### SERIOUS OUTBREAK OF FIRE IN DUNGARVAN

On Saturday evening, 1st while gliding along on my old bike I was rather puzzled to see so much smoke pouring from the premises of Messrs Sheehan Ryan & Co. Fish and Chip Shop. At first I thought it was just a case of adding fuel to fire and so I strodded into the Post Office. After getting a 2d stamp I re-entered the scene of action and was greeted by a surprise. The Fire Brigade had arrived on the scene and under the command of Capt Roddy McGrath the members were laying hoses from the square. Within a matter of seconds they were in action. By this time smoke was pouring from the building. Without a hitch of any kind members of the Brigade put into operation their most efficient fire-fighting tactics. A squad turned the hose on the front of the building while two others attacked the blaze from both sides. Flames licked the woodwork and inside the blazing inferno soon became a fog of hissing steam. A powerful force of water mastered the leaping flames.

Realising that there was little hope of saving the shop Capt McGrath and his men concentrated their efforts on preventing the fire spreading to the adjoining stores.

By now the steam had blotted out the scene and you found yourself groping in a white cloud of warm dampness. I made it suddenly clear that somebody was to blame and now that the Chairman has stated that the Council was not responsible maybe he would be good enough to let us know who was. I will say glowing tributes to the Dungarvan Fire Brigade.

And now we go in to inspect the damage. See the remains of what was the counter where many were the jokes enjoyed over a piece of the shavings. See the sheaves the doors and all the wooden structures which had been ticked by the greedy flames—they are now crumpled. Everything that was something new lies a shrivelled black sheened mass of fantastic shapes and dejects scattered about in a heap of smouldering ruin. You feel sorry for those who suffer such a loss. In this case it is estimated that the loss runs into hundreds of pounds.

To Mr Wm Ryan and Dr P Ryan we extend our sympathy and wish them every good luck in their future efforts.

### MAKING THE ROADS SAFE

With the score board registering only 10 scores after the hours play one of the quietest crowds ever to witness a Munster Senior Hurling Championship fixture heard the final whistle at Thurles on Sunday last. The Cork qualifiers for the Munster Final. The only compensations for the day's outing were supplied by the gallant Minor XV for the team was one man short after about 20 minutes play when referee Hyland (Limerick) sent one of the forwards to the line for an offence which might have been more leniently dealt with in the circumstances. His decision did not meet with the approval of the spectators who showed their dissatisfaction in no uncertain manner. The referee's action however had an electrifying effect on the remainder of the team as they then on to the end they displayed more 'devil' in their play and gave us a glorious exhibition especially during the second quarter of the first half. ### DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT

(Held before Judge Roe at Dungarvan on Tuesday last)

#### New License

John Curran 7 and 8 O'Connell Street Dungarvan applied for a new excise license in respect of his premises.

Applicant in his evidence said that No 8 was already licensed and had been conveyed to him by his father on March 13th, 1949. He had purchased the premises next door on August 15th 1942 from a Patrick O'Toole. He now wanted to exchange one into the other as the existing shop was too small and he wanted to have a separate entrance. The PLV of No 7 was £5 15s 0d and of No 8 £12 10s 0d.

Judge E O Mahony G.S. said that the authorities had no objections.

His Lordship accordingly granted the application which was moved by applicant's agent Mr J. McCabe B.L. instructed by Messrs J. F. Williams & Son (Sols).

#### Removal Of Remains To Dungarvan

The death occurred at the Bon Secours Home Cork on Saturday June 24th of Rev Fr Francis O'Donoghue O.S.A. Sub Prior Ballyhaunis, County Mayo.

The late Fr O'Donoghue was aged 49 years and a native of Carriglea, Dungarvan. He was educated at the Augustinian College Dungarvan and entered the Novitiate of the Order of Friars of the Holy Spirit at Ballyhaunis in 1923. He studied in Rome from 1923 to 1925 and was ordained in the latter year. In 1929 he returned to Ireland and was attached to St. Augustine's Church Cork from that year until 1936 when he was appointed Prior at Fethard Co. Tipperary. In 1942 he became Prior at Callan Co. Kilkenny and served there until his appointment as Sub Prior at Ballyhaunis in 1945.

The remains were removed to Dungarvan on Monday evening and the accompanying cortege was of huge proportions. On arrival at the gates of St. Augustine's Church the remains were received and blessed by Very Rev Dr Cahill Bishop of North Queensland, Australia and Very Rev Fr Dullea Provincial. Inside the Church the remains attended the service which included vespers for the dead.

On Tuesday morning Office and Requiem High Mass was celebrated at St. Augustine's Church and immediately afterwards the interment took place in the burial plot of St. Augustine's.

The celebrant of the Mass was Rev J B O'Donoghue O.S.A. (brother of deceased) deacon, Very Rev Fr Mansfield Prior Ballyhaunis sub-deacon Very Rev Dr Curtis Prior Cork.

#### Injunction And Damages

Elizabeth Mary Grianan Youghal Road Dungarvan claimed damages for trespass and an injunction against further trespass against Ann O'Farrell John O'Farrell Mary O'Farrell and Michael O'Farrell all of Ballyanchor Lismore. The subject matter of the action was the lands of Ballinaspeck.

Mr G. Clarke B.L. (Mr Kenny Sols) was for plaintiff and Mr J. McCabe B.L. (Messrs Farrell and Morrissey) was for defendant.

Mr D. Arcey asked for an adjournment in the case and stated that a High Court Action was still pending in the matter. He said that the lands were originally owned by Patrick J. O'Farrell who had handed the farm over to the plaintiff who paid certain debts. The profits of the farm went towards the maintenance of the children while they were minors and everything was all right until a family dispute arose. He claimed on behalf of his clients that the farm was handed over to the plaintiff in trust for them and this was being contested.

Mr Clarke said that they were prepared to go on with the case but Mr D. Arcey said that there were certain documents outstanding.

His Lordship asked if an order for discovery was needed and both Counsel agreed that this would expedite the whole matter.

His Lordship then granted the adjournment and the order for the discovery of the necessary documents within three weeks.

#### Decease Granted To Shopkeeper

Thomas Pottle son of plaintiff said that his mother carries on a store and sells groceries meat etc. He was helping her in the business for over 20 years and went around in a van to sell and deliver goods to the various houses in the district. Sometimes he would be paid cash and sometimes he would get eggs against sales and if there were any balances owing he entered them in a ledger (produced). She knew the books had an account which was in Thomas Tobin's name. The last payment of £5 was made by Patk Tobin. She said that the final amount due was £26 8s.

This concluded plaintiff's case and Mr McCabe asked for a direction on the grounds that plaintiff had not discharged the onus on her of proving what goods were actually supplied.

The Judge refused the application.

Mr McCabe then said that they were not prepared to furnish any evidence.

His Lordship gave a decree for the full amount with costs.
