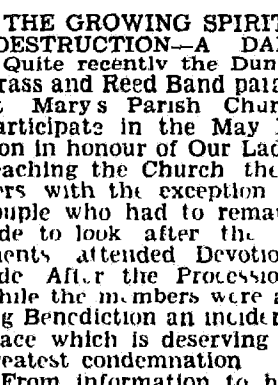

Valuation
