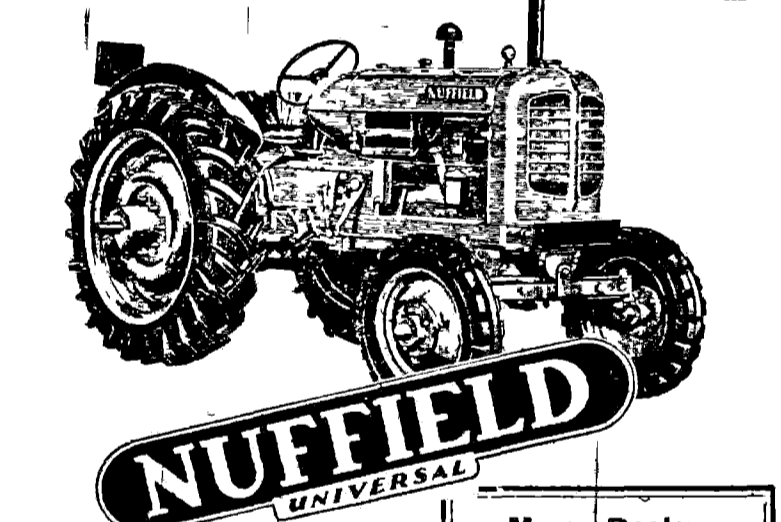

FARMERS!

Farmers are earnestly requested to consider the prospects for animal feeding stuffs...

The whole livestock industry depends on the supply of feeding stuffs, and the only certain source of supply is our own land.

The continued expansion of the livestock industry depends entirely on whether the farmers of Ireland produce the food necessary on their own land.

If the farmers want to do their part, they can perfectly easily do it.

If they don't do their part, either our livestock (cattle, sheep, pigs and fowl) must be cut down in numbers or the whole system of letting farmers run their own business be ended.

Compulsory tillage and all other forms of arbitrary interference with the freedom of farmers were abolished by your Government.

The Government depends on farmers to do their own interest all that is necessary, without compulsion or penalties.

To produce feed for our own livestock we require this spring AT LEAST the following —

Table with 2 columns: Item (Ymer Barley, Oats, Potatoes, Hay and Silage) and Quantity (200,000 acres, 800,000, 400,000, 2,000,000).

Preparation for these crops must be undertaken NOW, in addition to such other crops as farmers may intend to sow, such as wheat, industrial barley, beet and other root crops.

Unless each farmer produces on his own land all the animal feed he requires, he cannot hope to maintain his livestock.

It is for the farmers to decide whether freedom or compulsion is the better policy.

In a statement early in 1950 the Minister for Agriculture directed the attention of farmers to the prospect of supplies of feeding grains from abroad becoming scarce and dear.

The prospect of supplies of feeding grain from abroad is worse since the Korean war and this makes it all the more necessary that we should produce all the oats, barley, potatoes and silage that our land can be made to yield in 1951, over and above such other crops as farmers have planned to grow.

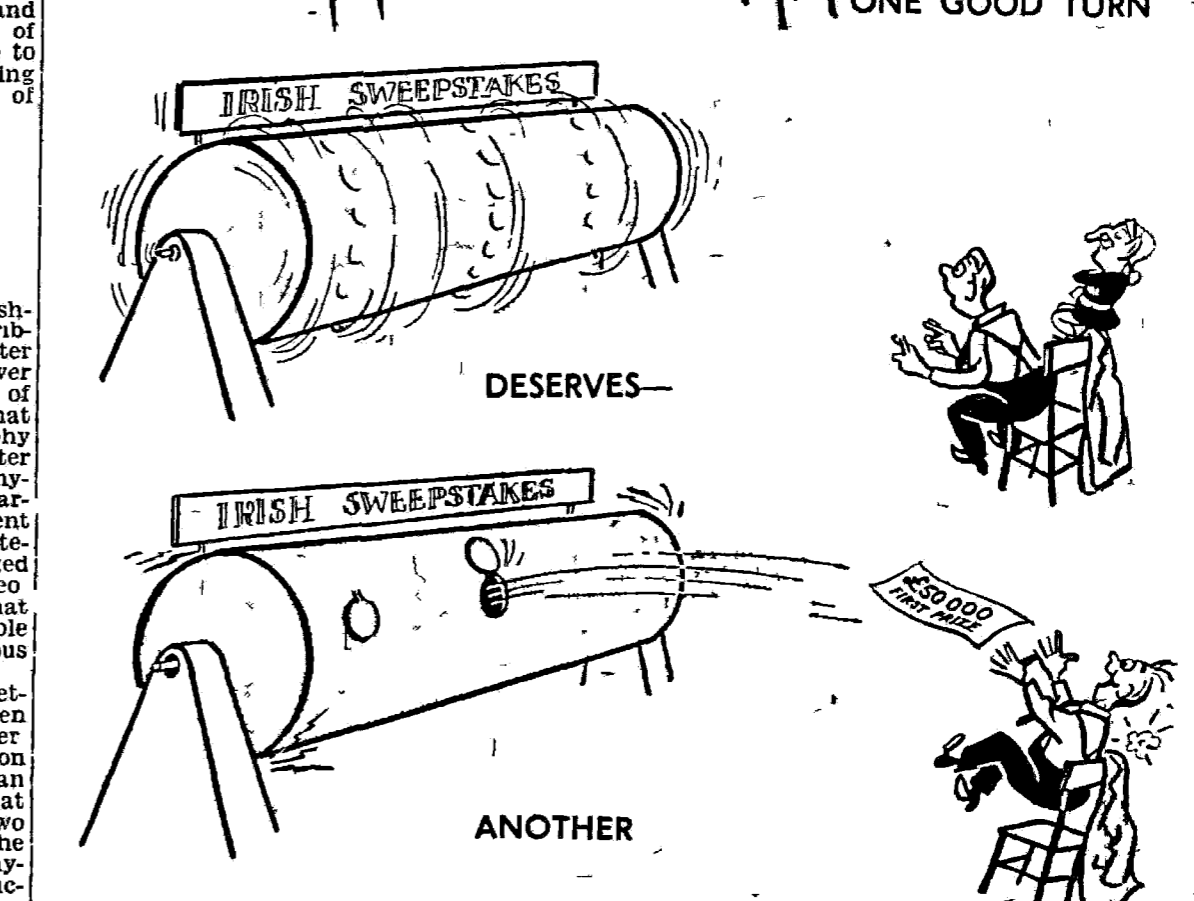
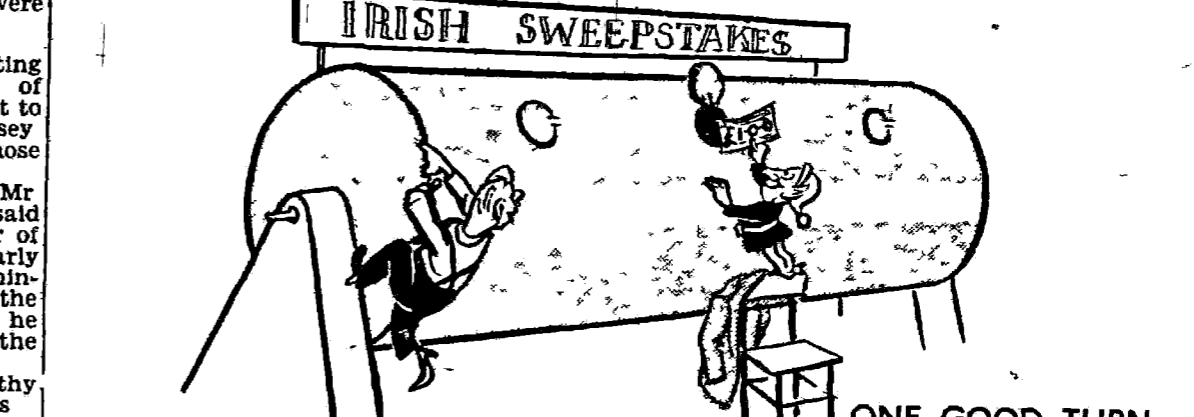
