EUCARISTIC PROCESSION

The annual Eucharistic Procession in honour of the feast of Corpus Christi was held through the streets of Dungarvan on Sunday last and proved one of the largest in recent years. A bright June sun shining down from a spotless blue sky made the weather ideal for the occasion and the only fault if any that could be found was that it was a little too warm.

On the stroke of 3 p.m. Very Rev. Canon O'Brien P.P. bearing the monstrance emerged from the Parish Church and the Processionists who had been taking their places along Mitchell Street and the Church grounds since 2.30 p.m. were they had been joined by the Abbesside processionists moving along the usual route. The usual decorations festooned the route of the Procession and most houses and business premises along the way exhibited holy pictures and statues of a devotional nature.

At the Square Benediction was given as usual and afterwards the procession reformed and marched through Main Street, Church Street and Convent Road to the Parish Church gate where the final Benediction was imparted. The Convent of Mercy and the Convent of the Holy Child are once again to be complimented for their efforts in presenting very devotional tableaux.

A guard of honour of members of the Garda Síochána under Superintendent P. O'Mahony marched beside the canopy which was carried by members of the St. Vincent de Paul Conference.

Thanks to the organising done by Rev. P. Farrell and to the work of the marshalls everything went off without a hitch.

The hymns were beautifully played by the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band under Mr. M. Clancy and were well received by the combined choirs of the Parish and Friary as well as the processionists.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

WHAT THE MORNING POST BRINGS—

A NEW LINK WITH NORWAY

In the Editorial Department of the Hometown News paper the morning post is something which provides some of the most unusual stories of the day. It is regarded as the most pleasant task of the day's routine to tear open the manila envelopes and read the contents. You never know just what to expect and thus by the post of the day a newspaper office provides the work of the day but generally it is interesting work and so you find no reason to grumble.

Everywhere the sight of the postman at your door is one of gladness. Whether it be Mike McGrath or Jack Meany or any of the other popular postmen with their bundles of letters in hand and their white bags laden with more bundles few people stop to think that every letter bears a message of some kind to some one. The post is our most important link in business and in private life and without it we would be very much a one and trade would stand still. What a great service the post is to this world and all for the small sum of 2 pence or in some cases for less.

This was the thought which entered my head this morning as the Editor read and passed on the many letters of the day. I was as usual on the look out for anything of interest in the column and as the letters grew fewer and fewer while my hopes sank lower and lower I was suddenly elevated by the sight of a foreign stamp. It was a letter from a letter and then I remembered.

Some weeks ago we had a visitor to this office—a Norwegian journalist—Mr. Ludvig Thronsdren of the Drammens Tidende (Drammens Times) who was touring Ireland with a view to writing a special series for his newspaper on Ireland and Irish life. He was on his way to Mount Mellary to see for himself the wonders of the famous monastery. We discussed everything in general and Mr. Thronsdren made it very clear that he found Ireland a nation of progress with peace and security. In bidding him goodbye he said he would send a copy of his paper when his article on this area appeared in it.

And sure enough he did. With the letter came the newspaper containing a full page article illustrated by very fine photographs of Mount Mellary.

In his letter he stated—'I spent a cold fortnight in Ireland but the warm welcomes I met everywhere made the trip a pleasant one. If ever you come to Norway please come and see me.'

We are glad to know that the friendship of the DUNGARVAN LEADER extends to yet another nation and we appreciate that fact very much. To Mr. Thronsdren and the Drammens Tidende we say thank you for your token of friendship and let us hope that in this modern age the relations of our nations will be more closely united in that common bond of prevention in their peacefulness and progressiveness united.

KILGOBNET'S OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT

My biggest surprise of the week came about while rambling through the peaceful countryside of Kilgobnet when I saw a group of men—young and old all hard at work rebuilding the one-time famous Kilgobnet Alley. I had stumbled on a first-class story for here in the seclusion of the friendly hills the sportsmen were accomplishing an outstanding achievement of which the outside districts had no news.

What the handballers of Kilgobnet are doing will stand out as an example for all others. They made no noise about their plans they just made an all-out effort and today they have almost gained complete success.

For many years the old alley which at one time attracted sportsmen from all over the county has stood as a desolate reminder of the toll of age. Two of its huge walls had crumbled and fallen but nevertheless it still presented a hope for the handballers of today.

Realising this a local club was formed under the Chairmanship of Rev. Fr. J. Morrissey C.C. Plans were made for the revival of the game and a campaign was launched to raise funds to enable them to put the alley in good order once again. Dances, card parties and local subscription drives were held and local sportsmen and women were enlisted to help. The work was done by the day and gradually new and stronger ones replaced them. With each wall 55 ft long by a foot wide there was plenty of hard work in the job but just the same every evening when the day's work was done the boys turned up to play their part in raising the Kilgobnet Alley to the high standard it held in days gone by.

The work has been going on for two weeks now and the progress is really amazing. With a fair break it is hoped to complete the job within a few more weeks. It is estimated that the job will cost around £100.

As I looked on I could not help pondering on the old saying 'Where there's a will there's a way' and indeed the men of Kilgobnet have now proved it and really soon they will have a first-class alley where once again the echoes of the crowds cheering will ring throughout the friendly hills.

From all I have seen I have no hesitation in stating that the people of Ballyduff have ever generously supported the foreign missions the Fathers of Charity are well known here and we have the slightest doubt but that both performances will be well attended.

In conclusion the words thrown on the screen at the beginning of the picture sum up the whole of the story of Lourdes in a few words. 'To those who believe no explanation is necessary to those who do not believe no explanation is possible.'

So remember the date—next Sunday June 18th and the object—that of helping the Missionaries and carry on the work of Christ.

Architects And The Town Hall Roof

Swimming Pool Charges

Mr. T. McCarthy Chairman, presided at the usual meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council held on last Friday night. Messrs T. Kyne T.D. Senator J. Butler N. Kelly and D. O'Sullivan were present. Mr. E. Deasy Town Clerk was in attendance.

Mr. C. Power Sarsfield

Mr. C. Power Sarsfield Street Abbeyside came before the meeting and requested the Council's permission to erect a store on the south side of his house at Abbeyside.

The Council members stated that they had no objection and recommended the application to the Chief Assistant Engineer (r. Projector).

The Chairman referred to a complaint lodged by Mr. J. J. Loughran concerning the messiness of his garden. He said that he had built a wall but that it was not high enough to prevent the garden from being seen from the road. He said that it was unfair to leave this man without protection for his garden.

A resolution was passed to Mr. O'Connell on the suggestion of the Chairman.

Managers' Orders
Among a number of orders made by the County Manager were the following:

Swimming Pool Charges
Order: That in view of the need for increased revenue from the swimming pool and in view of the cost of maintenance that charges 12/6 (season tickets) 6d use of pool and bathing box and 3d (use of pool only) be approved.

Town Hall Charges
Appointments of 22nd May 1950 from Cumann Racaireachta Dúngarban and Cluanna Lath-Chieas Gael asking for a reduction in the proposed revised scale of charges for each dancing order.

That the increased charges for the hall be not applied to cells from 8.30 to 11.30 or 8.30 to 1 a.m. where only Irish dances are carried on and that the hall charges for such cell remain at 2/10s and 2/4 respectively as heretofore.

Sanitary Notice—Central Bar
Order: That notice be served on Mr. Keane to have recommendations of the Sanitary Surrogate attended to.

Charges At The Pool
Arising out of the foregoing Mr. Kyne asked if children were charged 6d for the use of a box for two or three girls. He did not mind the charges for adults, he said but where the young girls were concerned they should only be charged half-price and he proposed a proposition along those lines.

Mr. O'Sullivan scolded Chairman—I'm sure were all in favour of that.

Mr. Butler—I think the charge should be reduced to 2d.

Mr. Kyne—Yes after all the girls only have a limited time there—an hour I think—and it won't make much difference and it's undesirable that these young girls should have to undress in the open. It's all right for the young lads they don't mind so much.

Finally it was agreed to recommend to the Manager that girls be charged only 2d for the use of bathing boxes.

Referring to the order concerning the sanitary arrangements at the Central Bar it was stated that they had been in stalled all right but there was a question of privacy.

Mr. Kelly said that it was unfair to be making Mr. Keane do this as the very minute he had done his valuation would go up.

Mr. Kyne said that the Council had nothing to do with valuations at all.

Loan
On the proposal of Mr. Kyne sanctioned by Mr. O'Sullivan application for sanction was made to a loan from the Council's Treasurer of £3056 estimated all-in cost of alterations to the Town Hall roof and new electrical installations to be repaid over 15 years.

Housing
The report of Mr. Ormonde on the Abbeyside scheme stated that 24 houses to complete the full scheme were in various stages of construction and some were ready.

A letter from the Department of Local Government referring to the Gallowhill scheme stated that the plans were in order but for a few slight alterations in connection with roads and sewer outfall.

The Clerk said that these had been sent on to the architects for incorporation in the scheme.

The Clerk also stated that the Architects had written pointing out that it would be impossible for them to say whether it would be cheaper to do the development work by direct labour until tenders were got.

Mr. Kyne said that when they had been speaking to the Minister he had assured them that there would be no delay in sanctioning when the estimates were submitted.

Mr. Kyne also said that it would be a good thing if they



DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

Held before Mr E O'Riain on Wednesday last.

Applications For Ejectments

John O'Donnell v Youghal Road applied for an ejectment decree for non payment of rent against Michael Doherty, Mitchel Street.

Morrissey v Solr for defendant applied for an adjournment and said that the matter would be settled up in a month.

Mr Williams Solr for plaintiff said that in January, 1949 he got a decree against defendant not to be entered if he paid £1 a week towards the arrears and the current rent. Defendant was a weekly tenant at £1 14s. Defendant had paid £29 altogether since but had stopped payments in December last. He said that he would prefer to get a decree rather than agree to an adjournment but the Justice could put a stay of execution on the order if John O'Donnell in evidence said that defendant owed £19 18s 10d up to June 10th.

The Justice granted a decree for the full amount with a stay of 15 days within which the balance at £1 per week plus the current rent.

John Foley v Shannon claimed £9 7s 6d arrears of rent from Joseph Dunne who was James Donovan agent for plaintiff said in evidence that defendant was a weekly tenant at £1 13d. The tenant refused to pay the rent as he thought that the house he had been occupying was not the one he was promised. He did not think it was condemned. Regarding repairs witness said that as usual they carried out all the outside repairs.

In reply to Morrissey Solr who defended witness said that he could not deny that the tenant of the house was Phil Dunne and not Joseph Dunne. He was the tenant who always had paid him the rent. He said that there was no sanitary accommodation in the house that the roof was leaking and that repairs were needed to the front and back doors. No repairs would be done but he could not get a tradesman to do them. He said that the house had not been condemned officially. He said that the defendant had refused to pay the rent because the repairs were not carried out but because she claimed she need not pay when the house was condemned. The rent was paid in arrears would be done by the landlord.

In reply to the Justice witness said that when he took over these collections he was to do Joseph Dunne was the tenant but he could not contract with Morrissey when he said that her husband was the tenant.

Mr Williams said that the best thing to do would be to adjourn the case for a couple of days after Dunne was the tenant he would agree to having the case against Joseph Dunne dismissed and proceed against Philip Dunne. He said that the Justice would be prepared to pay everything due provided the repairs were carried out.

Justice - If both parties are as reasonable as they protest to be the case should be no need for a decree.

The case was adjourned for one month.

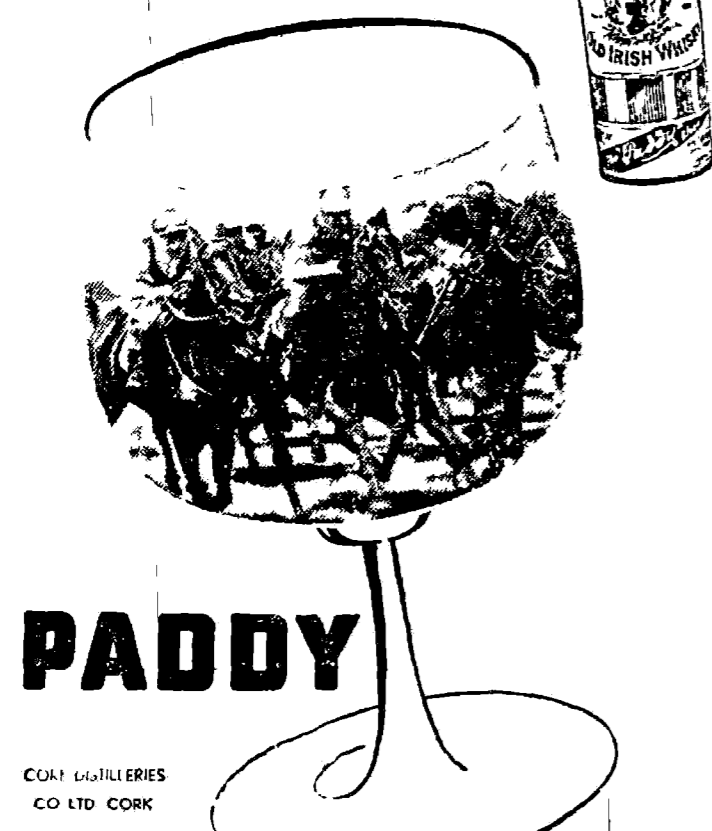

TALLOW AND ROUND ABOUT

Annual Corpus Christi Procession - Inspiring scenes of devotion were witnessed in Tallow on Sunday last on the occasion of the annual Corpus Christi procession. For fully a fortnight beforehand the townspeople had been busy painting and decorating house fronts etc. and from early on Saturday until late into the night the inhabitants worked untiringly decorating their housefronts no efforts being spared in preparing the town in honour of our Divine Saviour. The streets were gaily decorated with bunting and suitably inscribed banners and evergreens and magnificently dressed windows were everywhere with the result that the general appearance of the town eloquently bespoke the religious fervour of its devoted people. Sunday morning dawned bright and fresh and in the morning a glorious sun shone from a cloudless sky of blue. Sharp to scheduled time the procession headed by Cross bearer and altar boys moved off from the church to the various Convent grounds and the route was through Convent Street, Main Street West Street and Chapel Street. On reaching the Square Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament was given by Rev. Fr. Heane P.P. at the beautifully erected altar. The Church choir rendered the O Salutaris and Tantum Ergo and as the sacred Host was raised in blessing a hymn was sung the huge concourse as they bowed in homage to their Lord and Master and then as the last sound of the Sanctus had faded away came the voices of the great choir as they led in the recital of the Divine Praises. After Benediction the procession reformed and proceeded by Chapel Street to the Parish Church where final Benediction was given by Rev. Fr. Heane P.P. being filled to its utmost capacity. The arrangements it is estimated that about 1200 people marched four deep through the streets of the town and constituted an imposing and impressive sight that will long be remembered by all those who took part. The beautifully erected altar on the Square (the work of a local artist) can only be described as a work of art - a masterpiece of wood and metal. Credit on the artist and was admired by young and old alike. A special tribute is also due to all who helped in anyway to make the 1950 procession such an impressive and memorable one. It is worthy of such an august occasion as the bearing of Our Divine Lord through the streets of the town in solemn procession.
