"Nothing To See Or Hear At Dungarvan Aerochro" —Mr. Clancy

Recent Display Of Students' Work Praised  
 Building Instruction In Rural Areas

In the absence of the Very Rev. Chairman An Fear Mor Vice-Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee held at Sgoil na gCeard, Dungarvan, on Monday evening last. Messrs. A. Walsh, M. McGrath, Senator Butler, D. Coghlan, M. Clancy, M. F. Walsh, N. Kelly and M. Hartly were present.

Mr. D. Cullinane, C.E.O. attended.

**Financial Matters**  
 A letter from the Department approved of an honorarium of £50 0d to Mr. D. St. Claire Hill in connection with his services at the recent displays at Dungarvan and Cappoquin.

A letter from the Department referred to the remuneration of superintendents at examinations and approved a scale of 6 per hour according to qualifications.

**Instruction in Building**  
 A letter from the Department set out details of a course which would be followed by manual instructors in the instruction of students of rural areas in building so that they could put the knowledge into practice in improving their own holdings in the erection of outbuildings, piers, walls, etc.

Mr. Clancy said that the best method of putting the idea into operation would be to have a class in a large centre like Dungarvan where the students could gather the same as was done with regard to the recent farriery classes. He held that this would be the most efficient and economic method.

Referring to the farriery course Mr. Clancy said that it had been a great success as was proved by the splendid exhibits of general blacksmith's work which had been included in the recent display of students' work.

Mr. P. Caulfield chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Board of Assistance held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs. R. Barron, Senator Butler, T. Kyne, T. D. M. O'Ryan, F. Roche, P. Browne, W. Kennedy, and M. McGrath were present.

Mr. M. O'Flaherty Secretary attended.

**Next Meeting**  
 As the next monthly meeting would fall on Monday August 15th a holiday it was agreed that the meeting be held on the following Monday.

The Chairman made an order that the election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman take place at that meeting.

**Nurses Accommodation**  
 A letter from the Minister for Health in reference to the Board's application for a grant towards the cost of provision of accommodation for nurses at the County Hospital regretted that a grant could not be made from the Hospitals' Trust Fund towards the work estimated to cost £200.

After a short discussion it was decided to leave the matter over to Mr. Kyne, T.D., and Senator Butler saw the Minister on the matter.

**Maternity Wing**  
 A letter from the Department in reply to a suggestion concerning the use of accommodation at the County Home suggested that a small maternity wing should be erected alongside the County Hospital and if the Board were prepared to submit plans for such a project they would be sanctioned.

Mr. O'Ryan referred to the proposed new hospital. Senator Butler—And won't there be accommodation for maternity cases in that?

Secretary—Yes.  
 Senator Butler—Have you any idea when that might be started?

Secretary—It is hard to say but we would want some guarantee of a grant before we commit ourselves to the other matter.

Mr. O'Ryan—I think that would be waste as it would have to be abandoned when the new hospital is built.

Mr. Kyne—What use are the old offices to be put to?

The Secretary said that there was no reference to those offices in the course of the discussion and that the members agreed that there would be no reason to build a new maternity wing and finally it was agreed that members should forward the receipts to the Divisional Secretary as soon after the fixture as possible.

The Secretary said that he then wrote to Dr. Condon when the latter resumed duty, but he said he could not make a recommendation as the patient had not been before him and arrangements had now been made to have the patient examined by Dr. Condon.

Senator Butler said that it was very peculiar that even though an order had been made by the Manager in the case the glasses had not been obtained and as a result of six months by the doctors the woman was going blind.

When the Secretary said that the matter would be attended to this week Senator Butler agreed to drop the matter until the next meeting.

 Mr. Kyne said that he had received a complaint from a man concerning the treatment of his daughter at the County Hospital but as he did not know whether the facts were correct or not he was prepared to supply a written statement to the Secretary.

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
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

### SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

As I see it—Once again readers I give me great pleasure to turn the Spotlight on a number of special items worthy of our readers attention. Last week through this column I caused a few hot discussions when I revealed a number of bookish scenes facts but today I want to announce that as time goes by I will turn the Spotlight on even more startling facts concerning Dungarvan and Co. Waterford.

**Is Dungarvan Unimportant?**—The Daily Newspapers seem to think so.

I take it that at sometime or other most of my readers have read the column appearing in the Daily Press which states the time of the tides at all seaports throughout Ireland that is of course all important. For as time goes by I will turn the Spotlight on even more startling facts concerning Dungarvan and Co. Waterford.

**Pattern Day**—Sunday next, July 24th is Pattern Day of Ardmore but today the date means little to the modern generations of 1949.

Many of my older readers however will remember the time when the Pattern Day was eagerly looked forward to by all residents of the Co. Waterford and when for days before the big event thousands of visitors would be flowing into St. Declan's village to participate in the ceremonies.

How or when the Pattern originated is not known but it is believed that its formal rise was in the 12th century. Very Rev. Canon Power D.Lit. M.R.I.A. writing on Ardmore stated he could not trace the devotion to the Holy Well further back than 150 years but he added that there can be little doubt that in one form or another the devotion in question is more ancient by centuries.

It would seem as if in former times the popular patronal devotion centred around the Beannachan and the graveyard rather than around the Holy Well as today. A prominent feature of the celebrations 300 years ago was the veneration of St. Declan's skull which was preserved in the oratory towards the west.

Many years ago abuses almost led to the suppression of the fete but thanks to the local clergy a ban was put upon the public houses and a return to good order was the consequence. Years later the Parish Priest, Rev. John Walsh, obtained from the Holy See an Indulgence for the celebration in the Church.

It is interesting to note that the fete began with seven Paters and Aves which the Pilgrim recites kneeling before the Well, then he walks slowly three times around the Well—proceeding towards the sun, saying five decades of the Rosary. Having completed the third circuit he kneels before the Well where he finishes, if he has not already completed his Rosary. A second mass of seven Paters and Aves is then added after which the client of St. Declan may bathe alling lime eyes etc. in the shallow tank to the east of the Well.

Finally as a record of his devotions the pilgrim scratches with a piece of slate the outline of a cross upon a stone set in modern masonry at the east end of the Well.

There is a strange story recorded regarding the fate of the skull of St. Declan. In the early years of the 17th century it had

All this when the Pattern Day was DUNGARVAN and now maybe those responsible would kindly look into this matter at their earliest convenience.

**ARMORE'S FAMOUS PATTERN DAY**

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There is a strange story recorded regarding the fate of the skull of St. Declan. In the early years of the 17th century it had

become so worn and infirm from great age, much handling and long exposure that in the year 1642 it had to be sent for repair to Hercules Beer a silversmith of Youghal and substituted in the head crumbled to pieces with the result it went beyond repair. The silversmith then worked his own head and used another man's head in his place. He cured the skull of John Dromada a feion, who a short time previously had suffered the extreme penalty of the law at Youghal and substituted it for the original relic of the skull of St. Declan. Using brains and some silver, of course Beer put a silver plate on the tough-gut in order to make everything look in order and believe it or not but the fraud was not detected until it was too late—when the original fragments were beyond recovery.

And now again on Sunday next hundreds of pilgrims will visit Ardmore—they will stand beneath the shadow of its old Round Tower and behold for the first time in many years the original fragments of the skull of St. Declan.

**SPOTLIGHT SPOTS**  
 During the next few weeks your reporter hopes to meet a number of interesting people which will be visiting this area in connection with the coverage of an old Irish event. I hope to be able to tag along with the radio and through this column I will give my readers a strange story behind the scenes of a Radio Eireann Recording. Then when you hear the programme being broadcast over the radio you will be able to picture the scene as clearly as if you had been there.

I understand that the students of the Technical School Dungarvan are to be allowed 1 1/2 hours for organised games throughout the future, and that it is hoped that before long the school will have a very fine hurling and football team. A very good playing field can be obtained if it is expected, for at least sometime and by then they should be well ahead on the road of their ambitions.
