Views Of Our Readers BALLYCOURTY POTATO CROP (To The Editor) A Char... In an article 'Spotlight on the potato' published in a recent issue of your paper your correspondent appeared to convey that Mr. Kyne, alone of the Waterford T.D.'s, is interested in the question of securing a market for the potato crop in the Ballynacourt area. I don't want to take away from Mr. Kyne any credit that may be due to him in connection with this matter, but a number of your readers are aware (1) that Mr. Ormonde T.D. attended a meeting of farmers from Ballynacourt convened to discuss their position, (2) that Mr. Kyne was invited to this meeting but did not attend and (3) that as a result of representations made by Mr. Ormonde to the Minister for Agriculture an alternative market was secured for the Ballynacourt potato crop.

Readers of your paper expect when a professional newspaperman writes on events of popular interest, to find himself acquainted with all the facts and that he will report those facts objectively. In the circumstances it is not understood why your correspondent omitted to mention Mr. Ormonde's name in the article under review.
