SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

WHEN POLITICIANS MEET

Following the announcement in this column last week that two rival political parties would hold meetings on the same date at the same time and on the same Square all attention was focussed on the clash of the politicians on Sunday last. Both parties were claimed by both parties at an early hour. Flanna Fall on the West side of the Square and Labour on the East side. After last Mass a very large crowd gathered in fact it was indeed a long time since I saw such a large gathering on the Square could see everywhere that people were looking forward to "Great Expectations". It may be a little improper to state but I could not help regarding the scene as amusing. There were many who could not make up their minds as to what side to listen to and they finally ended up by standing on the centre of the Square. The remaining neutral I saw many others anxious to hear what both sides had to say and they too held the centre of the Square. For the first time while I have been attending meetings I noted that people were rather nervous about moving up to the platform and remained a considerable distance back from it. Why I'm afraid I can not figure out.

However it was one of those occasions when death has little consideration for the plans of man and one of those times when its mission completely alters the situation. Owing to the death of Mr M. O'Ryan M.C. Ballymacarbery a staunch supporter of the Flanna Fall party, his colleagues at a mark of respect came to their meeting on Sunday. Sean Goulding who addressed the gathering paid a tribute to his memory and requested the meeting to join him in a decade of the Rosary. It was an impressive sight to watch the large gathering in the morning sunshine of a May day as they offered up their prayers for the repose of the soul of one of their representatives. The Flanna Fall party stood Vivian de Valera T.D. Sean Ormonde T.D. P. J. Linn T.D. N. Barron B.L. and many other local representatives. When they had made their remarks they turned their backs to the gathering that the one they mourned was a loss very difficult to replace.

During the whole procedure I watched the members of the Labour party in no small way paid their respect to the memory of a fellow public representative. Realising that their rivals had suffered a loss by an act of God they pressed their sympathy and did not commence their meeting until the proceedings on the opposite side had been concluded. When they did commence they expressed their sympathy for the Flanna Fall party and to the relatives of the late Mr O'Ryan. The gathering was one of the finest and the speakers were of the best. They all dealt with present situations in the affairs of the nation and the achievements of the Labour Party. They spoke highly of the efforts of the present Government and made it very clear that they had the interest of the ordinary citizen in the street of their hearts. In general it was without a doubt a very fine meeting and all were unanimous in stating that they had attended a meeting in their lives which they would never forget.

On the platform were Deputies Brendan Corish (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Local Government), Tom Kyne T.D. T. McCarthy, Chairman UDC L. A. Veale U.D., J. Griffin N.T. and many other representatives of the local branches.

SPANISH STOWAWAYS AT DUNGARVAN QUAY Early on Friday morning last rumour had it that the Dunmore motor vessel "Spee" which had arrived at the Quay for a load of timber had on board a number of stowaways. This of course caused a great deal of curiosity and throughout the day crowds of people went down to the Quay with the hope of getting a glimpse of the stowaways. However all were disappointed with the exception of a few who did manage to get aboard while the crew guards were not around. I was one of that few. I found that the stowaways were locked in the bows of the vessel and were not allowed out around the deck even under guard. At certain times they would however be taken out for exercise on the deck but always under heavy guard. In an interview with them I learned that their names were Brannell, Gardio and Pabbio. They were both from San Sabastian. They were both young men aged about 18 and 22 years and were fishermen in their native Spain. They had boarded the ship in a Spanish port but a few hours after sail-

ing they were discovered aboard and were placed under arrest. They had hoped to make their way to Newfoundland where they intended to join the fishing fleet of that country. When the ship reached her port of destination—Manchester the Captain got in touch with the authorities there but found that they would not have anything to do with the stowaways and ordered that they be taken back to their own country. When the Captain found that he had to call to Ireland he contacted the police force here but received the same reply and so the stowaways remained locked behind sealed doors. In an interview with the Mate he told me that when at sea they are allowed to move about the deck but when they are to be transferred to another vessel of the same Company which was on her way to Spain. Wherever they go they carry the best wishes of many of the townsfolk and from the centre of the Square it seemed that if there was any way of helping them out many would have been only too glad to do so.

Their arrival here certainly created a great stir in town where some people say—nothing ever happens! We congratulate Munntrín de Burcha and other members of the Cumann Racairteachta who had such an outstanding success in Ceapach Chumann.

Waterford Co. Board G. A. A.

A meeting of the Waterford County Board G.A.A. was held in the C.M.S. Hall, Mary St. Dungarvan on Friday evening May 5th. Rev. Fr. Kelleher, C.C. Chairman presided. Also present Messrs J. Lannen, P. Cahalan, J. Kennedy, P. Pinkert, C. Curran, D. Sullivan, Rev. Bro. Murray Deugan, Guld Runat. A large number of delegates represented the various senior and minor clubs in the county.

Referees Report. Arising from the referees' report of the minor football championship match played at Aglish on the 16th April, Rev. Bro. Murray said on behalf of Cumann Na Saisrealaigh that he approached the referee at the end of the game and asked him to get particulars of a player named Martin Mulcahy who had taken part in the match with Ceann Saile Beag-Ard Mór. There was no mention of Mulcahy in the referees' report.

Minor Football Objection. Sarsfield's Minor Club objected to Kinsalebeg-Ardmore being awarded the minor football championship match played at Aglish on April 16th on the grounds that Martin Mulcahy who played with Kinsalebeg-Ardmore was not on the list of players handed to the referee and was not on the Kinsalebeg-Ardmore register. They also asked that the birth certificate for the said player be produced. Rev. Bro. Murray and Rev. Bro. Dalton recently discussing and Maurice Connerly and Sean Ivors represented Kinsalebeg-Ardmore.

Mr. Connerly said that the objection was not in order as Dungarvan was in the Gaelic field and the objection should have been written in Irish. Bro. Murray—Dungarvan is not in the Gaelic field and the objection is lodged in accordance with the rules. The Chairman said that he would have to go ahead with the objection as it was the usual procedure here in the county to hear objections when written in English. Bro. Murray said that Martin Mulcahy had played in the match and he was not registered in accordance with the rules. He saw the player try on a hat before the match. He further heard remarks concerning this player's age and said that he had been born on October 31st 1923. Sean Mac Iomair said that there was six different Mulcahy's in Ardmore. Sean Hourigan said he saw the player in question playing a junior football championship match in Ardmore four years ago. Bro. Murray—You told me on the day of our match that you had played against him four years ago. J. O'Dea—This is the first time that the minor championships were under the control of the County Board and if the objection is sustained they pay the price. I propose that on the evidence that Mulcahy be brought before the Board. Fanning said that he could understand a club secretary making a mistake, but when you could see substitution on a team list it was a serious offence. It should be careful as it would kill the minor competition. C. Curran also gave evidence and said that he had no doubt that the player was over age. He did not know him but saw him play in Aglish. After further discussion the Board agreed unanimously that Martin Mulcahy was not registered in accordance with the rules and therefore Kinsalebeg-

Late Mr. Michael O'Ryan, M.C., Knockalishen, Ballymacarbery

It is with sincere and genuine regret that we record the death of Mr. Michael O'Ryan, M.C., which occurred at his residence Knockalishen Ballymacarbery on Saturday evening last. The late Mr. O'Ryan was a well-known personality throughout the county and was first elected to the County Council in 1917. A staunch Irish Republican all his life he dedicated himself to the fight for Irish Freedom and for the restoration of the Irish language and his sincerity and enthusiasm towards the achievement of these aims knew no bounds. He was first identified with the Irish cause as an organiser of the Fenian League during the stormy years that followed he threw in his lot against the British forces and later he participated in the Civil War on the Anti-Treaty side. Later he joined the Fianna Fáil Party of which he was a member until his death.

Outside his political activities he was best known as a County Councillor and he did all in his power to see that wrongs and grievances were justifiably settled. As a Local Government administrator he had no equal and his knowledge of Local Government was immense. Even those who differed from him politically admired him as he was always straightforward and honest in his dealing even at times to the extent of making himself extremely unpopular. This did not worry Michael O'Ryan as he was only happy when fighting the good cause and his progress as a fighter was not evident until fiery force was against him.

The death of the father of the County Council will be the cause of much regret as his place will be hard to fill and those who knew him during his life will mourn his passing and pray God to have mercy on a good Irishman. The esteem and respect which all classes of the community had for the late Councillor O'Ryan was evidenced at the removal of his remains to Fourmlewater Church on last Sunday evening when one of the largest congregations for many years attended. On Monday morning Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul and the interment took place in the family plot at 2 p.m. The interment was held over the morning of public representatives and officials as well as mourning relatives and friends. The coffin draped in a tri-colour of which he was so proud and for which he fought so hard during his life was borne to his last resting place by his former comrades. As the coffin was lowered into the grave the Late Senator Sean Goulding delivered a short oration and said that it was up to them to carry out the last wishes of the deceased to say the Rosary and Litany of the Sacred Heart for the repose of his soul.

Rev. Fr. Meskill P.P. Rev. Fr. Walsh C.C. and Rev. Fr. Dowler officiated at the obsequies. The immediate chief mourners were—Mrs. O'Ryan (widow), Miss Mary O'Ryan (daughter), Mr. Roddy Ryan (brother), Mrs. CroTTY (sister), Miss B. Condon (sister-in-law), Mr. James Condon (brother-in-law). Funeral arrangements were carried out by Mr. J. Kiely & Sons Undertakers, Dungarvan.

Waterford County Council Adjourns Tributes To Late Mr. Michael O'Ryan, M.C.C.

The Estimates Meeting of the Waterford County Council due to be held on Monday last at Dungarvan was adjourned as a mark of respect to the memory of Mr. Michael O'Ryan, Knockalishen Ballymacarbery a member of the Council since 1917 whose regretted death occurred at his residence on Saturday May 6th.

This was the fourth successive adjournment of the Estimates meeting. Moving the adjournment the Chairman Mr. Denis Heskin said that only a week ago it was their painful duty to convey an expression of sympathy to the relatives of colleagues the late Mr. M. F. Walsh and now it was their painful duty to convey their sympathy to the relatives of another very valued member of the Council in the person of the late Mr. Michael O'Ryan.

Mr. O'Ryan he said was the father of the County Council having been a member for 33 years and during that time he had made his mark as a representative and a great Irishman. He had known Michael O'Ryan on the Council for 25 years and always had the greatest respect for him. Mr. O'Ryan said may not have seen eye to eye with him politically, but all would have agreed that he had been a great representative a great Nationalist and a great fighter and while fighting his cause he had not great satisfaction—a clear expression of opinion whether one liked it or not. Michael O'Ryan he concluded had fought for the Irish cause and it was now their painful duty to pass a vote of sympathy to his family on his death and the least they could do as a mark of respect to his memory was to adjourn the meeting. 

(i) any cow which is, or appears to be suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, induced or caused by another chronic disease of the udder or

(ii) any bovine animal which is, or appears to be suffering from tuberculosis of the lungs, or

(iii) any bovine animal which is suffering from chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis shall, without avoidable delay, give information of the fact to a member of the Garda Siochana at the nearest Garda Station

(B) A Veterinary Surgeon or Veterinary practitioner who examines any bovine animal and is of opinion that the animal is suffering from tuberculosis of the udder or tuberculosis of the lungs or suffering from a chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis shall with all practicable speed give notice of the existence or suspected existence of such disease -

(a) to the Local Authority and

(b) to the Department of Agriculture

Unless notice of the existence or suspected existence of tuberculosis in the animal is given in accordance with the above regulations no claim for compensation in respect of the slaughter of the animal can be admitted

In no case will compensation be payable for the death of an animal suffering from tuberculosis unless the animal is SLAUGHTERED in accordance with the provisions of the Bovine Tuberculosis Order 1928

P.T. NOTES

Ladies Course (Continued)

In the first two exercises we have already included most of the important parts of the body. The hips and abdomen legs and spine so now we will take one more general exercise. I have given this exercise previously but it is a very useful general exercise and the chief muscles working are hip abductors chest and arm muscles. The exercise is known as—

The Cat Stretch

You all know how a cat stretches itself so you can form a mental picture of the performance of this exercise. First bend the knees and place the hands flat on the floor. Next throw both legs well back behind you. From that position relax until the abdomen touches the floor and the head is thrown well back. This is the starting position. Now raise the buttocks and hips as high as possible and bring the head in between the hands. The buttocks should be well up in the air. Return to the starting position immediately. Continue this exercise until you feel a little tired. Don't forget the deep breathing immediately after.

Reduce That Bulge!

This is a very easy method for anyone who is too busy to do exercise. This can be performed wherever you are or whatever you may be doing. There are two methods for performing this exercise, a simple and an advanced method. We will first deal with the simple method for the man with the big bulge in front or in other words a large and protruding tummy.

All you have got to do is blow all the air possible out of your body. This should be simple. Now without inhaling or exhaling, every time you take a breath, you should blow upwards, mind you but outwards. This will cause the stomach to go inwards and both the fat outside and inside is massaged and rubbed away the muscles being exercised. This should be performed as often as you think of it during the day until the bulge disappears and then gradually you can decrease the number of repetitions.

To anyone who will perform this simple method for at least a month I guarantee results but you must have from 30 to 40 repetitions each day.

ECHOES FROM YOUGHAL

Telephone Kiosk—A considerable time back negotiations were started with the Department of Posts & Telegraphs for the purpose of having a telephone kiosk erected at the North Main St. Youghal Engineers were sent to Youghal and letters passed to and fro for a time until finally it looked as though the kiosk would soon be erected. But time passed and nothing was being done and quite recently another letter was addressed to the Department of Posts & Telegraphs asking when the kiosk is likely to be erected in Youghal and the reply came back stating that enquiry is being made in the matter in the Department and a further reply will be sent in due course. When this letter was read a member of the Council stated that if it takes proportionately long to erect the kiosk at Youghal as it is taking to arrive at some finality in regard to the kiosk, then it may be assumed the new bridge will never be erected. It would appear that

the County Council are imposing certain conditions insofar as the kiosk is concerned and this is given as the cause of the delay. But the same conditions govern the proposed kiosk at Youghal government in so far as County Cork is concerned every kiosk erected on a County Council road or footpath. It is difficult therefore to appreciate the delay.

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
