Tallow & Moorehill Notes

Harvesting Operations—Due to the ideal weather conditions prevailing for the past six weeks ripening of the oats and barley crops has made marvellous progress. So much so that harvesting operations have been begun in the valley of the Bride and by the time these "Notes" appear in print should be well under way and from all sides come the report of very favourable returns. The wheat crop which on most farms stood up well to the recent heavy rains is making good progress to the ripening stage. It is earnestly hoped that the present climatic conditions will continue to favour the harvesting operations all through the season. The recent rains have proved most beneficial to the green crops which some weeks ago indicated little return but are now credited as being likely to yield favourable results. So from daybreak to dark harvesting operations will continue but the onerous task can be made much lighter by the continuance of favourable weather so let us hope Mr. Weatherman will continue in his present amicable mood.

Regretted Demise—It is with very deep regret we record the death of Mr. Daniel Donovan, which sad event occurred at his residence Killywinny Tallow on Tuesday last week following a very brief illness and at an early age. Member of an old and highly respected family he was held in the highest esteem by all classes of the community, and from far and near came expressions of very deep sympathy at the announcement of his unexpected demise. Kindly genial and unassuming he was one of the most popular inhabitants of the district and by his death the town and surrounding area has lost a good neighbour and a grand personality.

Deceased was well-known in sporting circles and was a keen exponent of the gun and dog and was a 'crack' shot in the district while on many occasions he gave outstanding displays at clay pigeon shooting competitions. Competent and kindling him a good and worthy opponent but a sportsman to his fingertips. To his bereaved brothers and other relatives very deep sympathy is extended in their sorrow and loss.
