Dungarvan U.D.C. Special Meeting Opens With The Heat On Exchanges Between Chairman and T.D. Town Hall Improvements

Mr T. Lannen, chairman, presided at a further special meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council held on last Tuesday night at South Terrace. He said that to build a store will cost him at least £300, that the minimum to build the Plucking Room inside his existing premises will cost him about £250. This is apart altogether from what he will have to do to comply with Regulations under the 1947 Public Health Act. Therefore, unless the Council is prepared to agree with him on a figure approaching £550 he will not be prepared to give up the Plucking Room.

If the Council does not reach Agreement upon the point and the case is left to go before the Circuit Court, then, even if your clients do succeed in getting possession of the premises, it is doubtful, then they will be bound to pay him adequate compensation for disturbance, and we consider, and Counsel is of the same opinion that such compensation will be very considerable amount, and therefore, we suggest that the Council would be wise not to bring upon themselves this very heavy expense.

The Chairman asked why the client that before this matter can be brought to a head a Notice to Quit should be served by the Council upon him and then negotiations should be begun. Mr Casey said that he was payable to him for giving up portion of his premises. We think, however, that this is not really essential because we suggest that the Council would be in order in the circumstances in purchasing from our client portion of his tenancy that is to say the Plucking Room at an agreed figure which might be subject to sanction later, and this might be the quicker method of dealing with the matter. It might then be necessary for the Council to grant a new Lease of the remainder of the premises to our client. The parties can agree upon a figure in respect of the Plucking Room, our client is prepared to give up possession very quickly to them.

We would be glad to hear from you in connection with this letter.

Mr Kelly asked if the small portion offered by Mr Foley would be adequate to meet the improvement he needed.

The Manager said that he had asked the Architects about that and they had supplied a sketch plan and report.

Mr Kelly: The architect is satisfied that he can carry on if we acquire this small bit.

Clerk: Yes but only as a temporary measure.

The Clerk here read a report from his assistant on the subject that the rate collectors office could be used as supper room and said that the suggestion would not be feasible.

Mr McCarthy: I remember the time when the Council had the Sinn Fein Room and no one had access to it only members of Sinn Fein and I can't see why we can't take it over now.

Clerk: You could take it over but you would only have one office then.

Mr Casey: But there's plenty room in the Town Clerk's office.

20 clerks could work in that office.

Clerk: You could not work properly if the public had free access to that.

Mr Casey: But the public have free access to Banks and other places and their work goes on.

Clerk: That's not the same.

Mr Williams here reported on the proceedings at the last District Court and said that any further delay would be of no good unless the Council was prepared to come to agreement with Mr Foley.

Mr McCarthy: I think we should make him an offer.

Mr Dwyer: I think £250 is reasonable.

Mr Casey: You can take up the matter with Messrs Farrell & Morrissey.

Manager: I don't think that Mr Casey should be given £500 for what they call the plucking room.

Mr Williams: I think it's absurd.

Mr Dwyer said that Mr Foley would have to build another room and that would cost him a lot.

Manager: He should not be allowed to pluck the ratepayers away! When we went down there all I saw in that room was 4 or 5 hens and a few rabbits hanging on the wall and that £500 was for a room for a plucking room for that is absolutely ridiculous.

Mr McCarthy: But we must think of his business.

Manager: And also that he has one of the most suitable sites in the town for a plucking room.

Mr McCarthy: If he is going to be thrown out we must give him decent compensation.

Mr Dwyer: I will not be party to a bargain that will not be a bargain for anybody.

Mr McCarthy: We threw them out of the country before; I think we should make an offer to Mr Foley.

Mr Casey: Will the Clerk read out the resolution we passed the last night in that connection.

This stated that the Council recommend to the County Manager that he accept the offer of Mr Foley subject to arbitration in the matter of compensation either by an arbitrator or the Circuit Court.

Mr Casey: There's nothing about it being in that but (1) that there be mutual agreement and (2) that the matter of compensation be settled by arbitration.

Mr Dwyer: Certain parties in town want to evict him.

Mr Casey: There's no mention of that in our resolution.

Mr Dwyer: I know, but they are not members of this Council.

Mr McCarthy: I think we should make him a decent offer.

Manager: The Superintendent and I discussed the matter and he feels that short dances should not be discontinued, and also that when the improvements have been carried out the Urban Council can again approach the District Justice to have a license for long dances granted.

Mr Williams: I also met the Superintendent and he said the same to me. We can't negotiate this matter in a fortnight or a month and I suggest that the Council be satisfied with short dances for this year.

Mr Casey: The Council will not be satisfied with that, we want our revenue.

Mr McCarthy: If the repairs were done in a month could we then hold dances?

Mr Williams: You can, of course approach the District Justice at any time. He has been very lenient about this matter and has adjourned it three times already. These plans and the County Manager's order, with all due respects to him, are all humbug from the legal point of view.

Manager: I beg your pardon, it's not humbug as it gives a direction.

Mr Kelly: It's unfair to our Solicitor to have this matter discussed the night before the Court, as he won't be able to segregate himself, so to say, before the Court. (Mr Kelly laughed at this remark.)

Mr Kelly: It's no laughing matter. Our Solicitor put up a good case the last day. I think we should make Mr Foley a definite offer for the portion he offers.

Mr Kelly: On a point of order Mr Chairman, what has Mr Williams to segregate?

Mr Williams: He can say to the District Justice is that negotiations are going on. I understand that the Superintendent is prepared to say that he will agree with short dances until the improvements are carried out as the Superintendent is fed up with this matter and with the publicity he has been getting over it.

Mr Casey: If we are serious about it we must come to some basis with Mr Foley.

Mr Kelly: I move that we ask Mr Williams to look for short dances.

Mr Kelly: I am not in agreement with that. The Town Hall is not worse now than it has been during the last 10 years and I think we should be given a temporary license. I'd like to know why there are all these moving snow and why there should be an attempt to deprive the public of dances.

Mr Casey said that Mr Williams was in a position to say that progress was being made in the matter and he thought the District Justice as a reasonable man would take a reasonable view of the matter.

Mr Williams: No, there would be no chance of that and the only alternative to get a license for short dances.

Manager: Until a deed has been signed up with Mr Foley there is no use in going to the District Justice asking for all-night dances.

Mr Williams referred to the Council's liability to dance Committees who had already booked and paid for the hall and Mr Williams said that he did not want to be in a position to be liable for any loss as the circumstances of the case were beyond their control.

Mr Casey did not agree with this.

Manager: There are plenty of people prepared to put up a decent dance hall and spend £30,000 or £40,000 and here we are faced with a small expenditure and we are not prepared to do that.

Mr Kelly: In what capacity Manager are we not prepared to go ahead?

Mr Kelly: He has to segregate that (laughter).

Mr Casey: Our best solution is in our last resolution that the matter be fixed by arbitration.

Mr Kelly said that they should make an offer.

Mr Casey: If you propose that Mr Foley get £250 I'll second you.

Mr Kelly: I will this is the time to decide the matter.

Mr Kelly: Hear, hear, move your proposition now if you're not joking.

Mr Kelly: I'm not and I will propose that he be offered £450.

Mr Kelly: Well I'll second that, I think the man is reasonable in his demand and I think he should get his £550.

After further discussion Mr Casey proposed that Mr Foley be given £550, and Mr O'Dwyer seconded.

The Manager said that the members should go down to the place and see what they were to pay £550 for. It was only a quarter of the space he had for a ridiculous proposition.

Mr Casey: I propose that we stick to our original resolution.

Mr Keane suggested the appointment of a small deputation to discuss the matter with Mr Foley.

Mr McCarthy: You have a proposition before the Chair and an amendment which has not been recorded.

The Chair said that the Council had already passed a resolution the last night and notice of motion to rescind that should be handed in before any other resolution could be accepted.

Mr Kelly: That's right, Manager. You must abide by the first resolution and must appoint a Circuit Court Judge to arbitrate and I think that's the fairest way for everyone.

Mr Williams said the Circuit Court Judge would not sit here until Feb 13th.

Mr O'Dwyer said that four long dances had been booked and if they could be got they wouldn't take any more bookings until the repairs were done.

Mr Casey said that the Council might be faced with actions by dance committees for loss of profits. He also said that if Mr Foley agreed to arbitration there was no reason why he should refuse to give immediate possession.

Mr Williams said that he would like if someone would come into court with him and explain the matter to the District Justice.

The County Manager said that he would be unable to do so as he had to be in Kilkenny.

After a short lapse Mr Kelly said that he would go into the court as a common informer and put the case for the Council.

During the course of further discussion Mr Kelly said that he would look for would be short dances as these were the dances wanted by the clubs he was interested in and for one long dance for a club on Dec 26th. He said that he was only interested in the section that elected him.

Several members said that this was a very selfish attitude to adopt and that if these long dances were not allowed it might lead to litigation against the Council for loss by the Committees in question.

Supr P O'Mahony said that this matter had been hanging fire for a long time and was coming up fortnight after fortnight. The position was now that the Council would have to come to agreement with Mr Foley, then prepare plans and submit them for sanction and he felt that plans for any partial development of the hall would not be sanctioned by the Local Government Department and then if these were sanctioned contractors would have to be got before the work could start and he thought this would take them into next summer. He felt that he should object to any dances in the hall but representations had been made to him to allow short dances as they were a means of finance to local clubs and parents in town with children of dancing ages would prefer to see their children able to go dancing in town and for these reasons he would not object to them.

Concerning the long dances he said that as long ago as last February he had informed the Town Clerk that he would oppose the license unless the improvements were carried out and any commitments made by the Council were at their own risk. The hall he said was obviously unfit for long dances and he would oppose the granting of permission for those four long dances. The Council had no right to take those bookings and in doing so they had assumed the local Young Farmers' Club had travelled to Clonera for their dance and next week the Guards would travel out there, he said, and also the Literary Club were going there and if these clubs could go to Clonera then the other four clubs mentioned could also go there as he did not feel it was right that there should be any special consideration allowed for them. No long dances should be allowed in the hall until it was put in order and when this was done, he would not, he said then oppose the application.

Mr Farrell, solicitor explained Mr Foley's position, and said that they had an architect and engineer down to visit the premises and after receiving Counsel's opinion they had without prejudice, made an offer of about one-third of the place to the UDC for £550 which they considered fair. If the Council accepted that offer and got sanction for it then they could take possession of it tomorrow and have advice to the Council was that Mr Foley's premises was valuable to them for the license of the hall but when they go to buy it they say it is not worth much but they would have to change their attitude.

Mr Williams asked the Justice to make a special concession for the four long dances already booked and he underook that if the licensing sessions was adjourned for three months no other long dances beyond those four and the two short dances each week would be allowed.

The Justice said that if the question was merely one of penalising the Urban Council by refusing the four long dances he would be inclined to do so as he felt they had acted in a fairly lax manner about these lettings in view of the Superintendent's warning but if he refused it would not be the Urban Council who would suffer as much as the people who have made arrangements to run these dances in the circumstances that would renew the license restricting it to two short dances each week and he would allow the four dances specified but no other long dances would be allowed until the hall was put into proper condition.

Will Oppose Bar Licenses For Hall

The Superintendent said that in the case of the four long dances the Committee's running them should do without licenses for bars.

Mr Williams: We can deal with that later as each application comes before the court.

The Superintendent said that the Sanitary arrangements were really bad and he would oppose all such applications.

Justice: These clubs might be satisfied to take the hall without bar licenses and if they want them they will have to apply and come into court.

The Superintendent said that he would oppose them anyway.
