## SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

During the week I received a copy of the well-known Provincial newspaper "The Clare Champion" which contained one of the finest articles I have seen on the importance of the home-town newspaper. Many of our readers will I feel sure find it of interest and so for their benefit I reproduce it as follows.

It has been said far too often that the difference between literature and journalism is that one is permanent and the other ephemeral and that the greatest news story once it has appeared in print is dead.

The contrary is nearer to the truth for newspapers and particularly provincial newspapers if they are valid are a record of the real life of the people. State records and public archives as well as authoritative books provide the basis of history as far as it deals with major events but one must go to the newspapers to understand and realize how people lived their work and interests and achievements in their own particular sphere. For this reason the files of the provincial papers are a coveted national possession jealously guarded by their owners and eagerly sought by public authorities. They have contributed immensely to the work of reconstructing social history and maintaining national and local pride without which a community is like the petals of a group of castaways with a common memory.

The houses of the old and important families everywhere in Ireland in addition to preserving family records and the documents which too are important historical sources have done much in the way of retaining the newspapers of the last century newspapers that are often not available from any public source.

**SPENDING THE PEOPLE'S MONEY AND HOW?**

## FEAST OF ST. AUGUSTINE

In honour of the Feast of St. Augustine, Pontifical High Mass was celebrated on Sunday in the Friary Church, Dungarvan by Most Rev. Dr. Thomas Cahill Bishop of Cairns Australia. Assistant priest was Rev. Fr. Hartnett, O.S.A. Deacon Rev. Fr. P. Duffner, O.S.A. and Sub-Deacon Rev. Fr. Daly, O.S.A.

From all over the county clergy came to honour St. Augustine making the ceremony one of the most memorable in the glorious history of the Order. It was the first time that the Pontifical High Mass was celebrated at St. Augustine's Church, Dungarvan. The sermon given by Rev. Fr. Coleman O'Driscoll, O.S.A. dealt with the present scourge of Communism throughout the world and left a deep impression on the packed congregation.

During the course of his sermon Fr. O'Driscoll stated that they were today living in a re-awakened time when they would have to remember the last words of St. Augustine— "The Vandal shall never take that which is guarded by Christ." He referred to the scourge of Communism throughout the world and stated that at the recent funeral of King Leopold to Belgium was an example of the pressure being brought to bear on the Catholics of today. King Leopold is said to be a Catholic and he did what he could in the interests of his people during the last war. He submitted to vastly superior forces for a comparative measure of peace for his nation and then went into exile. His people wanted him back and he returned but at the same time there was a great force working against him and against Christianity—a strong Communist Party. They called for his abdication from the throne and their call was sponsored by the British press. In the end, his efforts for his people failed and he had to return once again into exile.

Referring to America Fr. O'Driscoll stated that when the Old and Catholic country of Spain applied to the States for their aid to enable them build up their defences against Communism the American leaders were not in favour of granting Spain's request. Thanks to the efforts of the many Irish Representatives in the House who realised the many great sacrifices made by the sons and daughters of Ireland for Christ and America, dollars were eventually granted but added Fr. O'Driscoll if Free Masonry had its way Spain would have been allowed remain an easy victim for Communist invasion.

There was a great deal of talking about fighting this form of world corruption but he wanted all to remember that weapons such as the Atom Bomb and the Hydrogen Bomb would not wipe out the world. They would have to fight ideology with ideology and their principal weapon would have to be the spiritual weapon of prayer.

Here at home, he said they had been told that they were maintaining aloof from all Western Europe Defence talks because of their own fight for Partition but he felt that there was something much deeper than just that in the Government's attitude. The last war was supposed to have been really the last, but again they have seen that this can not be so. "It is not the last" he added "and will never be the last until the whole world realises that there can be no lasting peace till they turn back to Christianity."

Fr. O'Driscoll paid a tribute to the firm stand being taken by our Government against this menace and added that the nation's strength in such a stand could only be gained by the strength of the individual. He exhorted all to look to the Family Rosary and to abide by the true Irish way. Then they could rest assured that Ireland would not fall in the onslaught but would be guarded by Christ.

Fr. O'Driscoll concluded by saying that if the occasion arises and they could expect it any time they would be prepared to go, once again behind the Iron Curtain to raise the Standard of Christianity.
