Papal Flag Incident Again Discussed at U.D.C. Meeting

Members Walk Out In Protest

At last Friday night's meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council, Mr. T. McCarthy, Chairman presiding, Mr. N. Kelly, referring to the Papal Flag incident in Dungarvan proposed a resolution of protest against its removal.

Addressing the Council in support of his resolution Mr. Kelly said that he was sorry to have been absent at the last meeting when they discussed the removal of the Papal Flag from the Protestant Church wall where it had been hoisted as part of the decorations in honour of the Corpus Christi Procession.

Mr. Kelly said that for almost twenty years no one ever objected to these decorations and now a stranger walks into town and demands their withdrawal through the arm of the law.

"I can see these people mind their own business," said Mr. Kelly. "They'd be much better off. Certain members of the Council were approached, he said by prominent Protestant members of the town, and he thought that it was indeed apparent that they were using a hush-hush campaign. And why?" said Mr. Kelly. "I wasn't plain to be seen they were afraid they knew they had done wrong."

Contributing Mr. Kelly said: "I am not blaming all the Protestants in the town, but the action of the Rev. Mr. Bryce was most reasonable and he thinks he can adopt this policy here in Dungarvan, then he has another guess coming." The Papal Flag was he thought, recognised all over the world as an international flag. Only a short while ago said Mr. Kelly, Princess Margaret Rose went to Rome and had an audience with the Pope but did she object to the Papal Flag?—You may rest assured she did not. He said she believed the Selwyn Vestry had nothing to do with this incident and the Minister had no right whatever to take the matter into his own hands.

The Chairman (Mr. McCarthy) said that when the deputation from the Council went to see Canon O'Brien, they got sound advice and they took it. He asked the other members of the deputation present to bear him out in this, which they did. This matter could lead to dirty work and that is the last thing we want to happen. James O'Leary, 7 Oliver Plunkett Street, Clonmel, P.O.A., and Patk Devereaux, Gordonstown, Tipperary, fined 2/6, were summoned for having indistinguishable number plates.

During the week a Dungarvan man serving his country in another part of the Emerald Isle wrote me a very interesting letter for which I am indeed grateful. He wishes to be referred to as "Old Gael" and states: "It is indeed with great pleasure I read the 'Dungarvan Leader' every week, especially your Spotlight feature which is always so interesting. I should like to see the date when we shall have it in book form. A book such as you plan to write or I should say a book of what you have already written would help considerably the younger generations of Ireland in the historical facts of their native land. I believe we are a very modest type of people, especially around Dungarvan and West Waterford and it would do no harm to assert ourselves in the many colourful incidents of our County, as a whole."

I certainly agree with "Old Gael" here and as a matter of fact to show how modest the people of this area really are—some of them would not dream of giving me information regarding any of the incidents of our Fight For Freedom.

So you can imagine how difficult it is for me to collect the material for my stories. However, readers you can rest assured nothing can keep me from turning the Spotlight on the great Unknown.

And now for another stranger than fiction story about a man from Old Parish who became a famous American Senator and whose death is today mourned by millions of Californians not only in California alone, but all over the world.

On his parents farm at Old Parish, Co. Waterford, Mike Burns toiled from morning to night to reap the fruits of the land. He was just a young man and like most young men he had burning hopes of world travel and wide adventures. Day after day, he would gaze out to sea and long for the time when he might experience the great unknown beyond the blue horizon.

Finally that day came and as Mike had farewells to his folks at home he little thought his future could hold such a glorious career. But as he glanced back at the old home he drove out on the first part of his journey and as the old folks waved "goodbye," Mike never thought that he was leaving Old Ireland forever. He never found an opportunity of coming back and now he rests in eternal peace beneath the soil of Sunny California.

After leaving home, Mike joined the Royal Navy, and served in the Engine room department. Like the words of the song—

"He joined the Navy to see the world but all he saw was the sea and so he decided to try his luck in the Land of Golden Opportunity. In 1908 Mike Burns landed in the U.S.A. and settled in Eureka where he became a machinist and a master mechanic.

Then the folks at home began to wonder several years had passed by and Mike's letters had been few and far between. Then a close friend of the family Rev. Father S. Barron was assigned to the Mission Fields of America and before he departed, Mike's mother asked him to look up her son when he got back.

Father Barron never forgot Mrs. Burns' request and as time went by he kept a careful watch-out for Mike but for years he was unsuccessful.

Life sometimes plays strange deals and in the case of Father Barron's search for Mike Burns nothing could have been more stranger. It was at a dinner in the home of a Parish priest that Father Barron was introduced to a SENATOR MICHAEL BURNS, a native of Ireland who were soon discussing the old country and it was not long before he discovered that at last he had found the Mike Burns of Old Parish County Waterford.

It was a happy meeting for the two Irish exiles and one which brought greater happiness to an old Irish mother who was anxiously awaiting news of her long lost son. Mike's letter brought tears of joy to his loved ones more so to learn that he was now a Senator in the U.S.A.

Yes, Mike had gone a long way since he sailed away from home and had lived a colorful life and had won a colorful career. He was a friend of America and an Irishman Americans were proud of. He helped to build a better America his work today stands as a monument to his memory, which will live throughout California for all time as a symbol of PROGRESS through struggle and determination and trust in God.

Mike Burns today rests in peace in the land of his adoption his parents too are now gone to their eternal reward but his story and theirs, can never die. It will live forever.

Writing of Mike Burns' death a well known Columnist "Scoop Beal" wrote the following in an American newspaper, last month:—

"They said goodbye to Mike Burns today—huge crowds of wet-eyed men and women, many of his personal friends and many who knew the famed Humboldt County State Senator only casually—but to all a champion of the people in this community, they gathered for the services this morning to pay final tribute to the passing of this beloved figure—state officials from Sacramento, local businessmen, housewives, and common labourers—when the news came from Sacramento Sunday that suddenly died it was a shock to all who knew the man—just a few weeks before a group of Humboldt county businessmen had made a flying trip to Sacramento on legislative business—while in the state capitol they gave a banquet honouring Senator Burns—they lauded the veteran legislator in their talks and the other members of the deputation present to bear him out in this, which they did. This matter could lead to dirty work and that is the last thing we want to happen. It would prove a disgrace if they talk for Basil Brook and his many friends up in the North.

Moore Mrs. Henry Carlsson, Misses Frances and Patricia Burns and his sons Bernard and Paul Burns as well as to his relatives here in Ireland, Mr. Tom Burns (brother), and Mrs. Cahill (sister) both residing in Old Parish we join in extending sincere sympathy on our own behalf and on behalf of our many readers.

4 To those with small means of the Health Authority pays cash allowances to keep the household going while the breadwinner is being treated at home or in a Sanatorium

5 Also there is an allowance for rent rates etc. and an allowance for domestic help in certain cases

6 The free tuberculosis service and financial aid are provided by the community because tuberculosis can be eradicated if people look for treatment early enough
