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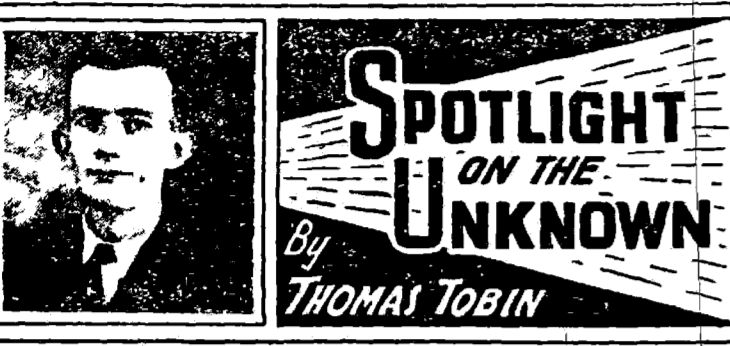

IT'S THAT ALLEY AGAIN
Once again the unfinished Handball Alley at Gallowshill breaks into the headlines—this time the news is hopeful.

WHAT PEOPLE WILL DO FOR A LIVING
We had the famous J. S. Circus in Dungarvan last week and as usual the Big Top proved to all an irresistible attraction. The romance of the sawdust ring and the heart-stirring airs of the National Band were the day—the family holiday. For the young it was a day so much and for so long looked forward to. For the grown-ups it was a reminder of their own youth and a reminder that could never grow old.

Every act was what the advertisements claimed it to be and the many thousands of Dungarvanites who witnessed the show would loud their praise of the thrilling programme.

I visited the show and had the opportunity of meeting the stars but without an interpreter I would have been lost. Amongst the Danes were the Zulus, Germany, Denmark, South Africa, France, Italy, Britain, India, Czechoslovakia and Hungary and all were represented. It was like a visit to United Nations Headquarters—the only difference worth while—that they would not be as united at Headquarters.

The majority could speak some English and it was possible to find out a thing or two.

My chat with Paul Selisch provided some interesting facts which tell a strange story.

In 1911 Paul Selisch rode his first motor-cycle delivering 1,000 newspapers in Berlin and another through the streets of Berlin. But this was not daring enough for him he quickly graduated to the famous Death Ring, a kind of German wall of death. He was the first to succeed in touring Europe and performing stunts every year.

The first Revolving Globe the first quest for a continent—thrilling hundreds of thousands all over the Continent. Then came the war. A brief spell in munitions then to films. Selisch joined the famous Tobis Film Company in Berlin and as a stunt man and appeared in 28 films. Finally came his greatest stunt—the present Wall of Death in a tiny cage only 7 ft in diameter. At 57 he is the oldest man now performing this stunt—every rival was killed before the age of 40. With him is Hertha Librock the only lady performer in this type of act and Bill Schmidt who uses a push button says an engine can fail but not his legs!

And believe it or not but no less than 16 people have been killed in his troupe since he started 32 years ago.

The eight Douglas Troupe of acrobats provided a series of complicated stunts that would be associated ordinarily with the Marvel Family.

The three Lester, who provide a laugh and a thrill bounding about on a trampoline are Dane and said they loved Ireland. They were anxious to try their skill or luck in the Blackwater at Cappoquin where they were told Ireland's best salmon were to be found.

An amazing act was Bob Werth's who carried out some excellent juggling while balancing on top of a ladder.

The little lady of the Lions certainly showed us how she shows the lions that she holds the whip hand. There is an interesting story about Miss Jutta Hurschke's entry into the cage. She soon realised that the lions that she had a way with the Dublin Zoo bred cats and now—well we've seen the act ourselves.

A MASTERPIECE OF YESTERDAY RECALLED FOR THE FOLK OF TODAY

Aid to Europe— Mr J. B. McCloskey delegate for France of the war Services of the National Catholic Welfare Conference visited Dublin last week. During his visit he met Mr James Dillon Minister for Agriculture and heard from him that Ireland is making yet another gift of food for distribution in France, Germany, Austria and Italy. That part of Ireland's gift intended for Italy has been allotted to His Holiness the Pope for distribution to Italian orphanages.

THE BATTLE OF THE LOGS
The battle between the Harbour Master and the law concerning the piling of timber on the Quay has come to an end. As will be recalled the Harbour Master did not want the timber stacked out over the edge of the quay for fear it would damage the vessels while the law did not want it out on the road as it might endanger traffic. The logs could not be piled parallel to the edge as they would roll into the water so what was the Harbour Master to do. He was between the law and the deep sea.

It took some figuring out and now the Manager has issued an order that the logs must be piled with the short ones in the narrow end of the quay and the long ones in the wide parts which is going to require the services of a log-sorter. A passage of 28 feet must at all times be maintained on the roadway and a passage on the quay edge with a number of entries must be kept clear. This should meet the wishes of all and is a satisfactory end to this thorny problem.

NO PROPELLORS PLEASE
At Friday's meeting of the UDC the Manager issued an order which will without doubt put Captains and Pilots of vessels entering Dungarvan Harbour scratching their heads.

The order is that notices will be erected on Dungarvan Quay and issued to the effect that the Council acting as Harbour Authority will hold the owner of any motor vessel or steamboat using berths in Dungarvan Harbour liable for any damage that is done to the berths through the use of propellers while the vessel is in the berth or getting into or leaving the harbour.

VERY SUCCESSFUL SWIMMING GALA AT DUNGARVAN

After a morning of continuous wind and rain dark skies cleared to make way for the glorious sunshine of summer during the 8th Annual Gala of the Dungarvan Swimming Club which was held at the local pool on Sunday last.

A very large and representative gathering watched what was without doubt a programme which surpassed all previous records. Brilliant sunshine added to the success of the event and attracted large numbers from far and near.

Shortly after the opening of the programme there was an unexpected thrill provided when one of the competitors in the 100 Freestyle race got into difficulties and was rescued by Liam O'Donnell of Dungarvan SC who was awarded a Life-Saving Certificate following the recent course given at the pool by the Irish Red Cross.

Mary Hill retained her title in the 100 Freestyle Munster Championship event and covered the distance in 74 secs. beating her previous best time by 3 secs. Freestyle confined race got into difficulties and was rescued by Liam O'Donnell of Dungarvan SC who was awarded a Life-Saving Certificate following the recent course given at the pool by the Irish Red Cross.

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One of the highlights of the evening was the presentation of the early days certificates awarded to boys and girls of the Dungarvan Club following the recent special Red Cross course. The presentations were made by Rev Fr P. Farrell C.C. Dungarvan and Dr O'Farrell Waterford County M.O.H.

In a small address Fr O'Farrell stated that the Dungarvan Swimming Club deserved the warmest congratulations of all for the excellent work they are doing for the youth of the town. They had set up a very high standard in aquatics which was well able to stand up to the best that the country and the club committee were entitled to great credit for their fine efforts which showed in no uncertain way at this Gala how successful they had been.

It was stated a grand thing to realise that there are very few children in the town of Dungarvan not able to swim and for providing such a very fine pool for the country and club deserved their deep appreciation.

FIANNA FAIL MEETING AT DUNGARVAN

They had in the present Coalition Government a group of contradictory minorities, who started with different programmes and came together on the basis of bargaining. Their programme for the actual election was one of slander but since they came into power they did not prove one single charge against Fianna Fail. They came to the electors with a programme of wild promises to reduce taxation to establish full employment to end emigration and to reduce the cost of living by 30 per cent. The Labour Tribunal had admitted that the cost of living rose by 100 per cent in 1947 and had not gone down. There was no doubt that Labour resented the double price system—one controlled and the other a kind of laissez-faire market price for the same vital necessities. According to the Taoiseach the pound today is only worth a little over 10/-.

This was stated by Mr P. J. Little at a last Sunday's public meeting held at Dungarvan. Mr J. Curran presided and other speakers were Dr James Ryan TD Mr Sean Ormonde TD Senator Sean Goulding TD Mr P. Tobin Ald W Kennally Mr T P Rabbett Mr John Higgins PC TC Mr Eric Power Mr J. Kirwan MCC etc.

At a subsequent meeting of the Committee at Dungarvan which Mr P. Ormonde presided the Fianna Fail candidates selected from all areas for the forthcoming County Council elections were ratified.

Great Loss To Fianna Fail
Mr Little said that he could not retain from referring to their recent great loss and paying a tribute of respect to an able and able member of the Fianna Fail, Mr Michael O'Ryan, who was such a strong supporter of the National movement in all its phases over a period of more than fifty years. Mr O'Ryan was a great Gaelic League man and the early days of the Sinn Fein movement and remained steadfast to Fianna Fail throughout all the vicissitudes met by the movement and its followers. He was one of the many men in the country who are prepared to make every sacrifice for the cause and who look for very little in the way of applause or reward.

Unfair To Farmers
In the agricultural sphere the farmers are told that they must compete against the world. This is not fair to the farmers because they are obliged to purchase in a protected market and they should be protected themselves.

Unnecessary Rationing
Fianna Fail has added rationed bread sugar tea and butter during the war because they had not enough of these commodities to go round. Their intention was to end rationing when these goods were in plentiful supply. He believed that this is the only country in the world which has maintained a system of rationing which is absolutely unnecessary. The Government was gasping in its desire for money. If people wanted more of certain commodities they had to pay more for them. This was a scandalous policy for any Government to adopt but the Fine Gael Party in the past had adopted strange ways of raising money taking a shilling off the old age pensioners.

It was surprising to find that Clann na Pobaichta and Labour who claimed to speak for the ordinary men and women of the country agreeing with the Fine Gael. The Fianna Fail Government had introduced subsidies in order to keep down the price of foodstuffs. Subsidies had been maintained to a certain extent by the present Government but in certain foods they were charging black market prices.

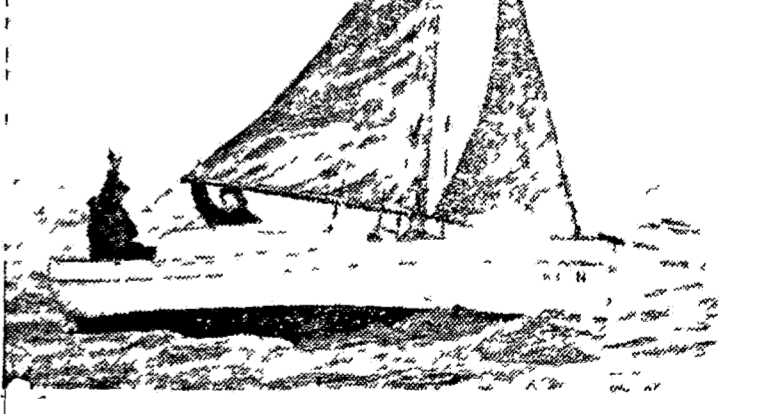

Aga Tells Her Dramatic Story 'Only To The Irish'

Last week ended the three-act drama of the Irish Liberator's daughter, the young girl Aga Muller to be greeted by crowds of warm-hearted Irish at Dublin airport. The fact that this gallant girl who had gone through so much hardship and sorrow had chosen Ireland from the countries of the world to find some period of peace caught the imagination of a generous people.

Casting aside vague offers of payment for her dramatic story made by world agencies and British newspapers—for the solid offer of a flight and refuge and the biggest sum of money an Irish paper has ever paid for a feature Aga flew straight to Ireland as a frightened child runs to home.

I will speak to none but the Irish" she told newspapermen at every airport at which she was questioned, and in Dublin when she faced the cheering

people who had gathered to welcome her the lonely girl's tears released all the pent-up sorrow for her father's harrowing death at the helm of the little boat Berlin off the African coast. Aga clutched as her most treasured possession the log of the boat "Berlin" in which she had set out in simple graphic style all the incidents of storm and calm hunger and thirst danger and rescue that occurred on her daring voyage with that strange man, Paul Muller.

She tells her story in THE IRISH PRESS (beginning on Saturday August 5) giving in full her early life in a Germany town by ruthless war as a refugee child swept from her home in bombed Berlin and the lonely daring voyage with her father, her lone struggle with marauding Africans her sailing alone in the storm-tossed dinghy bearing her father's body to its Liberian grave.
