IRISHMEN

(7) The Irishmen in America are collecting money for the Brigade. Those men who do not join the Brigade will be removed from Limburg and be distributed among German Company Commanders.

Special Course For Rural Blacksmiths

Home Garden Prize Scheme

Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien P.P. 7 F Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan on Monday last.

It was agreed that in conjunction with the Department an exhibition of paintings be held at Dungarvan, from May 3rd to May 6th and at Cappoquin on May 8th and 9th.

An order from the Department of Education set forth extensions of the 1936 Vocational Education Act to include instrumental and vocal training in the curriculum which would include training of orchestras and choral societies.

Irish Scholarship Scheme
A scheme for the award of 20 scholarships at £11 each on the same lines as last year was approved.

Home Garden Prize Scheme
A scheme for the award of 3 prizes each at Dungarvan and Cappoquin totalling £700 for the working of a utility plot comprising vegetables or vegetables and fruit by students at their own homes on the lines and under instruction given in connection with school gardens at these centres was approved.

Special Course For Rural Blacksmiths
The C.E.O. laid the following details of the above before the Committee.

The Course is designed to meet the requirements of young men who have had some training in farriery and Smithwork and desiring to improve their qualifications for the making and fitting of shoes to meet abnormal conditions of the use of modern welding equipment and the application of their skill to general agricultural needs.

It is proposed that the Course begin on May 23rd and end on July 1st 1949 and that it be conducted at Dungarvan Technical School. It is proposed to seek the services of Mr. V. Coleman, Master Farrier, Dublin as Instructor in Farriery and Smithwork and Workshop Practice to be given by Mr. J. Kelly, Engineer, Instructor, Technical School Dungarvan.

The Department is prepared to award not more than twelve scholarships of £15 each to cover the cost of maintenance and travelling expenses of the scholars.

The Scholarships will be awarded on the results of a practical test and a subsequent interview the practical test to be executed in the candidate's own forge.

The Employer of a candidate awarded a Scholarship must undertake to re-employ him at the end of the Course.

Mr. O'Keefe said that the idea was that the Committee pay for the instruction and material used estimated at £130, while the Department would pay for the scholarships a total of £180.

He said that trainees would be given a certificate of completion of the course.

Defendants Bound To Peace

Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr. E. O'Riain D.J. at Dungarvan on Tuesday last.

An area exemption order restricted to Bridge Street between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Sunday next was granted on the application of Mr. Williams solr Cappagh Neighbours Again At Law.

Mrs. Angela Kiely Old Cappagh House had a civil bill claiming £5 damages for trespass on Feb 22nd and 23rd last against John McGrath same address.

Mr. Farrell solr, for plaintiff outlined the case and Mr. Williams solr defending said that the action was a frivolous one and was brought solely to annoy the defendant.

Plaintiff in evidence said that there were 24 rooms in her house of which 6 were let to defendant. He had no right to any portion of ground in front of the house but had 19 feet of the yard at the back. On Feb 22nd he brought in a lorry sometime before 6 p.m. and unloaded about 5 tons of logs in the lawn in front of the house. The lorry while turning rooted through the grass. The logs were left there overnight and when she asked defendant to give him the logs he put the logs there he told her to go and sleep it off. On the next morning men came and cut the logs on the lawn and left the place very untidy and the railing was damaged.

that they went home that night without doing anything and said that he was driving down Sexton Street at about 25 m.p.h. and saw a child cross the road and applied his brakes at once and passed into his left. His left front wheel had hit the kerb when the child was hit by the right front bumper. He got out and examined the child whose leg appeared to be broken between the knee and the hip.

In reply to Mr. Lanigan, witness said that the driver must have tried hard to avoid the accident and did good work to pull up as he did.

At this stage Mr. Lanigan submitted that there was no evidence to sustain a charge of dangerous driving against his client who had done everything he said to avoid the accident.

The Justice said that defendant could have swung to the right instead of the left, but on the facts he was prepared to dismiss the charge of dangerous driving and substitute one of careless driving.

Defendant in evidence said that he first saw the child as he left the footpath to cross the road and a coat enveloped his head. He was about 12 yards away at the time and stood on the brakes and turned in left towards the footpath. When he pulled up and got out the child was in a sitting position under the off front mudguard but the wheel had not gone over him.

He took the child out and brought him into O'Connor's. He did not swerve right as he thought it was not the proper thing to do.

In reply to the Justice witness said that he had no doubt but that the child was to cross the street. He thought he did everything possible to avoid the accident but agreed that if he swerved right the accident might not have occurred.

Giving his decision the Justice said that he was satisfied that there was no question of dangerous driving in the case but he was also satisfied that defendant made a error of judgment which amounted to careless driving. With the great experience of driving which he had he should have had a little more fore-sight but he had proved an honest and candid witness and the right what he did was right. Having regard to the fact that defendant was driving for 17 years and had never had an accident before and had come down especially from Dublin to answer this charge he did not intend to penalise him further and applied the P.O.A.

LETTING OF HOUSE CHALLENGED

Reference To Hurling At Park

Sewer At Quay Street

In the absence of the Chairman and vice-chairman Mr. T. A. Kynne, TD was moved to the chair in Friday night's meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council meeting. Messrs M. Clancy, Senator Butler, J. Good, and N. Kelly were present. Mr. E. Deery, Town Clerk attended.
Increased Wages
 The Manager made an order awarding an increase of 7/6 per week to the Council workmen subject to sanction.
 The Council had recommended an increase of 10/-.
Letting of Council House
 Arising out of an order made by the Manager letting a Council house to Mr. James Clancy Mitchell Street, Mr. J. Good asked how many applications had been received for the tenancy of this particular house.
 Clerk—33.
 Mr. Good—What line of preference was taken?
 The Clerk said that the Medical Officer dealt first with the applications and four were picked out as the most urgent cases. These were Michael Clancy, James Clancy, Robert Tutty and Michael Naivin.
 Mr. Good—Then how was the letting made?
 The Clerk said that the four urgent cases were recommended to the Manager and he then exercised his discretion as to who the particular tenant should be. The Clerk went on to explain the reasons why the house was let to James Clancy.
 Mr. Good said that he was satisfied with the reasons given. Mr. Kelly said that the applicant recommended, Michael Clancy, was badly in need of a house and had been applying for a long time.
 Mr. Good said that many of the applicants for this house had been applying for years without success.
 The Clerk pointed out that there was no such thing as a waiting list.
 The Chairman—When a house becomes vacant the procedure followed is that it is advertised and the Medical Officer makes his report and then the Co. Manager exercises his discretion and lets the house and the Council have no function in the matter.
 Mr. Good—Was this house advertised?
 The Clerk said it was advertised in both local papers.
 Mr. Good—Then I am satisfied I brought the matter up as I was led to believe otherwise.
 At a later stage of the meeting the matter was referred to again when Mr. Clancy said that the man who got the house was his son. He said that the letting had been made on the merits of the case and he was very grieved that it should have been raised at all. He wished he said that the occasion had not arisen which compelled him to state the facts governing the letting.
 Mr. Good said that in drawing up the matter he did not wish to hurt Mr. Clancy or anybody, but he had been asked by several people to inquire into it and he thought it was his duty to do so. He was satisfied with the facts in the case.
 On further discussion the matter was dropped.

Hedge At Causeway

Arising out of the suggestion of growing a hedge on the South side of the Causeway Mr. O'Rourke, Borough Surveyor reported that as the Horticultural Instructor had previously said that this could not be undertaken with success he could not recommend it. If the Council wished to carry out the suggestion the estimated cost would be £100. The report pointed out that plants which had been set at the other side of the Causeway last year to strengthen the existing hedge had been pulled up and damaged.
 Mr. Clancy said that he believed that a hedge could be grown there and suggested that the Council should visit the place some day with the horticultural instructor to discuss it further.
 The Chairman said that it should be possible to carry out the suggestion on a small portion to see how it got on.
 Mr. Butler said that he could not see how anything could be done this year as no money had been provided in the estimates to cover the cost of the matter.
 Finally it was agreed to ask the Horticultural Instructor to meet members of the Council some day to discuss the matter on the spot.

Hurling and Football At The Park

Mr. Clancy referring to the used for playing by boys and it was reported to him that windows in the locality had been broken by them. He said that this type of thing should not be tolerated as old people who could not walk around there would be annoyed.
 Mr. Butler—What can the Urban Council do about it why don't these people go to the Guards?
 Mr. Clancy—We should prevent hurling and football there anyway.
 Chairman—I got the same complaint as Mr. Clancy last week.
 Mr. Good—It's not last week but for the last twenty years that hurling and football was played there. I remember when I was young being chased out of it by Mr. Walsh.
 Mr. Clancy—That's the point there is no one to chase them out now. In one portion there is no grass at all and in another portion I think we should ask the Superintendent to detail some of his men to see that no does the caretaker resume work there?
 Clerk—From June 1st.
 Mr. Good—We should have one

all the year round.
 Chairman—Yes there would be work for a man. The park at the moment is a wilderness.
 Mr. Good—I propose that we employ a man all the year round.
 Mr. Clancy—We have nine men employed and it's extraordinary that one of them can not find time to go in there and clean the paths. It is the duty of someone to do it and I am entirely against a whole-time job. The rates are high enough as it is. It was a Council man as it was in the past.
 Mr. Kelly—Yes, but the work of the men has greatly increased.
 Mr. Clancy—I think there is less work now.
 Chairman—I agree with Mr. Clancy that some official is responsible and should do his job.
 Finally it was agreed that the attention of the Manager be called to the matter.

Application for Housing Grant

The application of the Dickens Leather Company for a grant for the erection of a house for letting to their manager was again considered.
 The Clerk said that the application appeared to be in order and pointed out that the terms of the grant (to a maximum of £400 over 10 years) would be repaid by the Department.
 Chairman—I understand this is to be let to the Manager and you let a house to a specified person even before it is built?
 Mr. Good—Why should this Council help the factory to build a house why don't they do it themselves?
 The Clerk said that the matter appeared to be in order under the Act.

Chairman—It would be a good thing to encourage building of this kind and we will save on the rates we will collect.

Mr. Butler—I am in favour of a grant as it will be one extra house in town and might encourage other employers to provide houses for their employees but I am not suggesting that we make the maximum grant.

Mr. Clancy—Would a house so built be subject to rates at once?

The Clerk said that there would be a two-thirds remission for five years.
 After further discussion the matter was once again adjourned.

Sewer At Quay Street

The Borough Surveyor submitted an estimate of £750 for the laying of a new sewer at Quay Street.
 The Chairman said that his view was that whatever the cost the Council had a responsibility to give adequate sewerage in that area and the road through which needs repairs badly could not be done until the sewer is laid.
 He said that they should go ahead with the work at once.
 Mr. Kelly said that the Dickens Leather factory had purchased pipes one time to run their own sewer and he suggested that a deputation from officials who might meet factory to give the pipes and say £100 in view of the high estimated cost of the job.
 Mr. Butler—I think they should operate in some way and it would be no harm to meet them.
 It was agreed that the Town Clerk write to the factory requesting them to meet a deputation from the Council to discuss the matter.

Town Hall Improvements

Reporting on the proposed Town Hall improvements the architect stated that they had discussed the matter of electricity with the Local Government Engineer and his view was that the new scheme will have to meet the requirements of the new fire regulations coming into force shortly and to which all Government controlled institutions must conform.
 They felt it more desirable to have the more urgent requirements carried out at an early stage in the new roof, which though not completely fireproof would at any rate in an emergency burn sufficiently slowly to enable the hall to be roofed off instead of the present roof of light wood. Equally urgent is the provision of suitable exits. The estimated cost of the emergency lighting system is £200.
 The Chairman said the Minister's main worry in the case of tragedy he would be held responsible.
 On the recommendation of the Chairman it was decided to forward a copy of the architect's letter to the Minister.

Housing Press

A circular from the Minister referred to the draft housing programme submitted on January 1st. The programme should now be submitted to the Council for consideration. The circular added that the 1950/51 programme might provide for the acquiring of sites for a further 1949 programme is undertaken to enable the programme to be met by a continuous programme.
 The Clerk said there were 74 houses in the Abbeyside Scheme and 66 in the Gallowes Hill Scheme.
 The Chairman said they hoped to reconstruct a number of houses after building the Gallowes Hill Scheme which should give adequate housing to the people.
 It was decided that the Council did not propose to go any further at the moment.

Sewer At Sexton Street

The Chairman suggested that a sewer be put down at the back of the houses on the right side of Sexton Street. The Borough Surveyor was asked to report on the matter.
 The Borough Surveyor reported that no responsibility rested on the Council to repair the bulging near the old church. The Council accepted responsibility for that, he added they should also accept responsibility for all the sea damage along the coast line in the urban area.

Votes of sympathy

Votes of sympathy were passed to Mr. Hugh Foley, Abbeyside on the death of his sister, to Mr. Michael Fitzgerald, Tallacole, on the death of his wife, and to the relatives of the late Michael Kennedy, Abbeyside.

P.T. NOTES

 10 Minutes A Day To Perfect Health Part 2

For any one who has performed some of the exercises in part one, this second part will be quite easy. This does not necessarily mean that you have got to start with part one. You can start the 10 minutes a day system with any of the different things I am giving the change so that you will not get tired of doing the same exercises all the time.

Exercise 1—Part 2

As in the first part commence with a stretch and a yawn. To get the cobwebs from your eyes. The first exercise is a limbering-up movement to get the circulation quickened up. Rest the hands lightly on the back of a chair (this is just to keep your balance), now rise on your toes with the trunk erect and quickly sink down in a full squat position. Immediately return to an upright stance. Perform this movement 15 times rapidly and with repetition daily until you have reached 30 movements.

Exercise 2—Part 2

That first exercise should have knocked all the breath out of you so now we have an exercise to regain that breath. This is carried out whilst lying on your back with your knees raised and arms at the sides. Inhale deeply at the same time raising the arms up over your head. Exhale as the arms return to the sides. Perform 20 times. Breathe deeply.

Exercise 3—Part 2

In number 3 we have an old familiar exercise known as the "cycling" exercise. Lie on your back raise the legs and lower part of trunk and support body with hands in small of back. Keeping elbows on floor now "cycle" with feet gradually increasing speed. Make 30 revolutions with a forward action and 50 with a backward action.

Exercise 4—Part 2

This exercise is excellent for toning up the abdominal muscles and tightening the "muscular corset" that supports them. Stand erect hands clasped behind neck elbows well back. Feet apart a part. Circle the trunk to the left and bend it from the waist down left. Then swing it forward and round to the right. Finally return to upright position. Make 8 turns to left and 8 to right.

Exercise 5—Part 2

This exercise is also well known and a good arm and chest strengthener. Take up a deep dip position. Now holding the body rigid bend the arms and touch the floor with the body lightly. Push the body back again by re-straightening the arms. It is important not to allow the hips to sag. Perform 3 sets of 5 repetitions.

Exercise 6—Part 2

This last exercise is the same as the last exercise of part 1. Stand erect legs slightly apart. Lean back about 9 inches from a wall. Push the back of shoulders and head against the wall. Holding this position place the hands on the lower borders of the ribs and breathe. Try and concentrate all the air under the hands.
 Next raise the hands to mid-chest and again perform breathing exercises. Finally raise your hands to the upper-chest just under the collar bone and hold. Under the breathing you will find it hard to concentrate the air under the hands in the last two positions but do your best. Make ten complete breaths in each position.

Now you can relax—take a glance at the clock—the hands have only moved ten minutes and you have completed the 2nd part of your physical regeneration.

Of Interest

It is of interest to note that the exercises which I have been giving for the abdomen are exercised recommended by George Greenwood of the Physical Culture expert of Health and Strength. This should shake a few in the local branch.
 In two weeks time I will give you a further list of 10 Minutes a Day exercises.

A Branch of the Health and Strength League has been formed in the town. Larry Norris has been appointed League District Officer. Larry holds certificates of Physical Training and has passed tests in Physical Culture, Ju-Jitsu and body-building etc. Anyone interested can get in touch with L. Norris 3 Keating Street Dungarvan.
