Dungarvan U.D.C.
Estimated Contribution Of 1/2d. From Rates For New Houses.

Abbeyside Sewers
Mr T McCarthy chairman presided at the fortnightly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council on last Friday night. Messrs J Good, J Keane and M O'Leary were present. Mr E Deery Town Clerk attended.

Rates Contribution For New Houses
The Town Clerk reported on the calculations for the rates contribution towards the reduction of the rents of the houses at the Abbeyside Scheme. He stated that a total contribution of £684 6s 0d would be needed and due to an increase in the gross valuation of the town, assuming that the valuation of the houses would be £7 10s and £8 a penny would realise £49 6s 0d so that a total estimated at 1 2 would be required. He said that the reduction from the original estimate was due to the increased valuation. He gave the rents of the various types of houses in the scheme on the new scale as follows—

18 houses at 14/10 plus 4/8 rates (no contribution) total 18/6
18 houses at 14/1 plus 4/8 rates (contribution 3/-) total 15/9
18 houses at 13/2 plus 4/4 rates (contribution 3/-) total 14/6
23 houses at 13/2 plus 4/4 rates (contribution 3/-) total 10/-

Mr Veale said that the houses valued at £7 10s and £8 would have a heavy E.S.B. bill to meet. Abbeyside Sewers
Concerning the Council's request to the Department for a grant for the erection of a number of independent sewerage discharges to low water at Strandside South. The estimated cost £2,000. The Department replied that they were not in favour of a number of such independent discharges and suggested that further consideration be given to the outfall sewer scheme as contained in a previous letter.

It was decided to ask the Department if this work would qualify for a relief grant.
Loan Repayment Period
A resolution from Castleblaney UDC requesting the Government to extend the repayment period of loans for houses to 7 years was unanimously adopted.

O'Connell Street Light
The application from nine residents for an extra light on O'Connell Street has been received from the E.S.B.
Mr Good complained that the lights on the archway and at the quay had not been lighting for a couple of nights.
The Chairman said that the lights at the quay should never be out.

It was decided to write to the E.S.B.
Abbeyside Scheme
The September report from the Acting Borough Surveyor stated the 14 houses at the Abbeyside Scheme were completed except for painting & were fully completed 56 were up to roof level and 8 to first floor level.

A letter from Mr M Keane, Assistant County Surveyor stated that the flooding at the corner of Strandside South and Strandside East was due to the dumping of rubbish in front of the gullet.
Mr O'Leary said that this should be run out further as the tides bring in the rubbish and do not take it away.
It was decided to point this out to the Engineer.

Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture
Motion re Horticultural Scheme Withdrawn

Opposition To Temporary Poultry Instructors Appointment

Mr P R Power chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Committee of Agriculture held at the Courthouse Dungarvan on Saturday last. Messrs M O'Ryan D Leahy R Barron, M Harty W Norris M McGrath J Walsh the Coghlan T Morrissey D Heskin, J Mansfield W Dower and T Power, were present.
Messrs P Conroy C.A.O. P O Shea and P Sullivan Horticultural Instructors M O'Sullivan and D Walsh Agricultural Instructors. Miss M Mullins Poultry Instructor were in attendance.

Valuation Limit Motion Withdrawn
Mr T Morrissey moved a motion that applicants for beehives under the County Horticultural Scheme and for other such benefits should be limited to not exceed a maximum of £40 on a valuation basis or £500 p.a. on a cash income basis.
The motion arose out of a discussion at a previous meeting concerning the eligibility of certain applicants for grants under the scheme.
The Horticultural Instructor during the course of the discussion on the motion said that the number of applicants over the figures mentioned in the motion was very small.
The Chairman gave it as his view that as this number was so small that it was not worth changing the method by which the scheme was presently being administered.

Mr Barron said that the qualifications should be the same as those for grants under the farm improvements scheme and should be confined to those who derive their livelihood solely from farming. He said that beekeeping was part of farming and what he wanted to stop was those who had plenty of money and were well able to purchase these things themselves. He said that he knew an applicant for a subsidy under the lime scheme and from his information this applicant had enough money to buy out nearly all the farms in the county but still he applied to the ratepayers for a grant to buy lime!
In reply to Mr Harty Mr O'Shea said that there were only a few applicants over the figures mentioned in the motion. In fact he would prefer to see the scheme was always given to the poor man and to those others who apply a promise of a hive later in the season is given provided no further applications are made by the poorer class applicants.

The Chairman said that as the scheme as it was being presently administered he did not think it worth the change.
Finally after further discussion Mr Morrissey agreed to withdraw the motion and the allocation of grants under the scheme was left to the discretion of the Instructor hereafter.

Mr Morrissey raised again the question of marketing honey and the price for it and said that the Beekeepers Association had expressed a great deal of dissatisfaction as Irish honey could not be disposed of. He proposed a resolution to the effect that Beekeepers were dissatisfied with the reply of the Minister to their last request and that it did not meet with their wishes. There is a large amount of home produced honey which cannot be disposed of due to the presence of foreign honey in the country and the importation of this foreign honey should be accordingly stopped.
Supporting his resolution Mr Morrissey said that there were about 500 or 600 tons of honey in the country which could not be disposed of.
The C.A.O. pointed out the Department's letter stated that imported honey was subject to 1/- per lb import duty except where it is needed for manufacturing purposes and this duty in their opinion provided a sufficient barrier to the sale of home produced honey.
Mr Morrissey held that the only thing was to stop the importation altogether.
After a long discussion, during which it was pointed out that there was not a sufficient home

Born some 70 years ago at Waterford the late Sean O'Flainn, had from his earliest days a keen interest in the Irish language and in his life time he left his mark in every movement for the advancement of Irish culture.

He was a well-known figure in the Ring Gaeltacht and was closely associated with the foundation of Coláiste na Rinne where for many years he taught as a professor and his death will be the cause of genuine regret to his former associates at this great centre of Gaelic teaching as well as to the many residents who will remember him with affection for his quiet, affable and unassuming manner.
Mr O'Flainn was a regular contributor to the "Leader" and acted as correspondent for the Carrick-on-Suir district. He was also a well-known reviewer of books and possessed one of the finest private libraries in the county.

THE "BEECHFIELD" CASE
Dungarvan U.D.C. To Pay £3,257 Damages

Reserved judgment was given by Mr Justice Davitt in the High Court Dublin on Monday last in favour of the Zillah Shipping and Carrying Co Ltd 7 Chapel Street Liverpool in the Admiralty action against Dungarvan Urban District Council and the Zillah Shipping and Carrying Co. Ltd. The Council had claimed damages from the Dungarvan Urban District Council for damage to their steamship the s.s. Beechfield on the 22nd May 1947 while in berth in Dungarvan harbour. They alleged negligence by the Council as conservators of the harbour and claimed damages for breach of warranty taken by the Urban District Council that the berth was in a fit and proper condition for the s.s. Beechfield.

The s.s. Beechfield arrived at Dungarvan harbour on the 22nd May 1947 and a cargo of 400 tons of wood in compliance with an order of the Harbour Master the vessel was moved to another berth on the 22nd May 1947 where loading was continued. In the meantime the s.s. Beechfield in that berth took ground on the fall of the tide and the s.s. Beechfield took the ground that day. The berth however was not in a fit and safe condition for the vessel to be in with rough uneven and defective with inequalities and depressions in its surface and consequently the vessel was strained buckled and otherwise injured. It was not found possible to load portion of the cargo and the Zillah Shipping and Carrying Co. lost the use of the ship for a period of 46 days and six hours. It was claimed that the Council or its officers ought to have known that the berth was not in a fit and safe condition for the vessel to be in and that the berth was not maintained in a safe or proper condition, was unsafe and dangerous and reasonable steps were not taken to ascertain that the berth was in such a condition as not to cause injury to the s.s. Beechfield before she was ordered to lie and remain there.

For the defence, negligence was denied and it was pleaded that any injury to the s.s. Beechfield was not caused by any act or default by the Council. Warranty that the berth was in a safe condition was denied and it was pleaded that the Council was not liable in any event in respect of the matters complained of to an aggregate amount exceeding £3 per ton, the tonnage of the ship for the purpose of the limitation under the Merchant Shipping Acts amounting to 407 tons.

The Judgment
Mr Justice Davitt giving reserved judgment gave a decree for £3,257 18s 6d plus interest at 6 per cent from the 29th August 1947 up to Monday. He said that it was clear from the evidence that the ship had been damaged and that the damage had been caused by the condition of the berth. He was satisfied that the damage to the ship had been caused by the ship herself. The ledge in the ground which did the damage was at an angle of 70 feet forward from the propeller of the ship. The ship had been the subject of her own misfortune. It was quite clear that there was no absolute duty on the defendants to keep the berth safe and the harbour safe for shipping. It was equally clear however that the berth in question was not safe and the defendants had not known whether it was safe or not.

The defendants had a duty to see whether the berth was reasonably safe and if they were not to warn shipping accordingly. Either the berths were safe or they were not, and if they were not, shipping must be advised not to go there. The least onerous duty they (defendants) had was to tell the master of the ship that they did not know whether the berth was safe or not. The proper person to discharge that duty was the Harbour Master, and he had not done so.

The ship's master had said that he was never in Dungarvan Harbour previously. There was no doubt that if the master of the ship had been informed about the condition of the ground at the berth the ship would not have been grounded. There was no support in the evidence for the plea of contributory negligence. The Harbour Master had however failed to deal with the problem. There was no evidence to suggest that the allocation of berths was not at the absolute discretion of the Harbour Master. There had been negligence it seemed clear by the Harbour Master to give appropriate warning.

Mr Justice Davitt gave judgment for £3,257 18s 6d which was the amount agreed upon as limited liability.
Mr J Ryan SC who with Mr Bugh SC Mr J Miller (instructed by Messrs D and T Fitzgerald) appeared for the Zillah Shipping Co, said that if the suggestion of limited liability was to be accepted he would ask that the money be lodged in Court, together with the interest. He would also ask for costs.
Mr Justice Davitt decided to adjourn the question of lodgment of the money and interest, and also the question of costs for legal argument.

Mr Frank Fitzgibbon SC Mr Darcy Biney SC and Mr J A Darcy (instructed by Messrs J F Williams and Sons) represented the Urban Council.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

AFTER THE STORM
Well readers, you have often heard it said that after a storm comes a calm and now the storm has blown over and once again everything is calm—almost. NEWS FROM THE U.S.
During the week one of my American correspondents sent me the following item which he states should prove of special interest to our Dungarvan readers. It is taken from the "Irish Echo" dated October 15th but I am afraid I cannot give you much information on the Irishman mentioned therein as I do not seem able to trace his local connections. If any of my readers can do this I would appreciate hearing from them.
The item is as follows—

A meeting Tom Curran of Chicago at Croke Park on Sunday recalled old Gaelic days in the Windy City not alone to the writer, but also to Eddie Roberts who played there over 20 years ago. Tom a native of Dungarvan County Waterford who with Mrs Curran, were in New York on a vacation, met a lot of the local Gaelic including officers of the G.A. with whom he discussed Gaelic conditions in Chicago.
When the Tipperary hurling team toured the U.S.A. in 1926 Tom held an open house for the players during our visits to Chicago and was an active member of the Reception Committee at that time. He is still a keen follower of both hurling and football and as interested as ever in the championships at home. We were certainly pleased to meet this grand Dece
Gael again and hope he and Mrs Curran enjoyed every minute of their stay in New York.

THE LIFE BOAT MEN
During the week I came across two rather interesting items published in a copy of "The Lifeboat" dated Dec 1948. As they concern Dungarvan and the Helvick area I feel sure my many readers would like to read them so for their benefit I now turn the Spotlight on—
THE HELVICK-HEAD LIFE-BOAT IN ACTION

The Helvick-Head Life-Boat—Vessel—Helvick Head Co Waterford—About 9.30 on the night of the 9th October 1948 a vessel was seen to enter Dungarvan Harbour at full speed and ran aground on Whitehouse Bank. She was not seen to signal but telephone messages from Dungarvan and Ballinacorney said that she needed help and the motor life-boat H.F. Bailey was launched at 9.45. A strong southerly breeze was blowing with heavy seas. The life-boat found the motor vessel Fennel laden with coal put three men on board and then went into deep water. The Fennel was pounding heavily and her derricks had cast loose but the three life-boatmen were able to refloat her and took her to an anchorage off Helvick pier. The life-boat arrived back at her station at 1.15 the next morning. The owners of the steamer sent £50—Rewards £12 16s.

IN DANGER OF SWAMPING
Helvick Head Co Waterford—At 1.45 in the afternoon of the 25th of October 1948 the harbour master telephoned that a small yawl, under sail was about six miles out to sea and appeared to be in difficulties. A squally north-westerly gale was blowing.

During the week the motor vessel Kerlogue docked at Dungarvan to take away a cargo of foreign jam. During her stay few people recalled that during the war the vessel was under the command of Capt Tom Donoghue South Terrace Dungarvan and was responsible for the rescue of 168 Germans following the loss of their ship in the Bay of Biscay. Within the near future I hope to give readers of this column a full account of this incident which should prove of great interest to all.

SPOTLIGHT SPOTS
Last week I wrote about the big flood which almost swept away the Old Boro in the year 1869 but last week also the Old Boro was near being blown away by the Big Storm of 1949. And what a storm! Almost everything took to the air and while the Big Blow lasted Jack Wye stood prepared wearing a home-made parachute and ever ready to bale out.

I recently visited a village cinema in County Waterford and was pleased to find included in the programme—A Weekly News Film which was very much up-to-date. It was indeed worth seeing and I was told by the proprietor that he has such a film as a regular feature. Yet here we are in Dungarvan one of Ireland's supposed "Big Towns" and we are without a News Film. Surely we are far behind the times.

I'm told that Dungarvan will have some distinguished visitors within the near future when a number of high members of the Government will look us up for various reasons.

Views Of Our Readers
(To The Editor)

Dear Sir—I read with amazement the castigation your contributor "Spotlight On The Unknown" was given at a recent meeting of the Waterford Board of Public Assistance for revealing the names of some patients in St Carthage's Hospital Lismore. I cannot for the life of me as a mere layman see what he did to merit the opprobrium heaped upon him. T.B. is not a disgraceful disease. I understand subject to correction that almost all of us adults have had it at some time or other. Surely the days are gone by when T.B. was mentioned with bated breath and the family and sufferer strove with might and main to conceal that the dread disease had reared its head within their family circle. T.B. is an ordinary and far too common disease and no stigma of shame attached to a sufferer from it and to surround it with a veil of secrecy is to go the wrong way about helping to eradicate it.
As to the system by which a poor patient loses his identity and becomes a cypher on a file it smacks of prison procedure and to my mind it is not only inhumane but also inhuman.
Instead of being ashamed that one has to go to St Carthage's Hospital let us be thankful that here in Waterford we have an energetic County Manager, County Council and Public Health Section which has made adequate provision for the treatment of the scourge and brought the proper treatment to many who otherwise would be condemned to a "living death".
Although I disagree with the County Manager in not wanting publicity of the names of the patients I must congratulate him on his defence of the patients when he thought their rights were infringed.
We could do with more officials of his kind.
