ARDMORE GOSSIP

The article was headed 'Factory Report No 7 - Fairhome Products' and written for the Journal by Richard Guerrier. The article gives a very descriptive and interesting account of the rise to fame of a young man named Finny Hennessy once a boiler-maker but now the head of a £250,000 Company called the Fairholmes Products Ltd. We are glad to say that the Mr Hennessy mentioned in the article is a son of an Irishman - yes a Ring man. Some time ago Mr Hennessy purchased land here in Ardmore where he and his family come each year to spend a holiday and like the people of the Ring are very proud of having such a young man in the town. Mr Hennessy in the past has wished him and his family an enjoyable and happy holiday. The Harvest - At the present time the very bad weather we are experiencing in these parts is hampering the saving of the harvest very much. In many places corn has been badly lodged and much of the over-ripe corn destroyed by birds and rabbits. Waterford Board of Public Assistance
At the monthly meeting of the above Board on Monday last, in Dungarvan Mr T. K. Ryan, Chairman presided. Messrs M. McGrath, P. O'Connor, T. Morrissey and Senator Butler were also present. Mr O'Hare Secretary was in attendance. The Secretary stated with reference to the Unit at the Co. Hospital Waterford that he had seen the revised plans as drawn up by the Architects and the Board's advisers to the Department for sanction as directed. A reply from the Department requested further information as to the revised plans and the work will be located and the average labour content distinguishing between skilled and unskilled labour for each month. The Secretary said that he had then written to the Department that no schedule of costs or bills of quantities had yet been prepared and he was unable at this stage to give that information. The state of the work would be in the County Borough of Waterford.

The Secretary agreed with the Chairman that the Department's latest query showed progress in the matter and the Chairman said that the next move was up to the Department. With regard to Dungarvan the Secretary said that the Architects had written enclosing a preliminary sketch plan showing the relation between the proposed new unit and the existing hospital. He had phoned the Hospitals Commission who had told him that the report on the matter had been sent on to the Department and he was waiting to hear from them. The matter was deferred to next meeting.

Dispensary Hours
Stating that the existing rule about dispensary hours was in operation for 50 years and that 10 o'clock now was not the same as it was then Senator Butler said that the present dispensary hour in Dungarvan which he understood was from 10 to 11 o'clock was too early. He thought that an extra hour should be added to give people a chance and he suggested that the Medical Officer be asked for his observations on the matter. WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL (Continued from Page One) ed a short time for the Council (five weeks) and that on his return from England he applied for work but none was available at the time. Concerning the interference to the factory employed man it was stated that this man had worked for 12 months for the Council before going to the factory and when he left it was taken on again. This man had since gone to America. In reply to the Chairman Mr Kenneally said that he worked five or six months with Ganger Cliffe in 1944 and after being left in the factory he went to England. Other men were left from the gang at the time also and he did not know if this was due to the season or scarcity of work. When he came back from England after 24 years he applied for work to Cliffe on Jan 1st 1948 but didn't get it. He didn't know if there was work available then but he was still looking for it before and after this time. The matter was taken up with the Council since May 9th with Overseer Matt Ryan and is quite pleased. In reply to questions by Mr Kenneally he said that he reported the matter to him. On August 12th 1949 when he wanted to the question Ganger Cliffe as to why he would not get work the latter would not listen to him. He had no grievance beyond the fact that Mr Kenneally put on Cliffe whom he was sure had worked to give on July 1st that year. He was he said a supporter of the Labour Party at the time. In reply to Mr Norris he said that he could not prove that there was political discrimination used against him although he felt that there was. In reply to Mr Farrell Solr Kenneally said that he had to go to England as he could get no work. He disagreed that preference should be given to the man who stayed in Ireland as against a man who had to go abroad to get the same work and not the man who was already working. He had no personal grudge against Mr Cliffe. In further reply to Mr Kenneally he said that his step-brother were employed in the gang which consisted of about 30 men at the time. Mr Cliffe in his statement and in reply to Mr Kenneally said that he had worked about two months with him and then left himself without giving notice and went to England in August 1949. Kenneally met him and asked him if there was anything doing in the gang and he replied that there was not much and a dispute followed. With reference to a previous statement by Kenneally that a man who had been working with him in the road Mr Cliffe said that he thought that this man had left the farmer as he would not take a worker away from a farmer. Kenneally did not ask him for work to do but if he had not gone to England he would have been probably employed again when work restarted. He had no grievance with Kenneally before that time. Referring to the employed man Mr Cliffe said that the man asked him for a job he didn't know that he was with the D.L.C. He agreed that Kenneally had asked for work before that but the other man had been working in the time before he left and he knew was a good boy and he took him on again. He knew nothing about Kenneally going in and out of the factory and did not refuse him work. The number of men normally working in his gang would be 40 or 42. In reply to questions by Mr Farrell he said that his policy was to keep on the permanent workers as far as possible and Kenneally could not be classified as a permanent worker while the other man he took on could. He did not exclude Kenneally from work due to any political views he held or because he had contracted with Cliffe as a brother and married son had been with the Council for 11 years and 17 years respectively and his young son was not permanently employed by the Council. He formed the idea of providing for married men over single men in the line of any work going on. He had worked for the County Council himself for 26 years and this was the first time anything like this had happened. Mr Kenneally pointed out that the employed man referred to had in fact worked only six months and not for twelve months as stated, and that while young Cliffe was supposed to be a casual worker and not employed when all the rest of the men had been employed according to Mr Cliffe's own statement he was working from 5/7/48 to 7/5/49. Kenneally was looking for work. When asked why he employed his son in preference to unemployed men who were signing on, Mr Cliffe said that he did so as he found him very helpful and handy. To this Mr Kenneally said that this man was working with Kenneally arose. In reply to further questions by Mr Kenneally Ganger Cliffe said that he thought Kenneally went to England when he left him Mr Kenneally here pointed out that Kenneally did not go to England until the following April. When asked if he would like to sign an oath that he had not been employed by the D.L.C. factory that he should give a week's notice before coming to him Mr Cliffe said that he could not refuse to do so. He said that he did not refuse Kenneally work because he favoured Mr Kenneally. In reply to Mr Farrell Mr Cliffe said that he knew of no rule in the County Council which would prevent him from employing his son if there were no men in the district. Mr Ryan, Overseer said, in reply to the Chairman, that Kenneally was employed in his gang since last May. He found him a good worker who gave him no trouble and who would go anywhere he was sent. In reply to Mr Kenneally, witness said that he took Kenneally on at the request of Mr M Hassett, Engineer. Chairman—Are there any rules or regulations that the men should be taken on through the Labour Exchange? Mr D Sheedy—When on grant work we get a list from the Exchange but we have a discretion. After the luncheon recess, Mr Quirk raised a point concerning a previous reference by Mr Kenneally that the grub given by farmers was not much good, and said that he took exception to it. Mr Kenneally said that he also stated that he took exception to Mr Kenneally's statement that he was making his case before a "packed jury" and said that they had come in with open minds and only wanted to hear the truth. He said that Mr Kenneally should withdraw the statement. Mr Kenneally at the Chairman's request then withdrew the statement adding that no one hoped more than he that the jury was not packed. Case of Patrick Dalton, Steady Cross—Mr Kenneally reading his complaint to the Council manager this morning said that Dalton was let go in 1948 by Ganger Cliffe on the ground that he was unsuited for road work and that the rest of the men refused to work with him. He was at my request put on Cliffe and earned more than the average Council workers wage. He was again let go by Cliffe although single men including Cliffe's son and his brother were put on Cliffe and he had to go to Ballinacorney Quarry under Ganger Walsh a distance of 8 miles from his home. The report of Mr Ormond said that Dalton did not seem to him to be a good worker. Dalton was let go in 1948 on the plea that there was no work to be done during working hours. He kept his son who was handy to him when he wanted him especially on wet mornings. He could not remember whether he did or did not speak to Dalton during the hours as stated or that he said that the gang should pretend they were on piecework because Dalton was coming back. Patrick Cliffe in reply to the Chairman said that he knew Dalton and never heard him talking about politics. He was on piecework himself the same time as Dalton. When doing piecework Dalton was not in the gang but he was let go as well as others when a shortage of work or money occurred. To Mr Farrell witness said that no one liked to work on Dalton's 120 yards and make 100 blocks in the day. He would not say anything to the gang about not working with Dalton. In reply to Mr Kenneally witness said that he was on piecework with Dalton but could not say if he was paid piecework rates. John Fitzgerald an employee under Ganger Cliffe said that Dalton was all right to work when he wanted to but he was an extreme Union man and wanted everyone to be in the Union. In reply to a question by Dalton he agreed that it was mostly at dinner time that Dalton spoke about the Union. Mr Farrell witness said that he did not think that Dalton had been victimised. Mr Kenneally asked for the pay sheets covering the period Dalton was on piecework and when these were produced they showed that Dalton was paid 15 weeks Dalton and five others were on piece work and for the following two weeks that Dalton and two others were on piecework. Mr Kenneally said that he would like to draw attention to the fact that Dalton was the only one who had been kept on piecework for the whole month. Case of William Kennedy, Ballymacarthy—The complaint in this case was that Kennedy a married man was left off in 1948 while a boy of less than 18 years, son of a certain County Councillor was kept on. Mr Doyle, Engineer, in his report stated that while this man was employed as a sub-ganger he found him idle with a number of his men gathered around him and although he warned him he found him idle again and his warnings were apparently of no avail he instructed the Overseer to let him off. Concerning the County Councillor's son the report stated the Overseer informed him that he was a very good useful young man and that he wanted him in his gang as there was work that he would be more suitable for than older men so that I left the Overseer to his discretion on this point. William Kennedy corroborating Mr Kenneally's statement said that he had been left off in 1948. Concerning Mr Doyle's reference of finding him idle he said that he had caught him at work one day and he was showing the man what to do and just at that moment Mr Doyle came around the bend in his car. If he had come a minute earlier he would have caught them all at work. Mr Doyle got out and asked how he was rolling the road and when he told him Mr Doyle said that was right and got into his car and drove off. Witness did not think that it was right to charge him with idleness over this. The second incident was of a similar nature. Concerning the County Councillor's son he said that this young man used to spend most of his time testing the strength of his arms throwing pebbles down the river and often sparred off with the men on the road. Overseer Ryan said that the men were left off as the money

had run out. To Mr Kenneally Mr Ryan said that he had come in to Dungarvan on a Council lorry on the previous Friday. He did not agree, he said, that he had told Mr Doyle that he especially wanted the young man previously referred to. Mr Doyle said that there were two gangs in the area one on a road and the other doing bridgework. The money for the bridgework ran out and the men left off but work on the bridge continued well into the New Year and the young man referred to was with the bridge gang whom Overseer Dunne wanted kept together as it was specialised work. Kilmachomas Housing Scheme—Patrick Power Thomas McCarney Frank Moseley and James Downey all of Kilmachomas appeared before the Committee and stated that they had been refused work at the building of the cottages there although men had been taken on from outside the area all stated that they were actively associated with the Labour Party in their area. Thomas Morrissey foreman at Kilmachomas said that he gave the work to the most suitable men who applied for it. In reply to Mr Kenneally he said that it never struck him to apply to the Labour Exchange for work as he had no political influence used on him to get jobs for any men. Patrick Murphy said that he applied at the Labour Exchange for a job when he heard a new man was coming. He was a qualified mechanic but never heard anyone about the job. James Downey said that he sent in an application for the job. He was an ex-National Army man with a driver's certificate from the Department. He had applied twice for the job but was told by Mr Doyle that he had not enough experience for the job. He had 20 years driving experience and had driven lorries for the Army while on manoeuvres. Mr Kenneally—This man had all the qualifications for the job but the one that broke his back was that he was Secretary of the Labour Party. Michael Barron also stated that he applied at the Labour Exchange for the job but he told there that they knew nothing about the job. He had 23 years driving experience and he would walk on manoeuvres. Mr Doyle said that he had received no application for the job beyond that of James Downey. Case of James McGrath, Ballymacarthy—Roger McGrath stated that he was employed on cottages and later dismissed on two occasions he had to draw 40 buckets of water 120 yards and make 100 blocks in the day. He would not say anything to the gang about not working with Dalton. In reply to Mr Kenneally witness said that he was on piecework with Dalton but could not say if he was paid piecework rates. John Fitzgerald an employee under Ganger Cliffe said that Dalton was all right to work when he wanted to but he was an extreme Union man and wanted everyone to be in the Union. 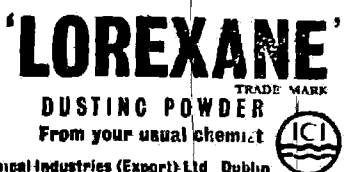

Death of Mr T Landers, Campfire

The death of Mr Thomas Landers which occurred on Wednesday August 23rd in the Campfire district one of its most esteemed inhabitants. Although in failing health for some time Mr Landers died rather unexpectedly. A native of Lissonny he was 40 years of age and was loved by all for his quiet and retiring disposition and he was noted for his willingness to help those in need of assistance. For over 20 years he was a trust worthy employee of the Dobb's family of Cappoquin House, and was held by each member of that family as a loyal employee. At the removal of the remains from his late residence in St Mary's Parish Church on Thursday evening there was a large and representative gathering. Rev Fr P F McGrath recited the prayers for the dead assisted by Rev E McSwiney C.S.P. Dublin. On Friday morning Requiem Masses were offered for his happy repose and on that afternoon the funeral left for interment in the family burial plot in St Declan's cemetery followed by a huge gathering of mourning relatives, friends and the general public who gathered to pay a final mark of respect to his memory. DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

Stiff Fine In Defective Brakes Case.

Woman Bound To The Peace.

(Held before Mr Eamonn O'Riain DJ on Wednesday last.)

Sequel To Accident—Joseph Fitzgerald Mapstown was charged under section 51 of the Road Traffic Act on two counts (1) dangerous driving and (2) driving with defective brakes. James Sheehan Coolragour was summoned as owner of the vehicle for allowing it to be used while the brakes were defective.

Mr Farrell (Solr) said that his client would plead guilty under Section 50 of the Act and Inspector Croke who prosecuted said he would accept that.

Giving the facts of the case the Inspector said that on July 29th last at about 10 minutes to 8 Fitzgerald was driving a milk supply van in Mitchell Street. A car ran on the road and he put on the brakes and swerved to avoid the child. He was unable to stop the van as the brakes were defective and the child was hit and knocked over and seriously injured. The van stopped 39 feet from where the accident occurred. Defendant admitted that he knew the brakes were bad and that he had discussed the matter with his employer some days previously.

Mr Farrell said that the child had run out at the van and no matter what the driver did and even if the brakes were perfect the child would have hit the van. While Mr Sheehan said that the brakes were bad he did not think that they were so defective.

The Justice stating that it was a serious thing to drive a vehicle without proper brakes fined Fitzgerald £1 on each of the two counts. Remarking that it was the employer's responsibility to see that the vehicle was all right he fined him £5 for allowing the vehicle to be used as it was.

Miscellaneous—John Dooloughmore was fined 10/- when summoned by Garda Deasy for allowing his dog to cause an obstruction at Mary Street.

A fine of 2/- was imposed on John Prendergast Garrynagh when summoned for allowing a dog to wander on the public road.

Bound To Peace—Ellen Roche Cathal Brugha Street summoned Mary Nagle same address for using threatening and abusive language towards her on July 19th.

Mrs Roche stated that she was going home by the right of way that evening and her dog ran in among a lot of chickens and made an alarm. Mrs Nagle came out with a weapon in her hand and used language towards her and threatened to hit her.

Mrs Nagle said she said nothing beyond that Mrs Roche should pay for the damage her dog did to the chickens.

The Justice stating that it was not the first time Mrs Nagle was in court said that he had no hesitation in accepting Mrs Roche's evidence. Even the medical evidence to enter into a bond to be of good behaviour for 12 months in her own recognisance of £10 with £1 8s costs. In default of entering defendant would serve one month in jail.

Jail Sentence—John Anthony Curran Waterford already convicted on two occasions at other courts this year and with a number of other convictions for assault and since 1939 was sentenced when months imprisonment when charged with the larceny of a bicycle the property of Thos. Ward Cappagh on August 15th.

Inspector Croke said that defendant who had been working with a farmer in Cappagh took the bicycle from outside a shop the ballymacgamme and had cycled as far as Clonroche where he was arrested.

Defendant admitted the offence.
