The deceased was a member of an old and highly respected family of the farming community of a kindly and genial disposition he made many friends and seldom gave expressions of such deep sympathy followed an obituary notice.

**DEATH OF PAPAN UNICIO**  
**Urban Council Meeting Adjourns**  
Last Friday night's meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council which was to have considered a long and varied agenda adjourned as a mark of respect to the memory of the late Papan Nuncio, Monsignor Felici whose regretted death occurred in Dublin during the previous week.  
In the absence of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, Mr T. Kyne was moved to the chair and moving the adjournment of the meeting said that it was only fitting that they should adjourn the meeting as a mark of respect to the death of the late Papan Nuncio. He then proposed the following resolution:—"That this Council tender to his Grace the Archbishop of Dublin their sincere and profound sympathy with him and the other Bishops and Clergy of Ireland on the death of the late Papan Nuncio to Ireland Most Rev Monsignor Ettore Felici and that this meeting stand adjourned as a mark of respect." Mr McCarthy seconded the resolution with which Senator Butler Mr Keane and Mr Lee also associated themselves as did the Town Clerk Mr Deery on behalf of the Manager and staff.  
The resolution was then passed in respectful silence all members standing.

**FINE GAEL CONVENTION**  
Fine Gael is today the coming party and Fianna Fail is rapidly going down hill. This was stated in Dungarvan on Sunday last by Senator D Burke Tipperary when he addressed a very large and representative gathering of delegates at a Waterford Constituency Fine Gael Convention. He said that recently for the first time in the past 50 years the population of Ireland had gone over the three millions mark which was proof that the 'old rot' had at last come to an end and Ireland is on the road to profitable progress. This was he said what many of the forefathers thought and died for and they in Ireland would reap the benefits of this great achievement. Senator Burke stated that the greatest tribute that could have been paid to the work of the Inter Party Government was the fact that America had suspended the help of ECA because Ireland was recovered well enough to carry on her own work.  
He stated that the farmers and the townspeople all fully realise what has been done for them by the Inter Party Government during their term of office.  
Dealing with Agriculture he said that in 1947 when Minister Paddy Smith filled the fields with Inspectors 580,000 acres of wheat were sown and they returned a production of 315,000 tons while in 1950 without any Inspectors 366,000 acres of wheat produced 328,000 tons. It will be seen from this said Senator Burke that a Dunlop acre of wheat produces about twice as much as a Smith inspected acre.  
There were many other enlightened schemes of operation by Mr Dillon's Department and in this respect he thought he should mention the Land Rehabilitation Project, because it explained the whole philosophy of Fine Gael economics. Our forefathers fought that we might be allowed to work and prosper in our own land. It would be a sorry day if the fruits of industry and thrift were denied to the people.  
Before concluding the death with the many advantages of grants for housebuilding reduction of stamp duty and the Land Act introduced by the Minister in 1950 to ensure that anyone whose land was taken in the public interest should be paid a just price and in addition, something extra in cases of hardship caused by removal. Finally Senator Burke stated that he had great hopes for a better Ireland—hopes that can and would be fully realised provided the people of Ireland once again stood behind them and gave them their vote of confidence.  
Other speakers were—Mrs Redmond outgoing TD Senator J Butler Councillor Teddy Lyons and Mr Michael Clancy outgoing TD. The candidates selected for the Waterford constituency are—Mrs B Redmond (outgoing) and Mr Thomas Flynn Knockaun Grange, (Farmer).

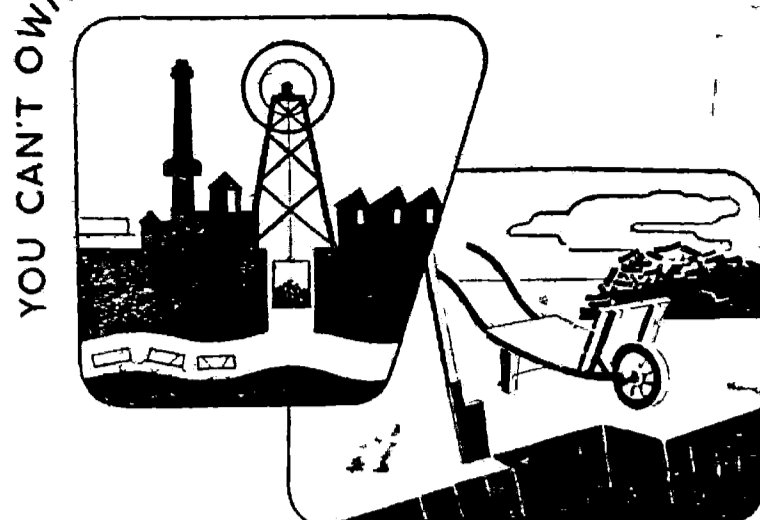
