## SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

(By Thomas Tobin)

This week readers I am writing a strange story about the newspaper you are now reading. As it takes up a special amount of space you will have to hold over some of my news items until next week. Incidentally in our next issue I will publish a story which really shows what the spirit of Dungarvan men was like when Ireland fought for Freedom. It is a story you must read.

## THE "DUNGARVAN LEADER" GOES TO PRESS

Some weeks ago I promised my readers that I would turn the "Spotlight" on the production of the DUNGARVAN LEADER and now I give you that story which should prove of special interest to all.

As you read your copy of the LEADER every week I wonder do you ever stop to think that behind every news item which you read lies a story which has a fascination I honestly believe that very few readers even realise the extent of the work in the production of a provincial newspaper and all with the exception of newspaper men, who take their newspapers for granted, as they would with night following day.

And so once again it is my privilege to turn the Spotlight on another "Leader" special—this time on the LEADER itself.

It all starts when the reporter takes in his copy (reports) to the Editor who at once gives it a thorough check-over. Having passed it as suitable and ready for publication he then hands it to the Linotype operator where it is set up in type. This is passed on to the Compositor who arranges it in the galley and then puts it through the proof press to get a "proof" which is known as a "proof". The Compositor hands this over to the Reader who checks it and marks out any errors or flaws etc. which there may be in the type. The proof is then handed back to the Linotype operator and he promptly remedies whatever errors there may be by setting up new type to replace the faulty ones. When all errors have been remedied the proof is taken of the type and when finally passed as fit for publication it is set up in page form. Finally when all are ready to go to press the pages are made up in the frames and then fitted into the machine. A Machineman then "makes ready" and when all is in order he turns out a proof copy of the newspaper. Once again this comes into the hands of the Editor M. C. Nagle who carefully reads over by his eagle eyes. When he is satisfied that everything is in order he gives the signal to the Machine man and the Press starts to roll turning out the weekly supply of the DUNGARVAN LEADER.

The work is far from complete at this stage and as a matter of fact from here on the job papers are counted out, bundled and parcelled and then distribution begins. As most of our readers already know the DUNGARVAN LEADER reaches the most remote districts of County Waterford and the surrounding Counties and you will appreciate what an organised system of delivery this requires.

Every possible means of transport is utilised and as a result the LEADER is taken through to bring into the homes of Waterford County and into the homes of Waterford men and women outside their home County and outside their home land the weekly news, facts and interviews of all home affairs.

To all the hometown paper means a great deal, and has a big influence over its many readers and therefore, the Editorial Department has a massive responsibility. The Editor's course shoulders this great responsibility and every item he receives from his reporters and correspondents has to be thoroughly considered. As the backbone of the reading public is comprised of good Catholic Irishmen and women, the material published must be strictly above board and entirely in their interests. The local newspaper must be constantly prepared to further and fight for the interests of its own town and county. It should report the facts honestly and fairly and give all its aims should be TO PROVE AT ALL TIMES A GUIDING STAR TO ITS MANY READERS.

The "pros" and cons of an Editor's job are indeed many and his decisions in the question of all items for publication always follow careful consideration. This has to be, as I have already stated in the interests of the readers. So, as you can gather from this, everything received by the newspaper cannot be published because of many reasons besides that which I have pointed out above. It is a big job and a nerve-racking one. In the future I trust our many readers will bear these facts in mind when their contributions are not accepted.

And now for the other men behind the scenes—the Linotype Operators, the Compositor, the Machine Men, and the Apprentices—all these have

their own job of work to perform as I have referred to in the production story. Their work is one which requires skill, taste and above all—patience (especially when Works Manager John J. Troy or Compositor John Norris will tell you someone like Thomas Tobin rushes in a few minutes before going to Press and shouts "Hold Everything! Special News Item!")—Yes readers that is the way the poor reporter is welcomed at the office.

He covers everything that is something and has to know something about everything. His job is never finished and the only time he can relax is when he closes his eyes in sleep. No matter where he goes his pencil note-book and handy pen never leave him. He enters his office his note-book contains new facts—facts which build up a story of interest to his readers. He has to collect and write the news. The Editor censors it, the inside men print it and you read it and when all can sit back and relax the reporter must still carry on for the next edition.

Newspaper life is a hard-working life but one of continuous fascination and those who enter this sphere of life usually devote their years to it without breaking away from this work which is their very life itself. When they leave this earth they leave behind them the generation to follow a historical record of the world and their land as it was throughout each day they lived in it.

This is a strange thought but one which is as true as life itself and when on Christmas Eve 1938 the first issue of the DUNGARVAN LEADER appeared a new chapter was opened in the history of the Old Boro'. Through hardships and setbacks through the years which seemed unmountable the DUNGARVAN LEADER paved its way and successfully overcame its trials and tribulations.

Today this enterprise of a true newspaper man, Mr. F. Nagle—the DUNGARVAN LEADER is a wonderful success. Its circulation is far and wide. Its equipment and machinery modern and its workers thoroughly efficient and its friendships and goodwill admired and appreciated by all.

And so before I sign off I would like to remind my many readers that this is the story which lies behind the print you now read. A strange story perhaps but one worth of contemplation.

**Co. Waterford**  
**Committee of Agriculture**  
 Committee Favours One Instructor For Three Parishes Scheme

**But Wants Veterinary Surgeons and Horticultural Instructors Included**  
 And Subsidy for Fertilisers

Mr. P. R. Power, chairman of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture held in Dungarvan, on Saturday last. There were 50 items on the agenda for attention most of which dealt with general routine matters. Minister Will Attend Later Meeting.

A letter from the private secretary to the Minister for Agriculture (Mr. J. M. Dillon), conveyed the Ministers' views to the Committee for their invitation to him to attend a meeting but stated that the Minister regretted that it was not possible for him to address the next meeting but that he would arrange to do so as early as practicable.

**Minister's Scheme Favoured—But With Alterations**

The letter from the Minister for Agriculture setting forth a scheme for the appointment of an instructor in agriculture for each of the three parishes (adjourned from the previous meeting) came up again for consideration. Mr. M. O'Riordan asked if this scheme was adopted generally would there be a sufficient number of qualified men in the county.

Mr. P. Conroy (C.A.O.) said that the scheme would mean no change as far as the existing instructors of the Committee were concerned, but he felt that two could not cover the demands of the county and that was a fact which was generally recognised. He said that the opinion of an expert on the matter was that no real progress could be made until the number of instructors was quadrupled. He said he intended to provide these extra instructors at extra cost to the Committee and then individual attention could be given to all farmers in the county.

Mr. Heskin asked if the Minister guaranteed that extra instructors would be appointed to the Committee and then individual attention could be given to all farmers in the county.

Mr. Heskin said that while he was not challenging any hatches in the county he believed that diseased chicks were coming from new areas and he wanted to know if there was a check-up on the supply farms and what comes out of the hatcheries. He also asked if hatcheries can go outside for eggs.
