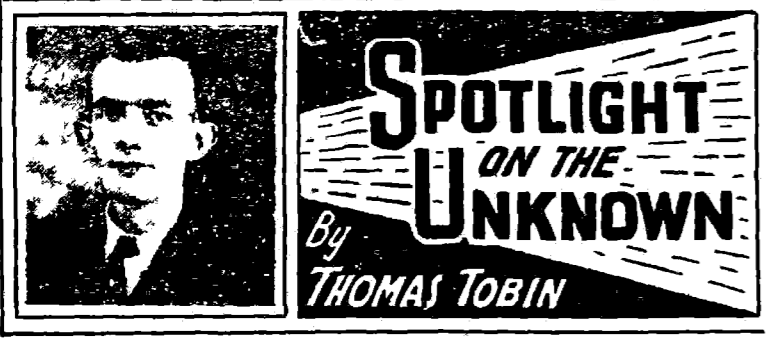

SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

DANCERS UP IN ARMS
I am told that within the near future the dancing fans of Dungarvan are expected to hit the headlines in bold capitals. It appears that the "Big Shoe" came when the Urban District Council last week announced a new list of charges for use of the Town Hall for dances.

The new charges are—Hops 8.30 to 11.30 p.m. £4 8.30 p.m. to 1 a.m. £9. Long dances £18 including light and showman increases of 2s 6d and 2s 6d. When the announcement was made at a meeting of the Council a number of the members pointed out that the dance charges would wipe out dances completely in Dungarvan but despite all protests it was maintained by the Manager that they compared favourably with prices charged in other centres.

How the dancing fans of Dungarvan are expected to react to this I find very hard to believe because of the fact that in most other centres there are a number of halls available and all competing for the good of trade. Then I will frankly state that I would like very much to know just how the dance organisers concerned make their efforts pay.

The many clubs of the Old Boro are I am told at present "joining together in issuing a strong protest to the Urban Council and County Manager. They point out that with the present entertainment tax the running of dances today is nine times out of ten a long shot. The profit made is often nil and always small and with the new charges enforced they will have no hope whatever of making them pay. They will boycott the hall unless the authorities revert to the old charges or else suffer the loss of business.

And in view of the fact that the Council are putting the hall into good shape I really wonder can they afford to suffer such a loss.

THE OLD PROBLEM—HOLDING OF FAIRS ON THE STREETS
It is that fair again. As our many home readers already know we had a rather big fair here on Wednesday and the Catholic and Protestant thoroughfares for most of the day the travelling salesman and mobile cafes did an excellent trade and everywhere the scene was lively.

Also a slushy one and the unusual point about this story is it remained a slushy one for a number of days.

Mind you I cannot understand how it happened at the time of the town in the Square and Bridge Street areas particularly did not seem to have been washed after the fair. Up to Sunday last Bridge Street was in a shocking condition. After the fair came Ascension Thursday—a holiday and on that date many of those cycling to Mass received nasty falls off their bikes as a result of skidding on the sticky surface. I know of nine of such cases, one of them near being seriously injured. I wonder who would be held liable for such accidents.

During the fair the obstruction went beyond all description and very few farmers paid attention to keeping the thoroughfares clear. In fact at times it was almost impossible to get through at the same time for the watchful eye of the Law it would certainly have been impossible.

The shopkeepers are today grumbling about the brisk trade being carried on by the travelling salesmen and at the same time they are afraid to join together in fighting the menace. They together with the pubs state they need the fairs kept on the streets if they must live but the question is—are the shopkeepers (excluding the pubs) really benefitting by the holding of the fairs on the streets. They themselves state that they do no great business that day because of the travelling shops or in plain words the hawkers yet the only way to remove them is to remove the fairs off the streets. They say they need them to keep the business going. I personally think the whole matter is just—a case of running around in circles.

I wonder just what the general public thinks of holding the fairs on the streets. Their views on this matter would certainly be enlightening.
