to bed for a week afterwards.

STEAMERS TO OUR AID

In the year 1923 the roads linking Dungarvan with the outside world were almost at all times in a state of paralysis. The usual obstacles such as felled trees or trenches, making transport a difficult problem. Railways were also knocked out. This meant that the town was completely isolated. This was a big worry—how were supplies going to be brought in. Then came a pleasant surprise. Two local merchants, Messrs K. Williams & Co and Messrs, A. Moloney & Son, purchased two famous steamers—"The Gargan" and the "Lady Belle" respectively. They made regular trips across Channel and brought cargoes of all necessities into Dungarvan thus relieving the townspeople of the hardships and suffering of great privation. Unfortunately the two well-known Dungarvan steamers are not one for as they were sold some years ago but no matter where they are today the older residents of the town will still remember them as the life-lines of the town.

For a period of fifteen months there was no train service to or from Dungarvan due to the destruction of Ballyvooly Railway Bridge and the great Malloy viaduct and the Dungarvan Popquin Bridge. Regular services did not resume till the end of November 1923.

Did you know that there was once a brushmaking industry in Dungarvan. Faw material which was collected by the town and carried to the Cunliffe brushes were bound with thin strips and were noted for their long handles. They were widely used as household brushes. Today they are forgotten local industry.
