## SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

### A PATRIOTS LAST LETTER

Today through the columns of "Spotlight on the Unknown" I am able to bring to our many readers one of the most interesting stories ever to hit the headlines. It is a story without an end at least for the time being, but through this column I hope to write the finishing paragraph.

It all started a short while ago when a man named Sean O'Donnell of Knockboy Mount, Waterford was walking along the road close by the world-famous Irish Monastery. Suddenly in the brisk breeze he beheld a sheet of notepaper blowing along the road and out of curiosity he picked it up to find that he had recovered a document of great sentimental value and of historical importance.

In his own way Mr O'Donnell made inquiries but as the document was but the second page of a letter he had not much chance of locating the owner or discovering the name of the writer.

Being a regular reader of this column Mr O'Donnell got in touch with me and gave me his strange find for which he states he has the greatest respect being as he was one of the boys of the troubled times.

Wrinkled and torn with age the page is the second of a letter which I feel sure I want to recover it and if he or she produces part one and three of the letter or any other evidence to prove their claim it can be recovered at this office.

I am more than anxious to find the owner for I know that the story attached to this aged page is one that would be of special interest to our readers all over the world and one that is worthy of record in the history of Ireland's Gallant Struggle.

The following is a copy of the page of the Patriot's Last Letter

### WATERFORD—A WONDERFUL COUNTY—STATES WAR VETERANS COMMANDER

Readers will remember that this column recently told the tragic story of a rail smash in New York and of a Dungarvan born priest's heroic deeds for the man injured. His name is Fr O'Farrell Rockville Centre and in order to ease the curiosity of the folks at home I contacted my New York Correspondent—Mr J Lyons and his report has just reached me by Air Mail.

Dear Mr Tobin enclosed find letter received from the Commander of the Catholic War Veterans. The letter speaks for itself. Hope you received the papers O.K regarding the disaster. I would like to know what you could find out what year Michael Coston of Old Parish won the Jumping contest at the Horse Show in the Gaelic Field. Two of my friends of mine Monnie and Paddy Murphy from Ring were disputing what year it was held. I hear he won it three years in succession. Monnie Kieley says he thought it was 1920. Paddy Murphy says it was 1918. Kind regards to Paddy Lynch.

## G.A.A.—“WESTERN DERBY” DECIDER

### Thrilling Game Sees Eire Oge Go Out

J.H.—St Augustines 4-8, J.F.—Valley Rovers 1-6, Slabh gCua 0-2

The glamour and excitement of a Munster game was present at the Gaelic Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last when St Augustines (Abbeyside) and Eire Oge (Dungarvan) met to decide what has commonly been known as the "Western Derby". For weeks past the excitement had been mounting with both teams training specially for the game and it was commonly asserted that the game would be a rough one and would probably end up in a row. How wrong everyone was on this score was proved on Sunday when the two teams gave an exhibition of hurling which was as thrilling and pulsating as any seen at the Gaelic Field. The method of handling the game adopted by referee Julian Rheimsch was all that could be desired and he kept the game in motion from the beginning by being "firmly" in clearing the field.

A great cheer went up in the 22nd minute when Eire Oge supporters saw Christy Moylan come on to replace Keohan who retired after a few minutes. Eire Oge Kieley and Jones with Egan and Kirby tried hard they were unable to gain the lead over a dour Abbeyside combination who were not lulled under the pressure.

There was a lot of comment about the action of the referee in blowing full time after Jones had sent in a seventy which Kieley received but before Kieley could strike the ball. The position was that the time was up when the "70" was awarded and the referee told Jones that if he did not score direct he would have to blow full time.

Prior to the start of the game which was watched by a great crowd the teams were playing around the field by the Abbeyside Scouts Pipers Band and it was clear that the referee was taking no chances as he insisted on clearing the spectators from around the goals before he threw in the ball.

Within a second of the start of the game Abbeyside had sent over a wide Abbeyside then kept up the pressure and forced Johnny O'Connor. The ball fell short and was picked up by John Kieley who whipped it well up field where it went to Tommy Murphy who after 4 minutes drove over the first score of the game a point for Eire Oge. Eire Oge kept on the offensive but could not turn over any scores and then O'Connor cleared the field for Abbeyside who were high cut over a beauty to make it level pegging.

Both sides were visited in turn but wides resulted and then Eire Oge attacked again but had two further wides before Kieley noticed their second point after 14 minutes.

## GAELIC NOTES SENIOR CLUBS

Against Stradfield they recently they certainly had a field day and won impressively and this victory has set the Comeraghs ablaze with a wave of enthusiasm in preparation for Sunday's clash they have spared no effort with regards training and a few recent practice games show a decided improvement with every outing.

Of the two Dungarvan have the more imposing record having won County honours on nineteen occasions but this does not take from Kilrossanty who have won four titles and are intent on a grand team spirit which is really speaking I believe Dungarvan could win the senior football title any time they make a serious effort and I am in a position to state that this year they have a grand team spirit which all footballers who on Sunday next will be fitness personified.

The bustling style of football favoured by Kilrossanty is however something to be reckoned with and it certainly paid dividends in last year's final when Kilrossanty won well on the day's play. As present holders of the championship they are favourites to win on Sunday but I fancy the Blues' chances due to a grand team spirit which I saw when I watched them in training during the week.

Monnie McGuire, Johnny Lonergan, Mick Whelan, Pats Fitzgerald, Dick McGuire, Willie Galvin and Dyer Veale are all players who have done sterling service to club and County and with their wide experience they should be the main stay of this Kilrossanty team who will not want for support.

## WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

### Chairman And Mr. Kyme Figure in Heated Exchanges

#### Cottage Purchase Scheme Report

At the quarterly meeting of the Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan on Monday last Mr D. Heskin, Chairman, presided. Messrs T. D. D. Leahy, F. Roche, T. Dugan, J. Hillman, Senator Bulmer, J. G. Kelly, T. Morrissey, Mr. Harty, J. Condon, P. Butler, M. McGrath, J. Mansfield and R. Barron were present.

Mr D. Sheedy, Co. Engineer and Assistant Engineer, Dr. O'Farrell, Co. M.O. and Mr. J. G. Dowling Secretary were in attendance.

The Chairman said that the County Manager was on holidays and the Acting Manager was at a meeting in Kesh. Mr. Harty handed in a long list of new applicants who were looking for an extension of the Glebeg Scheme to Lisnellen in County Wick and adjoining areas.

Chairman—Would all these be prepared to pay for the water? Mr. Harty—Yes.

Chairman—If people are prepared to pay for the water the Council will have no objection to this.

After a short discussion it was decided to approve provisionally of the application.

Chairman—If people are prepared to pay for the water the Council will have no objection to this.

Mr. Harty stated that the estimated extra cost of 1/7 per week was too high and it would hardly be worth it to the tenants. If the rate could be reduced to about 1/- a week it would not be too bad.

to the scarcity of labour in the area it did not appear in the reports. Neither did it appear that Mr. Kyme said that it was a good thing that the farmers could not get workers and that until agricultural wages were raised properly that farmers should not get workers.

Mr. Kyme—I don't mind a bit of propaganda for the elections and getting a few votes I make no apology for the statement I made at the meeting.

Chairman—Well, if it's any news I'm not going ahead at the local elections but when farmers can't get workers on the land to produce food here, while the rest of the world is war-torn it is a sorry state that a public representative says that it is a good thing that they can't get workers. Farmers are paying the legal wages laid down.

Mr. Kyme—They're only the minimum wages but one thing is sure I'm standing for the elections and I'll be back here.

Chairman—If I wanted to I could be back too.

Mr. Kyme—If farmers pay proper wages they will get plenty of workers.

The Chairman then in heated tones stated that the farmers were badly off and were unable to pay any more unless they got increased prices for their produce.

Mr. Kyme—Who'll tell me that the farmers are badly off?

Chairman—I will tell you are badly off.

Mr. Kyme—Well all you have to do is go up outside the Church any Sunday morning and see all the cars the farmers own.

Chairman—There are plenty of others here cars too and they are welcome to them.

Mr. Kyme—Only the T.D.s.

Mr. Quirk said that politics should be kept out of local Councils and that Senators and T.D.s should not be allowed on them.

Mr. Morrissey—All this is only propaganda.

Mr. Kyme—Well I didn't start it.

Chairman—You did at the Conference last Saturday.

Mr. Kyme—I love a row like this.

Mr. Quirk—I know you do.

Mr. Kyme—But there's one thing I hate to see and that's the farmers flying in the face of God and saying they are badly off when they're not.

Chairman—They are badly off.

Mr. Quirk—We're here three years now and we never had anything like this before and this is almost our last meeting.

Mr. Kyme—I don't want it either but I'll let no one get away with anything.

If the Chairman or anyone else was not reported in the Press it's not my fault.

Senator Butler—Mr. Chairman it would be just as well to go on with our own business now.

Matters then quietened down and the next item on the agenda was called.

Sewerage Schemes

It was agreed to adjourn for the proposals adjourned since the last meeting.

Mr. Kyme—What has happened to the Stragally Scheme?

Mr. Sheedy—The scheme is being prepared and also the water scheme.

Mr. Kyme—Haven't both already been sanctioned by the Minister?

Mr. Sheedy—The water scheme has been sanctioned.

Mr. Kyme—And sanctioned for about 12 months.

The Council approved the decisions of the Scholarships Advisory Committee to vary the means test for Secondary and Vocational and University Scholarships from £70 valuation to £93 in the case of farmers and from £300 income to £400 in the case of others. £15 valuation increase (instead of £10) and £80 income (instead of £40) was also in respect of every child more than one.

A Scholarship in Agriculture at U.C.D. was awarded to Thomas Broderick Coolnagour, Dungarvan.

Cottage Purchase Scheme

A report on the above stated that since February 1939 634 applications for purchase from tenants had been received. Of these 74 had been vested and 88 withdrawn for various reasons leaving 473 to be dealt with.

The Chairman said that it would be well that cottiers understood clearly that repairs

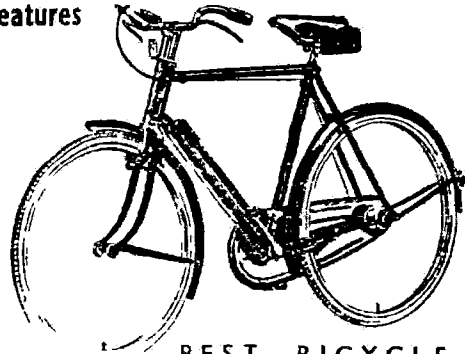

would have to be carried out to the limits of the Council's financial resources. It was agreed that a committee should be appointed to investigate the possibility of raising the rents of the houses in the town.

### Rents of Portlaw Houses

The Secretary said that four of the houses at Portlaw had been finished and applications received but a rent would have to be fixed before lettings could be made.

### Chairman's Report

The Chairman also brought up the matter of a public lavatory in the town. Members were generally in agreement that a convenience should be erected in the town.

### Mr. Roche's Report

Mr. Roche said that he understood from the beginning that the rents would be 12/6 but now he saw they were up another 3d. Referring to the cost of rent collection (15/- per annum on 12/9 per week) at £4 19s 6d was pretty high and it looked as if the rent collector would have a pretty good job when all of the 26 houses were finished.

### Mr. Quirk's Report

Mr. Quirk—It will cost £5 to collect £33.  
Mr. Roche—I'd agree with 12/6 but not 12/9.

### Senator Butler's Report
