

### DEATH OF DR. DANIEL T. McCARTHY **DUNGARVAN**

The death of Dr Daniel T McCarthy M.B. BCh., BSc., DPh Coroner for West Waterford which occurred with tragic suddenness at his residence abbereide Dungaryan ion Fri. Abbeyside Dungarvan, jon Friday morning last June 8th caused the most profound shock to the people of Dungaryan and throughout West Waterford

generally Eldest son of Mr Michael J McCarthy and the late Mrs Nora McCarthy Abbeyside the late Dr McCarthy was educated at St Colman's College, Fermoy and at University College, Cork where he graduated after a most distinguished academic career in 1920 He later did a post graduate course at the Col ege of Surgeons, Dublin, where

he took his D.Ph., degree In November 1930, he was ap-pointed Surgeon at Dungaryan District Hospital in succession to the late Dr J C Hackett, and continued to build up a very large private practice His great ability as a medical doc-tor and skilful surgeon was early recognised and peopl came to him from all over the county and confidently placed their health problems in his hands He worked unceasingly to alleviate pain and illness very often without recompense and the poor always found in him a friend ever leady to listen to their troubles and cure their ailments As a Sur-geon he had few equals, and performed many major operations of a dangerous nature

with success, and his love for his profession was such that he often was satisfied to perform a big operation successfully without ever looking for the fees that his great genius undoubtedly deserved. There can be no doubt about the fact that a big percentage of the people big percentage of the peopl of Dungarvan and of the county will forever remain indebted to the skill which the late Dr Dar as he was affectionately known carried in his hands and to the ability of his powerful and alert In private life if it can ever be said that a doctor such as he was with continual demands on his time had one, he was a lovable personality and a great raconteur, and his arguments in many discussions were always sound and profound. He maintained a life-long friend-ship with the late Dr Michael A. Casey MO, Dungarvan, and it has been truly said that in their Brief lifetimes, they provided between them one of

provided between them one the greatest medical service Dungarvan has ever known without a means test It is poignantly tragic to see that we men who did so much for their native town in so short a time should have died so tragi-

cally within almost two months of each other He was associated with the industrial revival of the town and as a sportsman his part in training and preparing the 1948 senior hurling team who brought highest honours to the Deise is well-known. It was only fitting then that a deserving tribute was paid to his memory on Sunday last when at Cork Athletic Grounds prior to the Waterford-Tipperary game the crowd of 18,000 people stood in respectful silence for two minutes and the players of the Waterford team wore black mourning bands on their arms during the match He was one of the donors of the magnificent Sheehan Cup which is now be ing played for by the Juveniles of the county—the future wield-






