POULTRY HATCHERIES ACT, 1947

Under the Poultry Hatcheries Act 1947 a licence is required for operating any poultry hatchery not of a class exempted from licensing by Regulations made under the Act by the Minister for Agriculture, and a provisional permit is required by persons who supply hatching eggs to any licensed poultry hatchery. The following classes of poultry hatcheries are exempt from licensing under the Regulations: (a) Any poultry hatchery of less than 300 eggs incubator capacity except one which operates as an adjunct of a hatching egg supply farm and engages in the distribution of chickens by sale or otherwise. (A licence is required for the latter class of hatchery) (b) Any poultry hatchery operating as an adjunct of an approved poultry station under the Poultry Stations Scheme administered by a County Committee of Agriculture. (c) Any poultry hatchery which the Minister for Agriculture is satisfied is operating for experimental or educational purposes. Application for hatchery licences and provisional permits for the hatching season commencing 1st November, 1949 and ending 31st May 1950 are now being considered. Does Tobacco Shorten Lives?

A difficult question to answer I have studied experts opinions and it and although well aware that smoking is harmful I am in doubt as to whether it shortens lives. There have been men who lived passed the century and smoked all their lives. But smoking is a habit and if they never smoked it still is true that in this modern age fewer people reached the 100 mark.

Does not this seem to convey that smoking combined with the other modern conveniences have some effect on living. In the "good old days" cigars cost as much as a dollar and few could afford to smoke to excess. POTATO SILAGE

Irish farming is traditionally associated with potato growing and it is admitted that no other country shows so much skill in the cultivation of the crop. It is the case though that far too many farmers having gone to the trouble and expense of raising quite good crops during the growing season fail to appreciate the value of the produce. Four tons of potatoes are fully equivalent in food value to one ton of maize for stock breeding and this evaluation includes both small damaged and blighted or 'blackened' tubers as met with at digging time. Even in a year where the percentage of small and waste potatoes is small at digging time there is quite an appreciable loss of tubers sustained in the subsequent storage in pits and clamps. Sprouting and dry rot equivalent usually account for a loss of some 10% to 20% of the crop by the following Spring. In the present season where we know from actual field trials and tests carried out throughout the county that the percentage of 'waste' in the potato crop is alarmingly high it is estimated that from a fourth of the crop will be lost before Xmas unless farmers take immediate steps to preserve the surplus by conversion into silage.

No manufacturing industry could afford to lose 20% of its output. The basic industry of farming cannot afford such a loss either. It is worth while going to some trouble to prevent this otherwise inevitable loss of valuable crop taking place. It is not equivalent to some £20 per acre in terms of maize. The only practicable means of avoiding loss is the simple one of making silage. Now the making of potato silage is a much simpler problem than the making of grass silage, although the latter is not technically difficult either. Having collected the various quantities of small blighted and surplus carry over of stock feeding tubes these are cooked by steaming or boiling and packed, while still hot in a suitable container. The silage is then sealed off by covering over with soft grass and earth to a depth of 6 inches. Fermentation takes place through the mass with the production of lactic acid which improves the palatability of the silage and preserves it in sweet condition for subsequent feeding to pigs poultry etc.

The County Committee of Agriculture staged a number of demonstrations last year showing how large quantities of potatoes may be readily converted into silage using a simple cooker supplied by the Irish Sugar Company Growers with large surpluses on hands should consider engaging such a unit this year and prepare a suitable trench in sloping ground or building a suitable length of concrete wall parallel to an existing smooth wall of a building leaving a width of 3 to 4 feet between the concrete wall and space so provided will hold about 5 cwt of silage. Other types of suitable containers or silos will suggest themselves to growers having small supplies of tubers on hand. Potato silage will store well even in clean casks or barrels. The important thing to remember is that having washed the tubers clean of soil they are boiled or steamed and packed while still hot into the container. The surface is then sealed off from the air. It is very much to be hoped that Co-Operative Societies or other enterprises will consider the purchase and hiring of suitable mobile cooking units for the processing of potato silage on every farm each year. Such a service would in time be recognised as indispensable to the farmer as that of the threshing mill. In a season such as the present one where upwards of 20% of the crop is damaged by blackening second growth etc. the cost of the unit would be saved several times over in preventing the huge loss of crop otherwise inevitable. Any grower requiring further information on this subject should consult the instructor in Agriculture or obtain a copy of the Department's Leaflet on Potato Silage No 120.

Poultry Hatcheries

Applications for statutory licences to operate poultry hatcheries during the hatching season commencing 1st November 1949 and ending 31st May, 1950 and for provisional permits to supply hatching eggs to hatcheries are now being considered by the Department of Agriculture and requests for application forms should be made at once to the Department. As indicated in our advertising columns certain classes of hatcheries are exempt from licensing.
