G. A. A.— TOURIN DEFEAT PORTLAW IN JUNIOR HURLING COUNTY FINAL

Tourn 5-8, Portlaw Nil
Old Parish Western Junior Football Champions

Old Parish 4-5, Clashmore Nil
At the Gaelic Field Dungarvan on Sunday last, before a good attendance and in dry but very cold weather Tourin defeated Portlaw in the Junior Hurling County Final. The Portlaw team were victorious over Clashmore in the Western Junior Football Final.

The games were very disappointing as in the hurling game Tourin were missing some Portlaw from the start and in registering 5-8 to Portlaw's nil they had a very easy victory. In the football encounter Old Parish had matters much their own way all through the hour and their victory was rather easy as they registered a score of 4-5 while Clashmore failed to notch one score. The pitch was very heavy and greasy due to the thawing of the heavy ground frost.

The hurling match was refereed by Mick Hayes. Butlers-town and the football game was handled by Willie Barron. Dungarvan.

Tourn v Portlaw (Junior Hurling)
Tourin broke away from the start and scored three points in quick succession. Portlaw fought back but their attack came to nothing and Tourin sweeping down the field the Fives Brothers and Jim Ahearne broke through for their fourth point per Jim Fives. Continuing their pressure Tourin were all over Portlaw's goal which was saved at the expense of a seventy. The free went wide and following the puck-out Tourin were again attacking but at this stage their forward were missing some good chance when well placed Portlaw were under severe pressure during the ensuing play but their backs held well and when play was returned to the Tourin end Portlaw tried hard to score but had to be satisfied with three wides as Dave Walsh D Murray and G McGrath proved a stone-wall defence.

With the game entering the second quarter Tourin took command with Paddy Fives and Jas Russell had matters all their own way and Tom Fives banged home a goal and this was followed by another great effort when the Tourin stars, D Murray, McGrath and Regan, swarmed the Portlaw goal but were unlucky when the ball hit the upright and rebounded into play. Keeping up the pressure Tourin registered a point and a goal during the half-time whistle. Tom Fives scored another goal to leave the scores Tourin 2-5 Portlaw nil.

An early goal after the start of the second half sealed the fate of Portlaw. In the coming junior hurling champions Tourin forged ahead and although Portlaw made a few rallies they failed to break through for a score. Portlaw were well placed to score a seventy but again failed to impress. When play was returned to the Portlaw end Jim Fives was on the mark and scored a point for Tourin. This score was soon followed with a goal for Tourin when Tom Fives drove a grand ball to the net. From this to the close of the game Tourin had matters all their own way and with scores by John McCarthy and Tom Fives they ran out easy winners on the final score of Tourin 5-8 Portlaw nil.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

THE HIGHWAY CROSSES
In the issue dated the 12/49, there was published a rather unflattering notice signed by "Anti-Humbug" relating to my references to members of "His Majesty's Forces." Having studied the letter very carefully, I can only state that the writer seems a little too bitter in his views. In my articles I give credit where credit is due. I try to give both sides of the picture and do not as Anti-Humbug suggests omit bearing in mind the objects of the picture "Anti-Humbug" stated "God knows the monuments on our highways are a lasting memorial to the heroism of the Volunteers and surely they were not erected to perpetuate our shame for the good deeds of the enemy but rather to warn us against the despicable attitude of those who approached us with gifts in their hands and daggers hidden up their sleeves." As an Irishman of the present generation, it is indeed with shame I state that forever too many crosses on our highways are the result of our civil war, having sacrificed so much for freedom we finished the struggle ourselves and there were a lot more atrocities and "hidden daggers" than we ever could account for when the struggle was Anglo-Irish. When Anti-Humbug dwells on this he may not be so hard on the "enemies" across the water. We all have a fairly good idea of the foul deeds done during the Anglo-Irish war, but I certainly don't know one half of the sufferings and humiliations that Irishmen had to endure when we fought to defend the issue ourselves. I write of the good deeds of SOME of the British Forces "Anti-Humbug" cannot deny that I was correct in stating that there were many of them who although they wore the British uniform were really faithful and loyal friends of the Green Jackets. What about the note of warning (which was delivered too late by a trusted native) regarding the mining of Kigobine Road, what about all the valuable information given about raids movements of troops and ammunition etc not to mention several other outstanding deeds which were always appreciated by the Boys?

"I'm not for one moment stating that the 'enemy was our friend' but there were many in their ranks who risked their lives to aid us and to them I pay tribute and a just tribute. When a fight is fought and when we should forget all bitterness and not as "Anti-Humbug" suggests—perpetuate it. We must live and let live and in recording the facts it is our duty to play fair and give credit to the values of information given in this controversy, I have nothing to apologise for but I will add that it has always been the policy of "Spotlight" to report the facts, no matter how hard they may be.

And now for the sake of record here is another interesting letter from one of my Waterford City readers—

Obstructions
John Cummins Scrahan Kilmachon and Pierce Hogan, Killongford, were each fined 5/- when charged by Sergt Browne with causing obstructions by leaving their horse and carts unattended in Dungarvan.

Motorist Offences.
Michael Grady, Mitchelstown was fined 5/- when charged by Sergt Browne for not having his identification plates in order. A summons against John Dwan Bonmahon for not having the tax on his van displayed was marked P O A.

Guard Briderick summoned Christopher O'Mahony Helvick for not having his car taxed and for not having the tax displayed. In reply to Supt P O'Mahony complainant stated that the car which was a 32 hp V8 and on which the tax was £28 was not taxed on November 12th.

Mr Liam Hayes, Taxation officer said that the car in question had not been taxed at any time with the Waterford County Council. He remembered that the defendant came in one evening and said he wanted to pay the tax but it was too late. Defendant was not in Court and the Justice asked whether he would adjourn the case for the defendant's attendance, remarking that if he were to impose a fine at the present hearing it would have to be very

heavy. Mr Morrissey Solr said that he had represented defendant in previous matters but had got no instructions in this case. The Justice said that he was inclined to adjourn the case and said that if the tax was paid before the next court he would be inclined to deal with the case more leniently.

The Superintendent said that he was pressing for a heavy penalty.

Justice—I will adjourn the case to the next court and if the tax is taken out I will deal more leniently with it. There will have to be a fine, but it will be very much reduced if this is done.

Superintendent—The tax paid will have to be for the whole year.

Justice—The defendant is only summoned in respect of Nov 12th.

Superintendent—This man has been using this car all the year and is in town almost every day I am prepared to give evidence on this point myself.

Justice—Well that can be dealt with the next day.

The case was then adjourned. A case against Morgan Mansfield Mary Street for not having a tax displayed was dismissed when it was stated that the car was taxed and insured on the date in question.

Thomas Myles Ballyporeen, was fined 2/6 when summoned by Guard Crowley for having a defective identification plate.

The case against Wilfrid Mellor, c/o Lawlor's Hotel Dungarvan brought by Supt O'Mahony was adjourned when the Superintendent stated that the principal witness in the case was still indisposed.

Mr Kenny Solr for defendant agreed to the adjournment.

Trespass
John Crotty Loughmore was fined 10/- and ordered to pay 10/- compensation and 30/- costs Edward Power farmer Carrow-garriffe said that defendant was working with him at the time of the assault on the same date and John Wall, Junr, summoned Mrs K Attridge for assaulting him on the same occasion.

Mrs Attridge summoned John Wall and William Attridge summoned Walter Wall for assault on the same date.

P J Morrissey solr was for the Walls and Mr J F Kenny, solr was for Mrs Attridge.

Mr Kenny said that as he had not been fully instructed he was asking for an adjournment to which he said Mr Morrissey had agreed. Plaintiffs however had two CIE employees sub-poeneed who were present in court and if his Worship would agree to hear their evidence the remainder of the hearing could be adjourned.

The Justice agreed to this.

Michael Murphy was then called and in evidence said that he was a checker employed by CIE in charge of the store. He recalled the day of the row and at about 2.30 pm on Nov 28th Walter Wall came to consign some winkles to Waterford. While he was there a car came along and Willie and Mrs Attridge came over and spoke to Wall. Later he saw Attridge in a sparring attitude with Wall. He then saw Mrs Attridge trying to ward off some one who was obscured from his view. The words between the Attridges and Wall were about a previous row John Kieley was in the store at the time and he jumped out and had words with Walter Wall and then struck him. Wall's left cheek-bone was cut. Witnesses concluded by saying that usually, both parties were quiet.

In reply to Mr Kenny, witness said that Wall had always been sending winkles away but Attridge only started doing so this morning. He could not say who hit the first blow.

Ml Curran another CIE employee said that he witnessed the row also. He saw Attridge and Wall wrestling and Mrs Attridge and young Wall sparring. He said that Denis Clancy went between them and then he saw John Kieley come out of the store jump across the car and speak to Wall. Kieley then struck Wall what appeared to witness to be an unexpected blow. Wall's face was cut. Witness said that Kieley was related to Mrs Attridge.

In reply to Mr Kenny witness said he could not say who struck first, neither could he say whether Kieley was going to the rescue.

The Justice then adjourned the further hearing until next court.
