ON THE RAINS GAME"

On Sunday and Monday the rains came and Dungarvan experienced rather serious flooding. O'Connell Street was almost completely under water. Several houses and shops suffered. Hundreds of Mass-goers were marooned on the streets for well over an hour and I am told that quite a few got an unexpected dip.

THE ROSSIARE EXPRESS

SOLDIER TAKEN OFF TRAIN

During the week I came across a most unusual story which appeared in the Cork Examiner dated several days ago. It should prove of special interest to our many readers as it tells of an amazing incident which took place at Kilmacthomas.

The story of the capture of a number of military by Sinn Feiners reached Waterford yesterday. The Rossiaire Express was held up at Kilmacthomas Co. Waterford, by a large number of armed and masked men probably numbering 500. The express does not stop here but the signalman was ordered to put the signal against the train at the point of the revolver.

The Sinn Fein standstill the train was searched and soldiers proceeding on leave from Cork were taken out and surrounded by a swarm of disguised men. One soldier going to visit his dying mother and two others proceeding to visit sick relatives, were allowed to proceed. The remainder were surrounded front flank and rear by armed men. Still disguised the party headed by a Sinn Feiner proceeded through the village. The soldiers were unarmed. Later a council of War was held by the Sinn Feiners as to the disposal of the soldiers and it was decided to billet them in various houses for the night. The Post Office being selected as affording accommodation for a certain number of the men. The Sinn Fein kit bags were taken away and a few overcoats none of which have up to the present been returned.

The next day a military party proceeded to the village from Waterford and escorted the soldiers back to that city. A detachment of military numbering 100 have been placed in charge of the village and are quartered in the Workhouse."
